Dear Guy

I hate to be a post about this business of curling. Perhaps I am unnecessarily concerned about the problem of building up our membership and my exercisement turn out to be merely a symptom of the itch to get at it caused by these chilly days.

It also occurs to me that it might be a good idea to put up a notice on the bulletin board of the Ardsley Club, outlining the activities of our club, the cost and that there might be a few vacancies in our limited membership for additional applicants.

There should be several good prospects among the new tenants in Hudson House, such as Fred Lewson and others. That would you think of appointing George Williams and Charlie Stover to the job of securing a few of these tenants for our membership? Ashley Thorndike should be a good prospect. Is there any chance of getting Paul Wilhelland back?

In sending out the proposed return postcard are you planning to include ex-members as well as last year's members? Some of the old members might come back.

Please don't think me a bore in this matter. I just have a feeling that this year particularly with all of the activity that lies sheed of us at St. Andrews we should make certain that we have a full and active membership. If I can help in any way, please let me know.

Curling Letter

WILDS CUP COMPETITION

Enclosed is the Wilds Cup assignment of rinks, together with the schedule as it effects the three Ardsley rinks.

The committee has set up this competition with the idea of including as many curlers in this competition as is possible. A rule therefore is imposed that only one man can be borrowed from another rink for any one match, and he must play #1. With this rule it is hoped that skips and vice-skips will first exhaust all their alternates before they borrow a substitute from another rink. Alternates can play in any position on the rinks to which they are assigned, even to skip.

There is a very full schedule of curling set up by St. Andrews this year. It can be easily upset by frequent postponements. With the quantity of curling power assigned, there is no conceivable reason for a postponement by any Ardsley rink. Skips and vice skips are not obliged to skip or play. If they find it impossible to meet a schedule match, they are urged to appoint a temporary skip from their alternates and get a rink on the ice. Let's try to have every member get at least one shot at a Wilds Cup competition.

SAVE TUESDAY, MARCH 7th

The final dinner of the season will be held at St.
Andrews at 7 o'clock. The winners of the Windeler Cup will be presented with their medals. The Windeler finals will be played Sunday, February 26th, afternoon between Robinson and Kimbel. In the upper bracket of the Windeler matches, which had resulted in a triple tie, Luckett beat Peabody and the "Chrissies" by the overwhelming score of 19 to 1. Last Sunday afternoon, however, still weak from the after effects of his trip to Utica, Luckett succumbed to Kimbel by one stone in an extra end. (Poor Ed was so exhausted that he was unable to join his wife at a cocktail party).

OUT-OF-TOWN CURLING

Ardsley sent two rinks to Schenectady on February 11th. In the Gordon Medal, Eddison-Luckett-Townsend-Hollister were beaten in the first round by our old friends the Caladonians, 12 to 8. This medal was won by Schenectady in the finals.

The Ardsley rink which competed for the R. S. Emmett Memorial Medal was composed of McLeod-Ogden-Shaw-Plummer. They lost their first match to Utica, 13 to 10. The Caladonians won the medal.

The next week, Eddison-Luckett-Shaw went to Utica. As a lead, they picked up a Utica Curler, Mr. A. L. Lockwood. Mr. Lockwood proved a tower of strength, and with his able assistance Ardsley, after beating the Country Club in the first round, the Caladonians in the second, went on to beat Schenectady in the finals to win the Mitchell Medal. By winning this medal, Ardsley is entitled to send a rink to Montreal on March 17th to compete for the Royal Caladonian Trophy. The other two American clubs to be represented will be Schenectady, winner of the Gordon Medal, and Saranac Lake, as winner of the medal won there last Monday, Sixteen rinks compete for the Royal Caladonian Trophy, thirteen from various parts of Canada, and three from the United States.

Skip Eddison will be happy upon request to display the Mitchell Medal, which is reposing in the safe at St. Andrews.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Grand National Curling Club of America was held at the Utica Curling Club, Utica, N. Y., February 9, 1940, with the following in attendance:

Saranac Lake C.C., Hartford C.C., Farmington C.C., Boston C.C., and Winchester C.C. were represented by proxy.

President Davies presided.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Secretary-Treasurer, having been duly approved by the Auditing Committee, was then read, and showed a balance on hand as of February 9, 1940 of \$319.03, with all dues collected.

The Chairman then directed the attention of the Committee to the questionnaire which was sent to all clubs, advising of matters to be discussed at the meeting, and each subject was disposed of in order.

THE ROYAL CALEDONIAN TROPHY

The method of choosing the three rinks to represent G.N.C.C. in this event, held annually at Montreal, evolved considerable interest. The merits of each of the three plans outlined in the questionnaire were considered carefully, with the final selection of Plan III. The vote indicated all in favor of this plan with the single exception of the representative from Schenectady, who immediately moved to make its adoption unanimous.

The plan follows:

Selection of the rinks shall be made from clubs winning each district or sectional competition to be played prior to the date set for the Royal Caledonian Trophy. Districts to be made up as follows:

District 1. Utica, Schenectady, Saranac Lake.

District 2. Mahopac, Hartford, Ardsley, Caledonian, Farmington.

District 3. The Country Club, St. Andrews, Winchester, Boston C.C., Race-Brook.

Each club shall have the privilege of entering two rinks.

All matches to be played on artificial ice.

An entry fee of \$4.00 per rink shall be paid to the Secretary of the club upon whose ice the matches are played, and he in turn shall remit this money to the Secretary-Treasurer of the G.N.C.C.

District Medals will be awarded to members of the winning rinks in each district.

It is the recommendation of the Committee that this plan be tried for one year, and thereafter if found to be conducive to the best interests of the organization.

MEDALS

A detailed written report, submitted by Mr. S. S. Curran of Utica at the request of the President, indicated that several bars on the G.N.C.C. medals are missing, and that the cost of bringing them up to date, exclusive of any deficiencies that may be found on the Patterson Medal and the Smith Cup, which were not examined, would be \$167.00.

The Committee agreed that it is of great import to have the records on these medals as accurate and complete as possible, and authorized the President to proceed with the work, as outlined in Mr. Curran's report.

A resolution designed to provide individual medals to members of winning rinks in all G.N.C.C. contests met with unanimous support. To defray the resultant expense, the Committee passed to charge a small fee of \$1.00 per person for all entries in bonspiels conducted under the auspices of the G.N.C.C. These fees to be paid to the Secretary or Treasurer of the host club, who shall in turn remit the same to the Secretary-Treasurer of the G.N.C.C.

With this additional revenue, the G.N.C.C. will also assume the cost of placing bars on each medal, said bar to have the names of the winning club and the date inscribed on the face, and the names of the winning rink on the reverse side.

This program to become effective during the season 1940-1941.

The Committee does not expect that sufficient funds will be available during the first year to permit the fulfillment of the entire program, but as much will be done as can be afforded, and the remainder completed the following year.

Any member of a winning rink prior to the aforementioned date may purchase a medal by making proper application in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer.

THE DOUGLAS AND GRIFFITH MEDALS

The President expressed his great desire for the return of these medals to the fold of the G.N.C.C., and asked the representative from St. Andrews if his club would consider such a move, provided that the same privileges which they now enjoy in regard to extending invitations would be allowed. Mr. Arndt ventured an

opinion that, with such an assurance, the St. Andrews Golf Club would be glad to return the medals. The Committee thereupon agreed to extend this privilege to the St. Andrews Club, with the understanding that invitations be confined to clubs who are affiliated with some recognized curling association. Mr. Arndt was asked to convey to his club the Committee's cordial invitation to return these medals once again to the G.N.C.C.

INTERNATIONAL - GORDON MEDAL.

The Committee expressed its approval of the recent method of selecting rinks to represent the G.N.C.C. in this contest, and recommended that the same procedure be followed this year.

CONSOLATION TROPHIES

During a discussion arising over the need for consolation matches for first round losers in the Allen Medal at Utica and the Gordon and Emmett Medals at Schenectady, Mr. Patterson stated that The Country Club would gladly change the deed of gift applying to The Country Club Cup to allow for its use as a consolation trophy in both the Mitchell and Allen contests. The Committee voted to accept Mr. Patterson's suggestion, with thanks.

Mr. Ferguson promised to see what can be done towards providing a similar trophy for the matches in Schenectady.

SCHEDULE.

The Committee unanimously endorsed the present plan of scheduling our bonspiels on weekends, but recommended to the Schedule Committee that it give consideration to the advisability of having an interval of two weeks between each contest.

JUNIOR (ROUC) BONSPIEL

The report of the Chairman of the Junior Bonspiel Committee, Mr. Richard P. Hallowell, 2nd, indicated that the experimental event held at The Country Club January 27-28, 1940, was quite successful, and recommended a permanent place for it in the annual schedule of the G.N.C.C. The report was accepted as read.

It was pointed out that Mr. Andrew Dykes of New York City had, on a previous occasion, signified his willingness to present to the G.N.C.C. a trophy in memory of his late father, Mr. Frank Dykes, who served for many years as Secretary of the G.N.C.C. The Committee instructed the officers to contact Mr. Dykes with the purpose of accepting the trophy for this particular contest. It shall be called The Frank Dykes Trophy, and play shall be limited to those not actively engaged in curling for other G.N.C.C. trophies. It was further recommended that the qualifying regulations be not too stringent.

Mr. Lucius Hill, a member of The Country Club, very generously offered to present a suitable consolation trophy for this contest. It was passed unanimously to accept Mr. Hill's offer, with the Committee's grateful appreciation of his kindness and thoughtfulness.

THE ANNUAL

It was passed to approve the action of the officers in their decision to print another edition of the Annual, which has not appeared since 1931. The approximate cost was reported to be about \$150.00.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

A Committee consisting of Mr. C. Campbell Patterson, Jr. and Mr. Franklin King, appointed by the President to suggest necessary changes to the Constitution prior to the printing of the new Annual, submitted its report in writing, and the same was approved in whole, subject to their later acceptance at the Annual Meeting.

CHANGES TO RULES.

A written report of the Committee appointed by the President, consisting of Mr. R. D. Thompson, Mr. John Young, and Mr. T. P. Eldred, Jr., to recommend necessary changes to the rules of the game, and also rules for medal plays, was read and approved, subject to their later acceptance at the Annual Meeting.

NEW MEMBERS.

The Secretary reported that applications for membership were received from the Albany Curling Club and the Nashua Country Club. Both applications were accepted, subject to ratification at the Annual Meeting.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned.
