Dear Curler:

The Ardsley Curling Club is going to open its twelfth successful year any day now. I thought you'd be interested to have a preview of the coming season.

There will be ice at St. Andrews on the weekend of November 27th.

Ardsley will again have the exclusive privilege of the entire rink for one night a week. Weekends will be reserved for scheduled matches, and we are hopeful that there will be one sheet of ice both Saturday and Sunday afternoons for the Ardsley curlers.

We are enclosing a card which will give us two important bits of information . Please check this and drop it in the mail to Cuyler Stevens when you finish reading this letter.

Question #1 concerns our regular Curling Night. St. Andrews will give us our choice; for years it has been Tuesday nights, last year we changed it to Wednesday. So check the night you prefer and be sure to note it, if there is any night which is impossible for you as a regular curling evening.

Also tell us on the card the names of likely curling prospects. We will be able to take on about a dozen new men this year. We should be unselfish and let some of our friends know the fun of curling. We intend to send the new man an invitation in the name of the man who sponsors him, and we hope that you can bring him over yourself the first night of curling. In that connection, we intend to have a preliminary curling session on November 30th or December 1st to introduce the new curlers to the game. There will be a talk which will attempt to give the new men some basic information about the game before they ever throw a stone or try to follow a skip's vague broomsignal. The Curling Committee feels that this will shorten the learning period of the new men and greatly increase their enjoyment of the sport.

Naturally we'll want the old-timers to show up on this opening night. They'll get a bit of curling but, more important, they can work with the new members in answering their questions and showing them a few tricks of the trade.

Regarding dues, this depends chiefly on the new men we sign up. I am certain that the dues won't be more than \$25.00 plus tax.

I have appointed Albert Shaw Jr. as chairman of the Curling Cormittee, and I can promise you one thing about the 1943-44 season — there is going to be plenty of active competition for everyone, and every man who wants to go on an out-of-town trip will be encouraged to do so.

The annual Opening Dinner will be held on December 7th or 8th at St. Andrews.

Here's hoping all your stones are lying stones and that the Ardsley Curling Club has the most successful and active season ever! Hope to see you opening night -

Serious curling is under way with the Wilds matches having completed the second round. The Utica-Playland Bonspiel starts Friday night and continues through the week-end. Ardsley has three rinks in this competition. Teams will probably be announced the middle of the week. Eddison, Hastings and Meile are the Ardsley skips.

Ad Hastings is working out an idea on his Wilds rink which we heartily recommend to the other skips. Ad is making up a schedule of the men who will curl with him in each of the matches and notice will go out to the participants in plenty of time so that the newer curlers will know in advance when Ad expects them to curl with him. This also guarantees that everyone on Ad's roster gets a chance to curl in competition during this season.

Nothing else to report except that the new curlers are coming along nicely and we hope that they will all decide to join us for the full season. Curling will start Tuesday night just as soon as there are enough men there to make up two rinks. In other words, be on the ice at eight o'clock sharp so that we can have a full evening of it.

The game was explained to them by a couple of Monday morning quarterbacks — and three-man rinks were made up, skipped by Hastings, Fiske, Shaw and Stevens. On the center ice, Dick Heiley's team nosed out the Consolidated Eddisons 18 - 6. (The boys ought to learn to kick those points-aftertouchdown.)

Wilds Cup Matches start on Sunday, with Ardsley having three rinks entered in the competition. The skips for this series are Eddison, Hastings and Neiley; they face three St. Andrews' teams on Sunday.

At this point, we should call your attention to the fact that Ardsley had two rinks entered in the Gordon International Matches at Montreal last March. Barton Eddison's rink ran into some tough opposition and were beaten by two Thistle teams. We are proud to state that Hastings' Royal International Punks made the best record of any U. S. team, knocking off the Montreal Caledonians and the Three Rivers Curling Club by identical scores of 16 - 8.

Al Shaw, chairman of the Curling Committee, says that it's going to be their policy to make certain that everyone who deserves to go on a curling trip will get the chance for some outside competition. There are a number of fellows with several years of experience who have never made a trip. These men are going to be urged to enter out-of-town Bonspiels. You will have a chance to indicate your choice as soon as we have the Grand National schedule. Your Curling Committee is going to bring back some winning medals this year!

Ardsley's own competition, the Windeler Cup Matches, will start right after the holidays. Here are the teams and schedules:



We point with pride to the thirty men now on our membership list. This is our biggest active membership in a number of years, and your officers sincerely hope that everyone listed here will enjoy a pleasant season full of good curling.

It will be rather surprising if there are no errors on this list. If you find any mistake on your own name, I'd appreciate it if you'd give me a ring or drop me a postcard because some day you may get a chance to curl in the Royal Caledonian Matches, and if we have your name, address or phone number wrong, you'll have to stay at home.

Notes on Windeler Matches

Tonight - January 3rd - the first round of the Windeler competition begins.

Sherman Baker's name should be added to George William's rink. Please make this correction on your list.

The Curling Committee has established the following rules for this competition:-

- All matches will be played as scheduled. There will be no postponements - 3-man teams will play if necessary.
- 2. To even things up it has been decided that our three senior skips - Messrs. Hastings, Eddison and Neiley - cannot play #3 in these matches, although exception may be made tonight due to George William's illness.
- 3. All men shall have a chance to curl in at least two Windeler matches. Practically speaking, this means that the skips should make up a list beforehand of the team which they intend to put on the ice for each of the matches on the schedule. If a man is asked to curl, and cannot, an effort should be made to work him into subsequent matches so he still has an opportunity to participate in the two games he is entitled to.

George Williams says that the pain of his recent infection (a curling blister which really has him laid up) will be greatly eased by the receipt of more checks for the \$28.00 dues! Make them out to the Ardsley Curling Club and send them to River Glen, Hastings-on-Hudson, attention of George Williams.

New Brooms on Way

Dick Neiley has been in touch with some of his operatives across the border and has contracted for twenty new Canadian brooms. Dick personally guarantees these as being completely free from the falling-hair ailment which characterizes the present crop of St. Andrews' brooms. The price will be in the neighborhood of \$1.35 and you should place your order promptly. However, don't place it with me.

Ardsley will have three rinks entered in the Douglas Bonspiel scheduled for January 14-15-16. More details on this later.

The official Grand National schedule should have been in our hands last week. I hope to mail them out with the next letter, at which time I'll also give you a revised Wilds Cup line-up.

Another change relates to the prohibition on our senior skips to play #3. Since Jug Ogden has consented, to our great joy, to skip a team in the Douglas matches and since it doesn't make much difference anyhow — it's been decided that anybody can play #3. The only rule as to position is that Barton, Add, Dick Weiley and Jug cannot act as skips except by the most special dispensation, which your Curling Committee earnestly hopes will never have to be invoked.

Grand National Schedule

Unless things so absolutely haywire — the official schedule of the Grand Mational Curling Club of America will be enclosed with this week's letter. The Curling Committee will shortly ask each member if there are any out-of-town matches which he would like to attend. Even if you've only been curling for a few weeks, don't hesitate to let us know your preferences. It may not be possible to accommodate everyone's wishes but Alby Shaw says the Curling Committee will do its best to see that no man who wants to make a trip is prevented from doing so.

To the Grand National schedule should be added the Detroit Curling Club of America Bonspiel - which will be held the same week-end as the Gordon-Emmett-Mohawk Matches in Schenectady - February 11 and 12. Three games are guaranteed

to every rink: Russ Weston has some ideas about the Detroit trip which he will be glad to discuss at the drop of a hat.

Although this is not definitely assured, we expect there will be a photographer from <u>Pic Magazine</u> at the rink on Tuesday, January 18. I have told him that he should not interfere with the superlative curling of the Windeler matches so he will probably arrive early in order to get some work done before the serious curling starts.

Last Tuesday night the Windeler matches ran well beyond ll o'clock, which gummed up the games considerably, since two of the curlers had to leave to catch a New York train. This is not completely fair to the teams on which Jug Ogden, Charlie Townsend and Charlie Upjohn are playing. We strongly urge that all matches start promptly at 8 o'clock and your secretary recommends that the opposing skips agree on making any match 10 ends instead of ll if, as the match progresses, it becomes evident that its lateness will mean that any competitor has to leave the ice to get the ll:03.



So if you want to see the game played by experts, make it a point to see the matches Saturday (when there will also be evening matches) and Sunday, when the semi-finals are in the morning, and the finals in the afternoon.


Certain purists have pointed out that Eric Lagercrantz's and Stuart Peabody's names are on the list backwards. We can understand that there could possibly be somebody named Peabody Stuart, but Lagercrantz Eric is too good to believe. Incidentally, "Townsend C. C." does not refer to some new country club, but it is our way of writing Charlie's name.

The new curlers are missing a trick, by not coming around for Saturday and Sunday curling. We should like to explain how it works. Call the St. Andrews Club (the number is Hastings 674) and ask for Bob MacGregor. Bob always makes up a list of curlers who will be available for scrub matches on Saturday and Sunday. Ask Bob if he will add your name to the list. He will put you down and you will be assured of some curling. It is best to call as late as you can -- preferably between 1:30 and 2:00. This will give MacGregor a chance to tell you if there are only a few curlers or if he will have two complete rinks.

Most folks have the idea that it's hard to edge into the week-end curling at the club. This is not true. Line up a couple of friends, make your arrangements and go on over. You'll enjoy it.

Ardsley Rink Wins Archie-Douglas Medal

By beating John MacFarlans's Mahopac rink by 16 to 15 in the 17-end final on Sunday afternoon, Barton Eddison brought the Douglas medal to the Ardsley Curling Club. This team included Ed Euckett, vice skip, Al Shaw, number two, with Bill Gould leading.

This was a notable win for Barton on two counts: first, this is the only time that an Ardsley team has won the competition; moreover, in the entire history of the event, this marked the second occasion when it has been won by a rink from the New York district.

Barton started off by walloping Cary Harris of St. Andrews, 20 to 4; he eased up a bit, trimming Jim Spring's Boston team 13 to 6. The Ardsley crowd turned on the heat on Dick Hallowell's Country Club (Brookline) team, beating them 14 to 5.

Do not be misled by the closeness of the score. Barton had the match in the bag half way through the final end and although Mahopac got a fistful of counters to pull up to within one point of the Ardsley's total, Barton played the end ao it was impossible for MacFarlane to come up with a tie.

For the record, it should be stated that Jug Ogden's and Dick Neiley's rinks reached the quarter final. Jug had the unhappy experience of winning 9 ends to his opponent's 5 ends, losing 11 to 9 to Hallowell's Country Club team. Dick Neiley ran up against Mahopac in a particularly hot mood, losing 14 to 11.

Having won the Utica in December, Barton Eddison and Ed Luckett have pulled off the metropolitan district's "grand slam."

Al Shaw and Bill Gould joined the rink for the Douglas combination, taking the place of George Williams and Dunc Sutphen, who were on the winning Utica Cup competition. Al was his usual dependable self. Bill Gould in his first major Bonspiel poured them in like a veteran. Barton was particularly generous in giving a major share of the credit to Ed Luckett's consistently fine curling, and is is unnecessary to say that Barton's shot-making was magnificent.

When the Eddison team walked off the ice, having brought the Douglas medal to the Ardsley Club, it had particular significance to every single member of the Ardsley group. It was said more than once during the Bonspiel that Ardsley's curling this year has shown amazing improvement. We have enjoyed the hospitality of the

St. Andrews Club, too much to complain about Ardsley's being considered a St. Andrews satellite. This year we are definitely a club to beat in these major competitions. It is interesting to note that we have more curling members than the St. Andrews Club has. Competition makes greatness in any sport, and Ardsley should have no false modesty about our proud feeling that we are in the top shelf of curling. We now know that Ardsley will certainly win its full share of the Grand National matches from now on.

When interviewed after winning his match, Barton simply said "Duck Soup."

Foreign Correspondence

The following was slipped into your Secretary's mailbox by one of his agents:

Editor, Duck Soup

Sir:

Your correspondent has just completed a tour of inspection of the Canadian front, without laying a stone.

At the Granite Club in Toronto, (9 sheets of ice) a city tournament was on, and ice was crowded from 4 PM till midnight. The same was true at the other three Toronto clubs, and all the burgers who weren't at the hockey game were watching the curling. Your correspondent, therefore, sat behind the glass, with rubbers in lap, and criticized the skip's tactics.

There are two remarkable features about the Granite Club. First is that there are no private stones—er, that is, you understand, the club provides all curling stones, half black ivory handles, half white, and all curlers take whatever the local Jim Stanley sets out for them. Second feature: Buffalo beef in the grill——and good, too.

In Ottawa, your correspondent dropped in at the Rideau Club and also Ottawa Curling. Irons are used exclusively in both places. When the ice was clear, this reporter essayed a trial of these quaint old fashioned devices. He could barely lift, much less lay them. They weigh 50 odd pounds. Irons

move down the ice slower than granites, bend much more. Locals seem to enjoy them. They have only one complete layout of granites at Ottawa and members regard them as new-fangled novelties——somewhat as regular bowlers regard duck pins. For them the irons have come to stay.

Note to Trader Fiske and other swappers. Button situation in the Dominion is tighter than here---no exchanges.



Schedule for February 22: Shaw vs. Eddison, Hastings vs Ogden, Fiske vs Stevens

The Rules: All matches 10 ends, except for finals which will be 12 ends. Substitutes will be penalized as follows: 2 stones for using any of the seven skips, 1 stone for using any other curler. Exceptions: Neiley may substitute for Cluett and Ogden for Stevenson, without penalty, unless a skip is used as substitute (penalty 1 stone). All first match losers eligible for Consolation competition.

The skips are reponsible for their teams. If your full teams don't show up, you will be penalized, so check your team in advance. If you'll be a man short, get in touch with members of teams not scheduled for play. For example, Dick Neiley's team gets a first-round bye on Tuesday. These men are the logical substitutes, in case one of your men goes dead on you. Give them a ring and show up with a full team.
