Last Saturday, December 6th, an Ardsley rink Wilds team defaulted to its opponents who were waiting on the ice at St. Andrews and who had not been given previous notice. Your editor doesn't know who is responsible for this lamentable lack of common Curling courtesy. It did occur, however, and caused a great deal of embarrassment and unfavorable comment, chiefly from Ardsley Curlers who were rather ashamed their club had been involved.

I know of three cases where this has happened in recent years and Ardsley has been the offender in every one of them and the circumstances were identical — nobody showed up, opponents were not notified.

With our larger membership the Skips have two very definite duties. The first is to have a team ready to play each match and the second is to make certain that the rink has been lined up ahead of time with every man on the squad knowing whether or not he is expected to Curl. Of course, this applies to any competition whether Wilds, Blanton or Windeler.

In a match that ended shortly before dawn Bill May defeated Chuck Stewart in an extra end 11 to 10 on a shot that went from the hog line to the button. Your secretary then went home and collapsed in bed and can tell you nothing about the other matches. Thus, the finalists are May vs Warner in the main event and Weston vs Hockmeyer-Robinson winner in the consolation.

There will be a scrub match on the other sheet. If you would like to curl, give me a ring and I will try to line up two sterling rinks.

There seems to be a slight misunderstanding about tossing brooms to see who leads. The custom is that your opponent leads unless he is able to get a firm enough grip on the broom to enable him to swing it <u>forward</u> over his head without losing hold. It is not enough to be able to give the broom a side-wise heave and get it over your shoulder before you drop it.

On the further subject of brooms, we wonder why so many intelligent men lay a nice broom on the ice and then put a 40 lb. rock on top of it and give it a twist to get the dirt off the bottom of the stone. We have very splendid mats which do the job much better, it doesn't tear the brooms to pieces and it does not deposit a collection of dirt directly in front of the tee.

Now is the time to be thinking about the up-coming bonspiels. Any day now Vic Hockmeyer's Curling Committee will be checking with you to see which trips you would like to make - and don't be bashful about it - if you would like to make the entire circuit maybe you will get a chance to do it.

The Gold Blanton Medal will be proudly worn by Bill May's rink of Gish, Nash and Luck. They beat the team of Warner, Hastings, Ziegler and Ralph McAfee by a 15 - 10 score. The Silver Medal was won by Russell Weston's rink when they defeated Victor Hockmeyer 12 - 8.

We hear that May was "hot as a fox" with Roger Luck doing a fine job at lead. I hope that by Now Bill is rid of his superstition about eights. He won the semi-final match when the score was tied 8 - 8 in the eighth end. Tuesday night his opponents all wore eights. Bill's rink had a three-point deficit after the first end, then quickly got a six, then a two (total 8) and he went ahead in spite of all superstition and won.

WINDELER MATCHES START TUESDAY

The Windeler Round Robin competition, which is Ardley's championship, starts on Tuesday, January 6th with Hastings vs Wells, Thorndike vs Eddison, and 'Gish vs Stevens. On Thursday the 8th it will be Fiske vs Shaw.

Addie Hastings nipped Dick Wells with a neat tying shot in the last end and won in the extra end where the leads stone remained an undisturbed winner during the entire end.





ARDSLEY WINS GRIFFITH MEDAL Hastings' Rink Beats Weston in All-Final

Unfortunately for the American teams St. Andrew's decided to invite Ross Tarleton to bring his Hamilton, Ontario Thistles back to the Douglas and Ross repaid the compliment by knocking off the Toronto Granites by 14 - 9 in a Canadian final.

Addison Hastings' rink with Dick Wells, Ashley Thorndike and Bill Wood gave the Toronto rink a real battle in the first round of the Douglas before succumbing by 14-13 in an extra end. Ted Hahn had previously been beaten 15-5. In their first match in the Griffith Consolation they beat Tee Foster's Utica rink by 15-11 then heat Chuck Hovey by 20-4 and Jacque MacFarlane's Mahopac by an equally high score 21-4. Russ Weston had Vic Hockmeyer at 3, and Laurence Achilles and GVB. They followed a slightly shorter route. Mark Waterbury's Utica boys took them by 15-9. Mort Locke's St. Andrew's rink fell by 12-11 in an extra end, then Ted Hahn suffered his second loss to an Ardsley rink by 11-7. The final match saw the Hastings' rink get off to an early lead-and keep moving to a 19-9 win.

The other rink with Bill Gish at skip, the secretary at 3, Bill May and Langdon Hockmeyer (Harold Sothern in the first round) beat a Country Club rink by 13 - 4 in the first round, nosed out Tee Foster by 12 - 11 in an extra end and then got murdered by former Ardsleyite Dick Neiley of Winchester 14 - 7.

This not only indicates nice work by the Curling Committee, but also very nice work by Addison Hastings' rink, which have two medals to show for two successive years, since they won the big one last year.

THE 20TH ANNIVERSARY DINNER

We didn't curl this week, we ate instead and drank duck soup. From his vantage point, high on the water wagon (not so high) your correspondent can report that duck soup a special beverage concocted for the occasion - was a kind of whiskey sour, but maybe it had Applejack in it, except that it tasted more like a rather new brandy and produced a lot of old corn.

Capt. Fiske acted as Toastmaster for Ardsley's twentieth, well attended by former curlers. I counted five charter members.

Lucius Hill, President of the Grand National, paid us the immense compliment of coming all the way from Boston to help us celebrate.

The man who stole the show was Stu Stevenson, who called on by the Toastmaster at the very end, topped off a fine evening with a perfectly gorgeous talk compounded

of equal parts of early Ardsley curling history, Stu's worm's-eye view of bonspiels, a moving tribute to Bill Kimbel - all whipped into delectable form by one of the most beloved figures in the Ardsley community.



THE ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB

Memorandum to The Membership:

Much to his regret your Treasurer is forced to impart to you some very bad news, as you will see from the enclosed statement.

When The Westchester Curling Association was formed in 1951 payment for the use of the ice at St. Andrews was set up in the form of rental, thus avoiding the payment of the Federal tax on dues, or so it seemed at the time. This season, however, it developed that that was apparently an untenable position, even though it appeared sound and just from a layman's point of view.

"Chuck" Hovey, Chairman of the Executive Committee of The Westchester Curling Association, secured a legal opinion from Ben R. Clark, of the law firm of Davidson, Dawson & Clark, to the effect that the member clubs of the Association were liable to the 20% Federal tax on the \$60.00 per member per annum paid to the Association each in 1951-2 and 1952-3 for ice rental.

Your Treasurer submitted this opinion to two fellow members of the Ardsley Curling Club, eminent representatives of the legal profession, none other than "Judge" McAfee and "Brud" Bickford, and they both concurred.

There seems nothing left to do but to collect this enerous tax from the membership or suffer the usual consequences and pay in any case. Will you please acceparate by remitting at your earliest convenience in order that the matter may be settled with the U.S. Treasury Department without more dolay.

The situation is being studied to try to develop some setup to avoid this unfair tax, and we hope for favorable results.

In this final issue of the 1952-'53 season I have set back the publication date to include the Caledonian and Gordon matches. The result is an editor's delight—too much material.

HAPPINESS BOYS WIN AT PLACID

The invitation from the Sno-Birds to participate in their first Bonspiel was eagerly answered by Bob Warner as skip, Al Koehl at 3, Bob Reed at 2, with Jack Gray leading. They thought they went for the ride but came back with a medal.

Arriving on the ice for their first match after an extremely hospitablecocktail party at Dwight and Kay Mills, they were behind to Boint Claire 1 - 9 in the 8th end, 2 - 9 in the 9th end, but they exploded in the last two ends and tied it up 9-all and won 10 - 9 in an extra end. (All matches in this competition at 10 ends)

Montreal West put them into the Second Consolation by knocking them off 9 - 3. They then came up again the Royal Canadian Curling Club. That one went to an extra end and they lost it 13 - 12. They crawled back on the ice for their third match on Saturday and proceeded to polish off Ottowa by 12 - 2. From then on it was down hill with Lennoxville bowing by 10 - 9 and Metcalf in the finals losing to Ardsley by 12 - 7, this giving Bob's team the Second Consolation Medal.

This is one of the nicest Ardsley wins that has ever been recorded. Here is a rink organized for the purpose of having a good time and a pleasant Bonspiel. I hope Bob won't misunderstand me when I say that we didn't expect him to win in such a tough competition, but win he did, recovering from a couple of fast starts by his adversary and winning a good extra—end match in the bargain.

DOUBLE WIN IN UTICA-ARCHIBALD

Ardsley closed out its home season in grand style by winning both the main event and the Consolation in the Utica competition post-poned from early January. Due to space limitations, we are not going to give a match-by-match account of the winning rink's road to the finals.

It was pleasant to look across the ice on Sunday morning and see three Ardsley rinks still in the competition. It was even pleasanter to have the two Ardsley finalists win their matches in extra-end competition which ended only seconds apart...Dick Wells' team of Robinson, CVB and Nash defeating Jock MacFarlane of Mahopac in the Utica Cup Competition and Russ Weston as skip, Stevens at 3, Achilles at 2 and Langdon Hockmeyer winning the Archibald.

CANDLIN NOTES

The winning District Medal team of Wells, skip; Gish, 3; Stevens, 2; and Weston (substituting for Bill Wood) at lead, took off for Montreal last week to compete in the Royal Caledonian Medal Competition. They had two heartbreakers.

-gainst Smith's Falls we were three ahead in the last end and unbelievably dropped a 5-end through the simple expedient of missing more shots than we should have, and this doesn't include the skip.

The afternoon match against Rideau saw us behind by 8 - 1 in the 7th end and by 10 - 5 in the 9th end. We made the match even in the 12th end, then lost the entra end with the final score being 10 - 11. Dick had to play a fireball shot down unfamiliar ice and the rest of us were glad we were not in the hack to have to try to bring it off for the final shot.

For a short editorial on the development of curling -- If you didn't think this game has changed, you will be highly educated by a trip to Montreal. In 1942 no Ardsley team had ever played against the so-called Western Game. There was one Montreal skip who was playing it and they were ready to run him out of town for spoiling the nice draw game which had grown out of irons play. This curler had brought the take-out game from the West where they played with nothing but granites.

In the Royal Caledonian Competition, every single Canadian team that we watched was playing this fast Western game. Oddly enough, on Thistle ice in the Gordon International matches, all of the teams there were playing the draw game.

However, an important point is that the teams that had survived the play-down to get into the Caledonian got there by playing the "granite" or take-out game.

Incidentally, from play has practically disappeared from the Island of Montreal. I believe that the only irons competition is the Governor General's Trophy.

THE GORDON INTERNATIONAL

Ardsley had mixed success in the Gordon International matches. The Caledonian rink did very badly and Mr. Hastings' rink did very well. Bill Wood joined the former rink and Russ Weston played 3 for Addie together with the senior Hockmeyer and Ash Thornton. In the morning match, with Dick Wells skipping, the Ardsley Caledonian rink won from the Montreal Heather Club by 12 - 9. In the afternoon match, Dick and Bill Gish changed places and we finished on the short end of a 17 - 4 score to Drummondville.

The Hastings' rink salvaged the Ardsley cause by knocking off Granby 14-10 in the morning and whaling Howksbury 16-8.

However, the Americans lost by an overwhelming margin, but we all had a lovely time.

CLOSING DIMNER
