ANNOUNCEMENT OF FALL MEETING

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 3

The annual fall meeting of the Ardsley Curling Club will be held on Wednesday, November 3 — the day after election day — at Cuyler Stevens apartment, #16-E, Hastings House.

The first order of business will be the election of a new Vice President. Victor Hockmeyer has reluctantly tendered his resignation as Vice President, and it will be necessary to elect a new man to this position. A nominating committee has been named, consisting of Hockmeyer (chairman), Fiske, Shaw.

This will also be the occasion for the election of new members, if there are any vacancies in the Club. A membership committee of Sothern, chairman, Gish, Warner, has been appointed. If you have any nominees for new members, applications should be sent in the usual fashion to Harold Sothern, as chairman.

Due to the fact that the Club usually has very few openings, it is well not to discuss this matter with a prospective member in a manner that would leave him to believe that the Club has many openings. It is unfortunately true that our membership has been amazingly stable in recent years, and this means we cannot take in as many men as we could before the war.

However, send Harold the applications of any men who you feel would make good additions to our group. If there are other openings, we want to make sure that we fill them with the most sterling characters in the community.

The meeting will begin shortly after eight o'clock. Park your cars on Broadway. Come down over the terrace, and the Stevens apartment is the first entry on your left at the bottom of the terrace steps, second floor, turn right, and walk in.

ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB

The regular Full meeting of the Ardsley Curling Club as called for in the by-laws was held on November 3rd, 1948. The meeting was called to order by the President at 8:40 P.M.

Mr. Hockmeyer resigned as Vice-President of the Club and his resignation was accepted with regret. Mr. Hockmeyer as Chairman of the Nominating Committee proposed Mr. Ed. Luckett to be elected as Vice-President and further suggested that a President serve for one year only. On a motion duly made by Mr. Hastings, seconded by Mr. Ogden and carried, Secretary is to cast one ballot electing Mr. Luckett as Vice-President. It was moved by Mr. Warner, seconded by Mr. Bickford that a President serve for one year and cannot succeed himself.

Mr. Sothern, chairman of the Membership Committee read present list of curlers and announced resignations of Mr. Gould and Mr. Rice which was accepted with regret. It was moved and carried that Mr. Sutphen be returned to active membership and Mr. Townsend be made honorary member with full privileges. It was moved by Mr. Hastings and seconded by Mr. Fiske that membership this year be thirty-three including Jim Stevenson.

It was moved by Mr. Warner and seconded by Mr. Sothern re proceedure of new members, officers, dues and charges, etc. to be as follows:

Officers - "The President shall be elected each year and cannot succeed himself. The other officers shall be elected each year and cannot serve more than two (2) consecutive terms."

Dues and Charges - Omit paragraph three referring to submission of check by new members.

New Members - "Prior to the fall meeting, the chairman of the membership committee shall request nominations for membership. The membership committee shall meet each of the new members and shall present to the annual fall meeting the list of proposed new members, together with the committee's recommendations.

"If vacancies exist in the active membership after the number of the members for the ensuing year has been established, the names of all applicants shall be placed on a ballot and each active member shall vote for a number of applicants equal to the number of vacancies existing. The ballots shall be counted by the Membership Committee and all applicants shall then be listed according to the number of votes cast for each applicant. The applicants having the largest number of votes not to exceed the number of vacancies shall be declared active members and shall be so notified by the Secretary of the Club. If for any reason an applicant does not accept membership in the Club, the entire list is moved down one place, and the next ranking applicant shall be declared an active member.

"If vacancies subsequently exist, the above proceedure must again be followed, since the Club has no waiting list."

It was announced that the Secretary will notify the Dobbs Ferry Bank that Mr. John H. Valentine is the new treasurer of the Club and ask them to send signature card to him.

The Chairman of the Membership Committee announced the following three people were elected new members: Messrs. Carl Von Bernuth, Al Staley, & Hugh Leighton:

Mr. Hastings reported re the trip of the various curlers that are to arrive from Scotland: It was moved by Mr. Hockmeyer, seconded by Mr. Fiske that Glub guarantee \$125. to the cost of the Scots and bill each member who curls against them pro-rata for said \$125.

Mr. Fiske reported re Iceless Bonspiel and it was moved and carried to thank the President for holding the meeting at his house and for refreshments served therein:


CURLING AND OPENING DINNER GREAT SUCCESS!

INGRAM MURDERS ARDSLEY!

Takes Utica Cup with Ease

This is the week when everything is shut down for repairs. The #l sheet of ice was shut down Tuesday night to repair a leak in the pipes. Your secretary is busy repairing the membership list, of which a new and complete version is attached. Three Ardsley teams are repairing the extensive damage inflicted by Jimmy Ingram.

In the Utica-Archbald honspiel Jimmy personally took care of all of the Ardsley rinks.

Ardsley's #1 team of Hastings, Weston, Sothern and May spent all of the time playing St. Andrews. They first knocked off Buddy Arndt by 10 - 4, and took Ted Hahn 17-5 and kicked both points after touchdown to beat Pitt Carl 14-10. In the final round Ingram won the Playland Cup by beating Addie's boys 20-3.

The #2 rink of Fiske, Sutphen, Gish, Wells beat Hartford 23-9, only to find Mr. Ingram holding a gun on them in the second round, before they went down to defeat by 15-10.

The #3 rink of Stevens, Shaw, Baker, Thorndyke, had the honor of meeting Ingram in his first match, and were knocked off by 18 to 11. With Frank Pickard substituting for Ashley. they trimmed Willy Cuthbertson 18-10, beating Hartford 16-5, and due largely to their skip's failure to lay guards on the correct side of the hog line, lost to Ty Halsted of Caledonia in the finals by 13-12..... the finals of the Archbald, that is.

In a very odd match on the center ice, Shaw, Thorndyke, Lanigan and Weston beat Wells, Fiske and Von Bernuth by scoring one point in each of the first six ends, losing one in the 7th, getting two back in the 8th, and one in each of the last two ends, to coast in an easy winner. Walt Howlett's three-man team with Hastings and Van Alstyne went three rocks up in the first end and held their lead to beat Gish, Stevens, Pickard and Staley by 10-6. Ward Van Alstyne never curled better.

The schedule for December 21 has Sutphen vs. Hockmeyer, Howlett vs. Shaw, and there will be a free sheet of ice for scrub matches.

Ardsley's reputation for enthusiasm and good curling attendance does not look too good so far this year, since two teams on Tuesday night were curling with only three men. If you haven't got a match scheduled for Tuesday, come around and we will arrange a good scrub competition.

NEW LINE-UP FOR WILDS

St. Andrews has felt for some time that the Wilds competition has a tendency to drag on into the tail end of the season, and the curling committee took some action on it last week. The old schedule has been cancelled and any matches which have been played are washed out. The new schedule is designed to complete the Wilds early in February.

Teams are divided into Red and Blue. The Reds play a round robin, the Blues do the same. Then the top three Reds play a round robin and the top three Blues play off. Then the winning Red and the winning Blue teams play a best two out of three.

The group whom we will meet are travelling through Eastern Canada with a swing down through the three Grand National Districts.

They will be at The Country Club at Brookline on Monday,

January 10. They will arrive by sleeper in New York on Tuesday morning.

After breakfast at the Biltmore, they will be given a police escort

from New York right out to St. Andrews.

At the conclusion of the day's curling, there will be a dinner in honor of our Scottish guests. Attendance at this dinner will be limited as explained in letters which have already been sent out by the various clubs in the District.

As you are aware, no traveller leaving Britain is permitted to carry more than a nominal amount of currency. Thus, it has been necessary for this trip to be financed - the U. S. part of it - by the Grand National and by the member clubs. This also means that much as they would like to, these Scotsmen cannot even buy any of us a drink. In order to take care of this side of our entertainment, the committee in charge of arrangements will turn over to each Scotsman a supply of bar checks good upon presentation at the St. Andrews bar. Thus it will not be necessary for the host curlers to sign for any drinks for the visitors. If you are getting a round of drinks, simply ask if you may have a drink check from each man and present this at the bar.

We hope that during the competitions there will be plenty of visitors in the gallery. Curlers families and friends are urged to attend. It should be very colorful - probably the most interesting day of curling that has ever been held at St. Andrews.





HIGH-WATER MARK OF ARDSLEY CURLING

Hastings, Fiske, Weston and Shaw Reach Final of Royal Caledonian

Addie Hastings' winning District Medal rink carried Ardsley's colors further than they have ever gone in the Royal Caledonian competition last weekend, reaching the final of curling's World Series, where they were beaten in a tense match on Friday evening by the St. George Curling Club of Montreal.

Harold Sothern was unable to make the trip, and Al Shaw substituted at lead. He, Russ, Eddie and Addison wasted little time with the Ottawa Curling Club, their first round opponents, bumping them out of the competition by a comfortable 12-4 margin.

In the second round Ardsley defeated Aubrey by 13-11. If you are inclined to laugh off Aubrey as a small-time curling club, do not. This rink was fresh from winning the Governor General's Trophy. But Ardsley's boys evidently hadn't read the clippings, and they came out on top in a tight match.

St. George qualified two teams for the Caledonian competition, and Ardsley met the tournament favorites on Friday morning. With the score tied at ten all in the last end, Ardsley scored the winning shot without the necessity of Addie's playing his last stone. The score was 11-10.

It was St. George again in the finals on Friday evening. Trailing by 2 on the 10th, Ardsley lay four when Skip Ken Gebbie played a beautiful draw shot through a port to lie the shot, and Gebbie stayed on top to win by 19-10.

As a consequence, of this terrific showing in the Grand National season's finale, Messrs, Hastings, Fiske, Weston and Shaw now wear the second place gold medal, and we couldn't be prouder of them.

NO LET-UP IN GORDON INTERNATIONAL

Though the United States lost the Gordon International Medal Competition by a thirty-point margin, Ardsley gave the Americans a plus margin.

Curling their 5th and 6th matches in three days, the Ardsley

rink went back on the ice and succumbed to Beauhanois 8-12 in the morning match, but came back in the afternoon and beat Van Kleek Hill by 19-5, which gave our boys a contribution of plus 10 to the American side.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

This terrific showing capped Addison Hastings' best competitive curling year. He skipped the winning District team, went to the finals of the Royal Caledonian, won the Windeler, won the Wilds, and wears the tiny medal which symbolizes the Ardsley Cup winning rink. He was also a finalist in the Utica Cup.

Further honors were added to brother Hastings' brow when he was elected President of the Grand National, with Whispering Fiske as his Secretary-Treasurer.

Competitively, Ardsley's only other medal was the Mohawk, won by Staley, May, Sutphen and Stevens. Ardsley teams reached the finals in the Utica Cup, the Archibald (we were all saddened to read of Tom Archibald's death a few weeks ago), the Dykes Consolation, the Stockton, and the Douglas.

One star in Ardsley's crown was Eddie Fiske's win against the Scotchmen, the only win of the District. Notable, also, was the completely unbelievable comeback of the teams of Ardsleyites Fiske, Hastings and Weston in the Ardsley Cup Competition with St. Andrews, where they were presented with a hopeless deficit from the morning matches, but overcame it to win by a comfortable margin.

So you can see that the events of the last weekend changed Ardsley's season from slightly above average to high success.

A word about Bud Baker's new novel "Bradford Masters". I finished it last night, and greatly enjoyed it. Bud knows what he wants to say and says it in even better fashion than last year's curling letters. I hope that each of Bud's curling friends can find time to stop off at the nearest book store and plunk down \$2.75, plus tax. It is a fine book. The last few chapters move at a terrific pace.

MR. LUCKETT REGRETS

It.wss a source of real regret to all of us when Eddie Luckett decided that he could not follow his succession from Vice President this year to President next year.

Bill May has come in for his full share of kidding for the telegraphic style of Duck Soup and his plural subjects and singular verbs. However, this was a job which Bill undertook for the single reason that he is a good soldier. We know that he was not anxious for the assignment, but nevertheless he never missed an issue of Duck Soup. He took care to record every happening in Ardsley curling and did his most conscientious job, for which he has my fullest personal thanks and those of the Club.

Jack Valentine's efficient handling of the thankless job of Treasurer has not been helped by some of St. Andrew's new bookkeeping methods. Jack has handled this work most efficiently, and passes along to his successor a well-kept set of books. Thanks, Jack.

Al Shaw was happy to act as chairman of any difficult committee assignment and handled both nominations and curling committee jobs.

As curling chairman, Al handled things with a complete lack of trouble to the president. We had good representation in every bonspiel except Utica. Al handled the assignment as if it were not a great deal of trouble, but this was just his experienced touch on a tough mission. Al rounded out his season's assignments by picking a splendid slate of officers for the 1949-50 season. He was foresighted enough to select men who would not be there at the final dinner, except for Harold Sothern, our new Vice President.

Bill Gish, our new Treesurer, will unquestionably be able to invest our funds so as to double the treesury before the year is over.

Secretary Granskamp probably hasn't yet recovered from the shock of his election, but the grapevine tells us that he will be an extremely articulate scribe.

To Russ Weston, our new President, I can only say that I hope the 1949-50 season will shine as brightly as his new gold Caledonian medal. As far as I am concerned, my two years as President have been a great deal of fun. Thanks to everyone who helped make it so.
