1. Wilds Competition Ends Up in Two-way Tie --

Thanks to the incredible curling of Russ Weston's #3 and Bill May's #1 rinks, who both defeated McCullough's St. Andrew's #3 rink in its last two games, the Wilds competition has ended up in a two-way tie between McCullough's St. Andrew's #3 and Linc Seibert's St. Andrew's #4, each winning 8 games and losing 3.

A dinner-dance at 8:00 p.m., Saturday evening, at the Ardsley Country Club will be attended by over 200 guests.

Curling starts at 9:30 a.m., Sunday, at St. Andrew's, followed by a buffet luncheon, and again at 3:00 p.m. where competition will be afforded by Ardsley, Mahopac, Caledonia and St. Andrew's Curling Clubs and the Westchester Wicks (ladies). The evening will be spent in individual homes to give our Scottish friends an evening of rest.

On Monday, February 7th, curling commences at 9:30 a.m. with another series of matches at 3:30 p.m. with participants being drawn from Ardsley, Farmington, Mahopac, New York Caledonia and St. Andrew's Curling Clubs. Dinner that evening will be at 7:30 p.m. at the Yale Club. The Scots leave at 3:00 p.m. on Wednesday for Boston.


"Needless to say, when the game dragged to its dismal conclusion, Doaks' inner feeling was not one of elation. 2. Douglas and Griffith Competitions Won By the Country Club #1 and Schenectady #1 --

Those who witnessed the closing minutes of the finals of the Douglas and Griffith competitions were rewarded with some of the most exciting curling yet seen on St. Andrew's ice. Both matches went down to the final rock in the lith with the losing skips making misplays that gave the title to their opponents.

In the Douglas, Holmgren needed only to hit one offour stones in the center of the house to at least tie, but pushed his shot so that it almost hit the boards. This gave the Country Club a four end which overcame Schenectady #2's three point lead as they entered the lith end. Final score:

In the Griffith competition, Means, skip of the Schenectady #1 rink, missed a guard and set his stone down as a perfect May West on the button lying two. However, the Thistles had four stones in the house with the exception of Schenectady's two lying stones on the button, but Tarlton of the Hamilton Thistles was way—wide and the match ended up 17-13 in favor of Schenectady #1.

Ad Hastings, with his Ardsley #3 rink, lost out in the quarter finals by one rock to Holmgren and this rock had to be measured by the referee. It was a tough match to lose for so gallant a rink as Upjohn, Stewart, Hastings and Graaskamp.

Our other two Ardsley rinks had less good fortune but enjoyed very close matches with the exception that the Toronto Granites exhibited great skill in their second match in eliminating Dick Wells.

1. Ardsley Scores Best Against Scots -

Scoring 3 wins out of the 4 registered by American teams (the Westerchester Wicks winning the other one) Ardsley curlers are to be commended on their excellent showing against the Scottish team which walked away with honors in every district in which they curled.

Paced by Vic Hockmeyer's 12-2 victory over John Watson, captain and president of the Royal Caledonia Curling Club, Ardsley rinks, skipped by Russ Weston (11-8) and Bart Eddison (8-5) came through on the winning side. The only Ardsley rink to lose its match ran up against the Scots National championship rink which proved a bit too expert for our local boys to handle.

At the conclusion of curling on Monday afternoon, all of the Scot curlers and many members of Ardsley, St. Andrew's, Caledonia and Mahopac joined at the Yale Club where the spirit of good fellowship prevailed til the wee hours ... thanks to Dunc Sutphen, Chairman.

All district curlers have Albie Shaw and Eddie Fiske to thank for the splendid arrangements, especially the excellent dinner-dance at the Ardsley Country Club on Saturday evening, chairmened by Al Koehl and Hal Sothern.

Of special interest to all concerned was the statement by the Scots that the St. Andrew's ice was the keenest and best they had curled on during their entire trip. Our congratulations go out to the St. Andrew's club and especially to Jim Stanley for providing such grand ice.

The following wire from Bill Kimbel to President Graaskamp should make all Ardsley curlers proud of their membership in the Ardsley Curling Club.

"Congratulations on the splendid showing of Ardsley against the Scots. Ardsley's place in curling is now deep rooted in the record and in the traditions of the game. Wish I could have been with you to relive happy associations with Ardsley curlers. May they always prosper.

2. Ardsley #1 Wins District Medal --

The Ardsley #1 rink, skipped by Ad Hastings from the #2 position, won the Grand National Curling Club District Medal by winning in an all-Ardsley final. The rink, comprising Sheets (#1), Hastings (#2, Skip), Fiske (#3) and Wells (#4), defeated Ardsley #2 skipped by Weston, Thorndike (#3), V. Hockmeyer (#2) and Ringland (#1), by a score of 10-9. Wells' final stone drew a port and removed Weston's lying stone in probably one of the most thrilling finals ever to be played in a district championship.

3. Ardsley Rink Makes Excellent Showing at Quebec International Bonspiel -

A rink composed of May and Thorndike (alternating at skip and #3), Leighton (#2) and Griggs (lead) attended the recent Quebec International Bonspiel.

Considering the type of competition, our boys didn't do badly. One hundred and twenty rinks of Canada's best (and including 6 U. S. rinks) participated. The spiel is but one feature of Quebec's month-long winter carnival.

In the first match our Ardsley rink met a rink from Brantford, Ontario which, when last head of, had reached the finals. Although this "Brant Club" group scored a 5 end and a 6 end against our boys, they only nosed them out in the last end 13-11.

Next Ardsley met Fredericton and lost by the opposing skip's last stone 8-9.

Then came a match versus Ottawa West which Ardsley won 9-4.

The following match was with East Malartic and Ardsley again won handily 10-2.

That night Thorndike, Leighton and Griggs were initiated into membership in the Pea Soup Section of the Quebec Curling Club. May was their eager sponsor.

The next morning the "roof fell in" on our rink which met a hot quartet - Quebec Victoria - on a tricky sheet of ice. Ardsley lost this one 13-5.

That afternoon, by way of redeeming themselves, Ardsley won 9-4 from a good Hamilton Thistle rink.

Next and last they met Brockville and were leading 8-6 when the time limit expired after 9 ends. However, the timekeeper and his bell - always on hand when Ardsley was trailing - had unfortunately disappeared at this point. In the 10th end the opposing skip's last stone cut out Ardsley's lying shot to give Brockville a 3 end and a 1 stone victory. Thus Ardsley won 3 and lost 4 matches against Canada's best.

Hugh Leighton in his Cadillac Eldorado (christened the Queen Mary by his passengers)drove the entire 1,000 miles, making some fine in-turns

and out-turns, marrowly missing a triple "promote" on some tricky ice and showing signs of only one slight wick on the right front fender. His passengers enjoyed the trip and the "spiel" from beginning to end and are grateful to skip May too for the invitation which was to him personally.

4. Windeler Competition Fast Drawing to Close --

Vic Hockmeyer accomplished "the impossible" last Tuesday night by handing the Wells' rink its first defeat of the season. However, with a 4 win and 1 loss average and 2 to go, the Wells' rink still leads the 8 rink competition. Eddison #7 and V. Those of you who were there will recall what a grand finale it was to a fine curling season, but for the benefit of those who were unable to attend, Art Kemp has asked me to give you a report on the final dinner of the Ardsley Curling Club, held at Hugh Leighton's Restaurant last month. President Graaskamp and Treasurer Van Alstyne found urgent business in Florida and were unable to be present, but they had not forgotten us up here in the snow and sent along telegraphed greetings to the diners. Bill Wood, Chairman of the Curling Committee, reviewed the results of the season. All agreed that it was a very successful season for the Ardsley Curling Club.

Perhaps the best demonstration was put on by the Ardsley Club in their matches against the Scots. Of four matches, Ardsley rinks won three of them, a record that I believe was unequalled by any club across the country. In the Ardsley Cup Competition with St. Andrews, the Ardsley curlers won the cup by 27 stones, with Eddie Fiske and his rink having the best plus score. In the competition for the District Medal it wound up as an all Ardsley final, and a close one at that. Hastings skipped the winning rink from the #2 position, but Dick Wells, playing #4 for Ad, with a great take-out shot with the last stone kept Weston's rink from gaining its tie and putting the match into an extra end.

With Vic Hockmeyer substituting for Dick Wells, Ad took the District Champions up to the Royal Caledonia. They lost their first match to an Ormstown rink in the final ends, winding up behind 12 to 9. From there on the boys got hot and went through to win the St. Lawrence Cup, beating an Ottowa rink 18 to 4, Ottowa conceding the match with two ends to go.

Ardsley sent two rinks up to the Dykes Competition, and Joe Ringland led his boys into the finals where they lost a tough one. A couple of more stones and Joe would have brought the Dykes Medal back to Ardsley.
