Minutes of the Meeting of October 9, 1956

The first meeting of the Ardsley Curling Club for the 1956-57 season was held at the home of President Ashley Thorndike on the evening of October 9, 1956. Present were:

A report was made on the Iceless Bonspiel. Eight Ardsley members attended. The Ardsley Bowl was won by the golfers. Thorndike offered our club as hosts for next year, in view of celebrating our 25th anniversary. The Grand National discussion indicated some question as to whether the event will be continued.

The membership committee reported that one active member from last year (Riggio) has requested associate membership, leaving a roster of 47 active curlers with one vacancy. Three associate members have requested reinstatement to active membership. A motion was adopted increasing the active membership limit to 50, with the proviso that, with the next two drop-outs of active members, the limit will automatically revert to the present level of 48. The three requests for reinstatement of associate members to active status were thus automatically cared for.

The membership committee reported that two proposals for new members have been properly received and screened, but there has been no prior announcement to the full membership as required by the rules. Even though there are no existing vacancies, it was agreed that these candidacies will be published in the next Duck Soup, in order to vote at the next meeting in order to create a qualified list in case of a subsequent vacancy.

The long range planning committee are drawing up a report on possibilities for establishing a rink of our own. They hope to have a formal proposal for the opening dinner.

The 25th Anniversary Committee reported on proposed plans for the year. A booklet on the club's history will be published. Discussion was held on a possible celebration, and the consensus was to hold it in connection with the final dinner, preferrably as a dinner dance with wives and a few outside guests. A motion was adopted to obtain designs for a special button for the year, with a new die not to exceed approximately \$100.

The opening dinner was tentatively set for November 20th. Formal curing schedule will probably start November 27th.



The season is off to a whirlwind start. First of all, the Ardsley curlers won the initial event of the season: The Ardsley Bowl at the Iceless Bonspiel. Second, there were as many opinions expressed on all subjects discussed - as there were members present at the first business meeting.

Let's take these up one at a time. Eight members went to the Iceless, seven accompanied by friend wife. Ye secretarie interviewed some of the wives, and finds from them that it was a grand weekend. They recommend larger attendance next year, although there is some doubt on the future of the event gathered from reports from the Grand National Executive Committee.

While at Stockbridge, time out from social activities was taken long enough for Ardsley to win the Ardsley Bowl. 'Tis reported that Skip Hastings won low net. Question: does he expect the same handicap when we get on the ice? 'Tis also reported that one of the wives located a golden eagle in an antique shop, which nearly made its way back home. But friend hubby thought it a poor replica of an Ardsley duck, and called "Nyet" on the deal.

Twenty-seven showed up at Ash Thorndike's for the opening meeting, where the highlight was voting for readmission of three associate members back into active status. Welcome back

Since 47 of the 48 active curlers from last year will be on the ice again (Lou Riggio has requested the side lines as associate), room was made for the 3 returnees by temporarily increasing the active membership limit to 50. When and if drop-outs occur, the limit will automatically return to 48.

Two condidates for new members have been proposed and screened according to the membership rules. Voting will take place at the next meeting (at the initial dinner). Without current openings, this will merely establish a qualified waiting list in case of later vacancies.

CURLING WORLD SHOCKED BY UPHEAVAL OF FORM WITHIN ARDSLEY RANKS!

Seldom in the world of sports has there been so complete a reversal of championship contenders as occurred last week in the first round of Blanton play. All four of last year's gold medal skips went down to defeat and are relegated to the second division fight from here in. All four of last season's silver medal skips - Nash, Ringland, Stewart, and Wood - won their matches and will vie in the coveted gold medal round robin. Some looked to the off-season trading for an excuse, but Curling Chairman May stoutly maintains that the rinks are evenly balanced. Even the return of veterans R. McAfee and Wells to active status doesn't give a clue; one was on a losing team, the other was off duty for the week.

The real hero-of-the-week was Johnnie Jones, skipping his first match as a sub for Harold Sothern. Playing with Robinson, R. McAfee, Weston and a 1-stone penalty (a/c. substitute member), they got off to a poor start. But they were coming on with a rush in the late ends for a closer-than-the-score-indicates 11-8 loss to veteran skip Wood with L. Hockmeyer, Lueck, and Shaw.

A low scoring game saw Nash (with Bibby, Achilles, and Hastings) defeat Upjohn (D. Stevenson, Warner, and May) by 8-5.

Ringland finally overcame the Sheets jinx (Ralph had whupped ye secretarie in the opening round in both of the last two years). The 12-7 victory was shared by Nolan, Stevens, and Thorndike over Kimball, Gray, and Koehl who were with Sheets.

In the Thursday match, Stewart (Waldie, Fiske, and Sutphen) defeated Kemp (Lueck, Weston, and Thayer) by 14-8. So the line-up for the balance of the Blanton competition is:

Dear Joe:

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I would like to have you include this letter with your next "DUCK SOUP", as it is the quickest way of reaching all of our membership over a matter that gives me deep concern. I refer to the results of the voting that took place at our Opening Dinner.

From conversations I have had with various members it appears to me that there was considerable misunderstanding over the voting procedure as well as objections to the procedure itself. The vetoes that occurred, I understand, were because of these factors and not because of any personal feelings about the applicants themselves. Both applicants have been thoroughly screened by the Membership Committee and in fact they were voted upon a year ago with no dissenting votes. However, at that time they lacked the necessary majority and a third applicant was taken in for the one vacancy that then existed.


It seems to me that we should all give serious consideration to the effect that this unfortunate vote will have upon these two applicants who are perfectly acceptable members of our community. Should they be condemned merely because of possible misunderstandings and objections to procedural voting methods within our own club? Shouldn't we reconsider this problem in a more sober light?

If the membership concurs with my feelings, I would like to propose that we accept both applicants on our waiting list with Mr Sibert ahead of Mr Aldrich, because the affirmative voting was in this order in the balloting. I would like to suggest that this action become effective on December 15 1956, unless I hear from three or more members to the contrary. Any dissenting votes would be kept in strictest confidence by me.

Two of the above matches had very interesting stories. In Thorndike's Saturday match, they went into the last end 6-6. Ash's last stone clipped the winner off the tee, leaving himself two-and-a-half inches away. Several minutes of measuring finally showed that Nelson Fry's stone was 2.499 inches away, to lose a heartbreaker for Ash and his rink. In Guy Robinson's match, one end finished with 15 of the 16 stones in the house (including all 8 of Ardsley's), with the 16th out in front by a few feet. Nine of the stones were all or partially in the red circle, with a 1 score for St Andrews.

In the first round of the round-robins, No. 1 (Wood) and No. 3 (Nash) won in the Gold competition, while No. 6 (Sheets) and No. 8 (Kemp) took the Silver matches.




ST. ANDREWS NO. 4 WINS THE WILDS

Twas close for Ardsley No. 1, but that doesn't win the Wilds medal. Co-skips Hastings and Weston (with assists from Robinson and Sothern who each skipped a match when the regulars were away) had marched through their first eight matches undefeated. Then last Thursday, Albie Shaw, backed by a red-hot performance by Cuyler Stevens, handed them their first defeat. A win on Saturday gave them a 9-1 record going into Sunday's match against St. Andrews No. 4. By the luck of the schedule, they were the only other contenders for the crown with a similar 9-1 record. Their only defeat was at the hands of Thorndike, skipping Ardsley No. 3 earlier in the season.

So this was to be it. The winner take all. It started mildly, a 1-end for Ardsley, then a 2-end for St. Andrews. Gradually the roof started to sag, until the score was 9-1. DOUGLAS-ENTRIES LOSE TO EVENTUAL BONSPIEL WINNERS

Both Ardsley rinks in the Douglas Bonspiel advanced to the point where they met the eventual medal winners. Then a loss, close in each case. No. 1 (Wells-Skip, May, Wood and Achilles) won handily over Highland by 12-7 and Schenectady No. 2 by 13-5. Then in the semifinals the tables were turned. The Hamilton Thistles, winners of the Douglas finals, eked out a 12-10 victory over Dick and his rink. IT WAS COLD IN OTTAWA

While the Ogden Jug got underway here at home, the District Medal winners (Hastings, Fiske, Kemp and Samuel) travelled to Ottawa to try their hand in the Victoria Jubilee, the Royal Caledonia or the St. Lawrence trophies. When they landed on Thursday morning, the temperature was a balmy 22 degrees, below of course. As we said, it was cold in Ottawa.

They dropped from the Ardsley Trophy (the main event), by losing a squeeker to St. George of Montreal by 7-8. From there on it was a different story.

The first victim was Norfolk, 13-6, then came Caledonia No. 2 by 20-3 with two ends unplayed. In the finals, they met a St. Andrews rink to win by a 17-8 score. Great going, fellows.

Three members of the winning rink asked the secretaries to mention the publicity they did not receive.
