(Maybe it was a case of too much Saturday night). In their first match they defeated a Seignory rink 11-9. Then they took the measure of another Seignory rink 14-4. But Sunday the bottom dropped out of the market as they lost to the Montreal Thistles 16-1.

Socially the trip was a great artistic success since the boys took along their wives. The Ardsleyites, or "Yardley Boys" as some of the Canadians called them,



Ardsley Number 3 skipped by Add Hastings managed to get into the finals of the Utica Cup Matches over the past weekend but was defeated by Buddy Arndt and his St. Andrews curlers by a score of 15-6.

In the first match, Hastings' rink defeated the Caledonian rink skipped by Willie Cu thbertson 12-10 and then they took care of Jock MacFarlane 10-8. They got into the finals by beating Ty Halsted's Mahopac rink 12-9, only to lose to St. Andrews.

Cuyler Stevens' rink lost to Jock MacFarlane 15-5 and then was defeated 19-6 by Willie Cuthbertson's "boys" in the Playland.

The third Ardsley rink (Eddie Fiske) beat McCullough's St. Andrews rink by 10-8 and then lost to Buddy Arndt 10-9. Jimmy Ingram's rink was the eventual winner of Playland.


But alertness and speed, all ye curlers take heed, Aren't all that's to be recommended, For the worker who will sweep with wim and with skill Is the one who is loudly commended.

# WILDS MATCHES GET UNDER WAY

The past weekend saw two full days of curling activity as the wilds Competition began. On Saturday in the inter-club rivalry between Ardsley and St. Andrews only 1 Ardsley rink came out on top as Hastings defeated McCullough 8 to 6. The scores of the other matches on that day were Arndt 8, Luckett 6; Carl 9, Stevens 4; Locke 13, Fiske 2.

On Sunday the 4 Ardsley rinks competed with Fiske taking Stevens 13 to 8, thanks largely to the excellent guarding of Howlett and Shaw. The second match between Luckett and Hastings proved to be a real thriller. The Hastings rink, trailing 8 to 4 after 8 ends scored a 5 end in the 9th to go ahead 9 to 8. In the tenth end, Luckett tied the score at 9 to 9, forcing an extra end. The decision had to wait until the final stone, which found Luckett's rock resting on the button about half an inch closer than Hastings. Add had the difficult job of trying to promote his lying rock against the opposition's and after about 5 minute's deliberation "let 'er fly." He missed by about an inch, and the match went to Luckett 10 to 9.


Matches are scheduled for St. Andrews January 17, 18 and 19.

# The 1947 Bonspiel Schedule

Your Curling Committee is anxious to get things lined up for a really successful season this year. So we're sending you all a summary of the 1947 Grand National Schedule with some comments on the various bonspiels which may help you decide the one, or ones, you'd like to attend.

First, a word of review of the method of picking all bonspiel rinks. This was outlined at the Fall Meeting, but will bear repetition.

It is through Ardsley's membership in the Grand National Curling Club of America that we participate in bonspiel competitions. Yet not all bonspiels are Grand National events. If that sounds confusing, let me explain.

Here are the Grand National events: The <u>Utica-Playland</u> (at St. Andrews); the <u>Douglas-Griffith</u> (at St. Andrews); the <u>Mitchell-Allen</u> (at <u>Utica</u>); the <u>Dykes</u> (Brookline, this year); the <u>Gordon-Emmett</u> (Schenectady); the <u>District Medal</u> (played in each of the three <u>districts simultaneously</u>).

Here are the non-Grand National events: The Stockton Invitation (Brookline); The Gordon International (U.S. vs Canada, played in each country alternately); The Lord Elgin Trophy (Montreal).

Now in recent years there has been no difficulty in getting teams for the non-Grand National events. The Gordon International and the Stockton have been well attended, yet, it has been years since we have had two teams at Schenectady. In the last six years we have not had three rinks at Utica, though three are invited each year. In other words, Ardsley has not been supporting the Grand National's own competitions.

So this year we shall take into account a curler's attendence at Grand National bonspiels in considering selections for the other competitions. The Committee shall still pick the strongest rink it can. But, if, for example, two men of comparative curling ability each want to make a Canadian trip, your Curling Committee will select the one who has represented Ardsley in out-of-town Grand National events, and pass up the man who has not.

As a matter of fact, despite the glamor of a Montreal trip, most of us have had more sheer fun in Utica and Schenectady. So don't sign up, thinking of it as an ordeal. You'll have a whale of a time:

Here's the line-up:

At UTICA, January 31, February 1st and 2nd - The Mitchell Medal and the Allen Memorial Medal, with The Country Club Cup as Consolation. (Ardsley has won the Mitchell once and the Allen twice.)

If you are thinking of budget matters, Utica is the perfect bonspiel, since the Utica Curling Club provides luncheon and dinner every day during the competition. You will stay at the Hotel Utica and have breakfast there, then go on out to the Curling Club for your other meals plus other lovely refreshments.

There are five sheets of ice at Utica and thereby lies a tale.

In past years the ice at Utica has been lousy. At the end of last curling season a curious Utican was browsing around the engine room at the curling club and saw a metal plate that was greese covered, but had some words printed on it. He got some waste, wiped it off, and read: "RETURN PIPE MUST ALWAYS BE FROSTED!" When queried, the rink master said, "Hell, no, that pipe had never been frosted." To make a long story short, it was discovered that the freezing plant had been operating since the memory of the oldest member on a too-lean diet of brine.

So Utica numbed a couple of thousand pounds of extra brine into thepipes and they have peachy ice now! Enter your name for Utica and find out for yourself.

We are invited to enter two rinks in the Mitchell and one in the Allen, so there is room for twelve deserving Ardsley curlers on this trip. We already have acceptances from Ad Hastings and Eddie Fiske who will skip teams in these Utica competitions.

At SCHENECTADY, February 14-16 - The Gordon Medal and the Emmett Medal, with the Mohawk Trophy as Consolation. (Ardsley has won the Emmett. We're ripe for the Gordon!)

At Schenectedy you stay at the Van Curler or the Mohawk Club and the Curling Club is within walking distance of both spots. This is the town where our ex-peerless leader, Whispering Fiske, was prevailed upon to say a few halting words over Station WGY at one o'clock of a very damp morning to a breathless world glued to their radio sets. Also, if you play your cards right, Stevens will introduce you to Boney Lydgate, Ardsley's pin-up. Messrs. Eddison, Luckett and Stevens have consented to skip in this bonspiel.

At THE COUNTRY CLUB, BROOKLINE, MASS., February 15-16 - The Dykes Trophy with the Brookline Trophy as Consolation. (Ardsley won the Brookline last year, has never won the Dykes.)

This is the famous Junior Bonspiel. It is expressly designed for the curlers who haven't been in the habit of making many trips. The skips are new at the position as far as bonspiel experience is concerned and if any of the old masters want to go along, they have to play #1.

However, notice that the Junior bonspiel this year is the same week end as the Schenectady Ponspiel. And we want to enter two teams at Schenectady, in each competition - two rinks of juniors at Brookline and two seniors.

So, put your name down for the Dykes, especially if you've never been on a trip before. You'll have a marvellous time!

At TFE COUNTRY CLUB, Brookline Mass., the Stockton Cup with the Clyde Park Cup as Consolation - February 28th to March 2.

This is a big bonspiel, an invitation affair by the Country Club. It needs absolutely no build-up for anyone who has been there or heard of it. This year it will be especially interesting, since we will curl for the first time in the new ourling rink built this year to replace the old one burned down last winter. The line forms all around the Curling Committee. Skips will be named later. Other Events - These are all so desirable that all that is necessary is for the Curling Committee to select the strongest possible rinks and tell the lucky gents that they've been elected. We simply assume that everybody wants to play in these competitions. They are:

District Medal - February 8-9 - At St. Andrews

Gordon International - March 13-14 - At Montreal

Elgin Trophy - March 20-22 - At Montreal

Douglas Medal Competition Ends in All-Ardsley Final with Eddison Rink Victorious

Put down Sunday, January 19th, as a Red Letter Day in the history of the Ardsley Curling Club. Not only did an Ardsley rink skipped by Barton Eddison capture the Douglas Medal but they met another Ardsley team, led by Addison Fastings, in the final. And to make the whole Benspiel even more memorable, the third Ardsley rink, skipped by Jug Ogden, managed to get as far as the quarter finals only to be eliminated by Barton Eddison.

The final match on Sunday afternoon was a real thriller and was witnessed by a large crowd of enthusiasts who followed each stone with eagle eyes. And it was that kind of a match, nip and tuck all the way, with Bart Eddison emerging victorious 14 - 10 in the 14 end match. Curling with Eddison were Sherman Baker at No. 1, Al Shaw, No. 2, and Ed Luckett No.3. Incidentally, this was Berton's second success in the Douglas, his first having been achieved in 1944. Addie Hastings, the runner-up, had Russ Weston at No. 1, Cuyler Stevens at 2, and Eddie Fiske at 3.

In only one way did the final on Sunday differ from a Madison Square basketball double-header. Alvin Paris wasn't around to quote odds,

The Griffith Medal Consolation went to Jimmie Ingram and his St. Andrews No. 1 rink which defeated Schenectady 16 - 12.

The Curling Committee is now working on the makeup of rinks for future bonspiels. Please be sure to tell them which particular trips you want to make.

However, the Windeler competition began on Tuesday night and brought on some unusual curling, not the least of which was the 21 to 6 trimming that Luckett gave to Eddison in 10 ends. Curling with Luckett were Kaiser-Fraser-Campbell, Gould and Shaw. Berton had Stevenson, Valentine and Wells.

In the other two matches Hastings (with Sutphen, Baker and Townsend) took the measure of Fiske (Howlett, Koshl and Pickard) 10 to 7, while Jug Ogden skipped his team of Gish, Robinson and Rumpf to victory over Cuyler the Curler, Graaskamp, Sothern and Weston, 15 to 5.

Next Tuesday, February 4th, the matches will bring together Hastings vs. Luckett, Tiske vs. Stevens, and Eddison vs. Ogden. Pemember, every member of each rink must ourl in at least two matches to avoid defaulting.

# INTER-CLUB MATCHES FEBRUARY 12th

The Curling Committee announces that St. Andrews has accepted our invitation for a competition on Wednesday, February 12th, between six teams from Ardsley and six from St. Andrews. Selection of the six Ardsley rinks will be determined on the basis of the Windeler teams, so skips should bear this in mind and keep February 12th open.

The winning club will be decided on a total points basis, and winners' buttons will be given to the rink which contributes the greatest winning margin to the winning club. More details later!

In the Wilds matches last Saturday, January 25th, Ardsley rinks broke even in the inteclub competition with Fiske downing McCullough 8 to 4, and Stevens taking over Locke 11 to 4. However, Luckett, whose curling has been exceptionally good, was the victim of a St. Andrews rink skipped by Henry Kelley (he's the St. Andrews silent leader), by a score of 13 to 1, and Arndt topped Hastings 18 to 3. Those last 2 are referred to as "neck and neck" races in sporting circles.

On Sunday Fiske beat Luckett 14 to 7 and Hastings downed Stevens 12 to 6.

## UTICA, TAKE IT AWAY

In the Bonspiel at Utica over the past weekend, three Utica rinks froze out the opposition by winning the finals in the Allen Medal, the Mitchell Medal and the Country Club cup matches.

The Ardsley No. 1 rink ekipped by Cuyler Stevens was eliminated in the first round of the Allen by the Utica No. 1 rink 12 to 9. In the Mitchell Medal, the Utica No. 2 rink (eventual winner) put out Ardsley No. 1 skipped by Hastings, 12 to 11. This match was a close one all the way, with Ardsley leading by 2 stones going into the 14th and last end. However, Ward Murray, on his last stone, made a masterful shot to score three and come out on top. It was a heartbreaker to lose, especially since the Utica rink coasted through the rost of its matches.

Fiske's Ardsley rink was eliminated in the first round of the Mitchell by Schenectady No. 1, 14 to 5.

## HINTS FOR CURLERS

There are several rules of etiquette, and of the game itself, which are being violated. There has been a bit of comment on each of these points, and we should be careful about our ice manners.


Point #1 is: Don't cross the ice when the curler has taken his stance. It is extremely disconcerting to the curler. If you are on the wrong side of the ice, and the curler is in the hack, the best thing to do is stand motionless until he has delivered the stone, then cross quickly to your position.

Be ready for your turn. When your preceding team-mate has made his shot, and you have swept it down the ice, return to the other end and be ready to curl as soon as your opponent's stone has come to rest.

Stay out of the house, unless you are the skip, or vice-skip. Don't stand behind the opposing skip until the stone has been delivered. When the end has been completed, wait for the vice-skips to agree on the score and to measure any disputed stones, before moving stones in the scoring circle.

The Windeler schedule for next Tuesday, brings Hastings against Stevens, Eddison against Fiske, and Luckett meets Ogden.




