THE ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB

Minutes of opening meeting - November 21, 1950

The opening meeting of the 1950-51 season was held at the home of President Weston on Tuesday evening, November 21st, with twenty members in attendance.

The mimutes of the last meeting were approved.

President Weston gave a report on the annual meeting of the Grand National, included in which was the invitation from the Scottish Curlers for the visit of American rinks in 1952.

Mr. Gish gave the report of the treasurer indicating a balance of \$419.00.

Mr. Allan C. Staley, Jr., having resigned as Secretary due to his removal to San Francisco it was necessary to elect a replacement. Mr. Duncan Sutphen was the unanimous choice.

Mr. George Ogden who has transferred his residence to Utica was elected a life member of the Club.

As an introduction to his report on his negotiations with St. Andrews, President Weston gave the results of an analysis he had made of the 1949-50 curling season. This indicated that with 35 active members, the St. Andrews record books show Ardsley participation in 518 matches, or an average of 14.8 matches per member.

He then outlined his discussion with the St. Andrews curling chairman, Mr. Carll, which indicated that St. Andrews was prepared to offer us the use of their facilities one night per week during the curling season for a fee of \$500.00 per sheet, plus tax of 20%. The same proposal has been made to Caledonia and, it is assumed to Mahopac. Mr. Weston had no indication as to Mahopac's reaction but it was indicated that Caledonia felt that the St. Andrews proposal was not satisfactory.

The following motion was unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED: that Russell B. Weston and Harold Sothern, as president and vice president of the Ardsley Curling Club attempt to set up a meeting with Henry Kelly, president and Pit Carll, curling chairman and such other St. Andrews members as these gentlemen might select, together with representatives of the Caledonia Curling Club and the Mahopac Curling Club to discuss the unsatisfactory features of the guest clubs relations with St. Andrews, excluding the matter of finance.

It was also unanimously:

RESOLVED: that the active membership of the Club for the 1950-51 season should be limited to 32 members, each of whom would be assessed \$60.00 for curling fees and \$5.00 for incidentals.

It was also agreed that the opening dinner would be held at the Ardsley Club at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, November 29th and that the president would invite such members of sister clubs as he desired.

Following traditional refreshments, the meeting adjourned

RULES GOVERNING PLAY IN THE INTER-CLUB MATCHES FOR THE WILDS MEDAL 1950 - 1951

- 1. Matches shall be played according to schedule except that if justifiable circumstances necessitate a postponement the Match shall be played as soon as possible.
- 2. The Sponsor Club identification of the Rinks entered in this competition, together with the names of the Skips and all members assigned to the various Rinks shall be filed with the St. Andrews Curling Committee.
- 3. In order to carry out the purpose and spirit of this competition it is urged that all players listed as a member of a particular Rink be given an opportunity to play in as many Matches as possible.
- 4. Changes in the designated team positions are permissible.
- 5. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one Match. If only one substitute is used that substitute must play <u>Lead</u>. If two substitutes are used they must play <u>Lead</u> and <u>Number Two</u> respectively.
- 6. Rinks will be penalized ONE point and ONE end if not on the ice and ready to play within 10 minutes of the time scheduled. An additional point and end will be added to the penalty for each succeeding 5 minutes tardiness.
 - (NOTE: This penalty is imposed by the Curling Committee and MAY NOT BE WAIVED by mutual consent of the Skips.)
- 7. The Rink winning the greatest number of Matches will receive FOUR Wilds Medals. In the event of a tie between two or more Rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-off."
- 8. Each Match to consist of 12 Ends.

RULES GOVERNING CHALLENGES AND PLAY FOR THE KIMBEL CHALLENGE PLAQUE 1950 - 1951

- 1. Holders of the Kimbel Challenge Plaque must stand ready for challenge on Saturday afternoon December 23, 1950, and every Sunday or Saturday as specified during the 1950 1951 Curling Season.
- 2. All challenges stating the make up of the Rink i.e., Skip, Vice Skip, Number Two, Lead and Alternate must be entered on the Kimbel Challenge Card, opposite the date on which they will be ready to play against the then Defending Rink.
- 3. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one Match. If only one substitute is used that substitute must play <u>Lead</u>. If two substitutes are used they must play <u>Lead</u> and <u>Number Two</u> respectively.
- 4. Anyone taking part in the 1950 1951 competition as either Skip or Vice Skip shall thereafter be limited to playing Number Two or Lead in the make up of any other Challenging Rink.
- 5. Postponement of a Match is <u>not</u> permitted unless unfavorable ice conditions prevail.
- 6. In the event the Defending Rink does not appear on the scheduled date the Match <u>must</u> be defaulted to the challenger the challenger receives credit for a Match won.
- 7. In the event the Challenging Rink does not appear on the scheduled date the Defender receives credit for a Match won.
- 8. The Rink winning the greatest number of Matches will receive FOUR Kimbel Medals. In the event of a tie between two or more Rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-off."
- 9. Each Match to consist of 14 Ends.

There is an inflexible rule, which no Skip may waive, that if any rink is over ten minutes late, such rink is automatically to be given a benalty of one point and one end and for every five minutes additional delay such rink receives a further penalty of one point and one end.

Kimbel Challenge Matches. The rules for the Kimbel Challenge Matches have been changed somewhat from last year. Cuyler Stevens' rink is the one to be challenged. Any rink may challenge. A rink challenging must post on the bulletin board at St. Andrews the names of their four regular curlers and one alternate. Such rink also may have two substitutes, but such substitutes do not have to benamed. No Mimbel match may be postponed, only defaulted. With seven curlers available, however, there should be no reason for a default.

POINT COMPETITION. Ye honorable and young member of curling.
Philip Weld, feeling we are missing a lot of
fun by not having a point tournament, has graciously denated an
elegant cigarette lighter with a special St. Andrews cross on it
for a tournament. Phil has written to Russ Weston as follows:

"I will donate a prize to the individual who makes the pest score in the point game for each of the following months -- January, February and March. The prize is a cigarette lighter with a St. Andrew's cross on it. These are the rules under which the competition is to be played:

- Any two players who are regular members of St. Andrew's, Ardsley, New York Caledonian and Mahopac Curling Clubs, hand in their scores just as they would in a golf game.
- Method of play -- the two players use the same pair of stones; three stones at each end of the rink to be used as markers. Each player curls from one end of the rink throughout each game. It is permissible for the curler to ask his opponent to give him the broom.

On each point the player plays one stone with an in turn and one with an out turn, in whichever order he pleases.

There is a diagram at the Club which illustrates the shots to be played. There are 10 shots in this diagram - #6 Wick and Curl In, and #10 Out-Wicking, are not included in this competition. The rules printed on the diagram are to be followed, although they are somewhat different from the Grand National Rules. The shots to be played are:

- 1. Striking
- 2. In-Wicking
- 3. Drawing
- 4. Guarding
- 5. Chap and Lie 7. Raising

- 8. Chipping the Winner 9. Drawing Through a Port

This diagram is a little confusing in that it speaks of a 4 foot and 7 foot circle. For the purpose of this competition, the 4 foot circle will be anything in the outer white ring, and the 7 foot circle will be anything in the outer blue ring. The maximum score possible in this game is 32 points. Later in the season it may be wise to include point 6 (Wick and Curl In) and point 10 (Out-Wicking). No sweeping permitted.


