Inasmuch as I will be out of town
the last two weeks in November, I think the Curling
Committee should meet soon, and I would like to suggest Wednesday, November 6, at my spartment in Hudson
House. If this evening is impossible for you, please
give me a ring and we will try to set it so that all
members of the Curling Committee can be present.

In composing rinks of as close a balance as possible, I think the first step would be to
rank each of the members. I am enclosing a list of
the active members for the 1957-1958 Season (including
Stewart Peabody, who was elected to membership at the
meeting Monday). Prior to the meeting of the Curling
Committee, I hope you will take time to rate each of
the members on this list on the basis of 25 points for
top curling ability, scaled down to as low as you like
for the tyros. Be sure and bring your ratings to the
meeting.

If Wednesday, November 6 is an impossible evening for you, will you please telephone me at Rector 2-1900 and let me know what dates would be acceptable so that we can get the whole Committee together.

ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB

Minutes of meeting of Monday, October 28, 1957

The first meeting of the 1957 - 58 season was held at the home of Maitland Griggs.

The minutes of the last meeting (March 19, 1957) were approved, and Bill Wood, President, reviewed the official business that had taken place since then:

- 1) A Deed of Gift for the Cuthbertson Plaque was signed over to the Grand National Curling Club, making our Cuthbertson Bonspiel a "bona fide" Grand National event.
- 2) At a meeting of the Grand National, September 27, 28 & 29, at the Otesaga Hotel, Cooperstown, New York, the Hartford Curling Club announced its resignations.

At this same meeting, we requested a later date for the Cuthbertson Bonspiel. The present official Cuthbertson date is January 30, 31, February 1 & 2.

In addition, there were discussions concerning the scheduling mnd location of play-downs for the U.S. Curling Championship which will be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin this season.

A new Grand National Annual will be published this year, and all curlers are asked to check the old Annual for errors.

The secretaries of all curling clubs were asked to send R. W. Keyes, Grand National Secretary, 100 copies of their active membership lists.

The 1957 - 58 Ideless Bonspiel, held concurrently with the Grand National Meeting at Cooperstown, was an outstanding success. Ardsley was host club, and 85 to 90 curlers and their wives were present for the good golf, companionship and cheer (supplied by Ardsley).

3) Atua meeting of the Westchester Curling Association, St. Andrews presented an increase in ice rental rates, due to increased costs, etc. Plans for the Cuthbertson Bonspiel were discussed, and Bill Wood will appoint a committee to meet with Mahopac and Caledonia committees to make final arrangements for the Bonspiel.

Since this is Arcley's 25th Anniversary, it was suggested that Ardsley give a party for all visiting curlers. Bill Wood will appoint a committee to make arrangements for this get-together.

Maitland Griggs made the Treasurer's Report, and proposed that the new annual tariff per member total \$79.00 -- broken down as follows:

\$7.50 Dues \$1.50 Subscription to Gurling News \$70.00 Ice Rental \$79.00 Total

This motion was seconded, and carried unanimously.

Mait proposed that we charge our members \$2.50 each for the Ardsley 25th Anniversary Pin. This was approved.

Dick Wells brought up the question of membership approval before any goodly amounts of money are spent. It was agreed that in all future activities involving the expenditure of large sums, and estimated cost will be submitted to the membership, before the money is spent.

47 of last year's 48 active members have asked to curl again this year. Russ Weston requested an Associate Membership, leaving one vacancy.

L. W. Graaskamp, Associate Member, applied for active membership. His name was proposed, seconded, and passed unanimously.

It was moved that Stuart Peabody, a former member, be made our 49th member, with the provision that with the next resignation the total active membership drop back to the standard "48".

This motion was seconded, and passed unanimously.

Ralph Sheets, Chairman of the Curling Committee, gave a report on the ice schedules for this season. Sunday, November 24th we will have one sheet of ice to open the Blanchard Competition, and will swing into our regular Tuesday and Thursday night pattern thereafter.

Bill Wood commented on the increased interest in curling at St. Andrews, and continuing "squeeze" being placed on the three rings of ice. He suggested that we take a more agressive interest in future plans for our own rink, and will appoint a committee to follow through.



It was proposed that no business be conducted at our social dinners, except the final dinner when officers for the coming season are elected. This motion was seconded, and approved unanimously.

The next curling dinner will be Wednesday, November 20th.

The meeting was closed at 9:55 P.M.

Mait Griggs donated space, and Bill Wood refreshment, as the curling season got officially underway last Monday night, October 28th.

Bill brought us up to date on the hundred-and-one odds and ends of official business that has taken place since last season.

Among the most important things covered were:

- The Iceless Bonspiel This year's event was an outstanding success. 85 to 90 curlers and their wives gathered, golfed, guzzled and glowed as Ardsley took over as host for this year's event at Cooperstown, New York. Hats off to Al Koehl for a wonderful job! (Al, by the way, was so excited about the whole weekend, he tangled bumpers with 12 cars on the parkway coming back, and initiated his brand new car to the perils of the Bonspieling.)
- 2. At a meeting of the Westchester Curling Association, St. Andrews asked for an increase in their ice rental rates. No change in the charge for the cheer but the price of ice must go up due to increased costs.

Mait Griggs has translated this increase into dollars and cents per curler -- and it is relatively painless. Our new tariff will total \$79.00 a member, broken down as follows:

Grassy Graskamp and Stuart Peabody were unanimously re-elected active members, bringing this year's list of curlers to 49. With the next resignation, however, we will drop back to the standard "48".

Ad Hastings, Albie Shaw, Eric Lagercrantz and Kenny Stevenson came, saw and conquered the Swiss Curlers last week in an exhibition match at Utica. The score was 13 - 3 in 8 ends, the largest margin of victory of any American rink.

THE WILDS MEDAL

Rules Governing Play in the Inter-Club Matches - 1957-1958

- 1. Matches shall be played according to schedule, except that if in the opinion of the Committee justifiable circumstances necessitate a post-powement, the Match shall be played as soon as possible.
- 2. The Sponsor Club identification of the Rinks entered in this competition, together with the names of the Skips, and all members assigned to the various Rinks, shall be filed with the St. Andrew's Curling Committee.
 - 3. Changes in the designated team positions are permissible.
- 4. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one match. If only one substitute is used, that substitute must play LEAD. If two substitutes are used, they must play LEAD and NUMBER TWO respectively.
- 5. Rinks will be penalized ONE point and ONE end if not on the ice and ready to play within 10 minutes of the time scheduled. An additional point and end will be added to the penalty for each succeeding 5 minutes tardiness.

NOTE: This penalty is imposed by the Curling Committee and MAY NOT BE WAIVED by mutual consent of the Skips.)

- 6. The Rink winning the greatest number of Matches will receive SIX WILDS Medals. In the event of a tie between two or more Rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-off".
 - 7. Each Match to consist of 10 ends.

Dear Jack:

I understand the Clubs composing the Westchester Curling Association have been advised by Mr. Cleary, the Manager of St. Andrew's, that the Board of Governors of The Saint Andrew's Golf Club authorized a surcharge of 15% of all house purchases by curlers who are not members or wives of members of St. Andrew's using the Club bar and restaurant facilities. The purpose of this letter is to advise you that no such 15% surcharge was ever authorized by our Board of Governors.

The idea of a 15% surcharge originated with an exchairman of the House Committee who - needless to say - is not a curler. It was never approved by the Board and it is extremely unfortunate that our Manager was under the impression that it had been approved.

In the absence of our Curling Chairman, at the Board Meeting last night I proposed that the 15% surcharge idea be promptly thrown in the ash can and my proposal was unanimously adopted. I also proposed that at no time should St. Andrew's make a higher charge to W. C. A. curling members or clubs for restaurant and bar charges than it makes to its own members. This idea was unanimously adopted by the Board.

A-3 over M-1


Ardsley #3 rebounded to take Mahopac #1 by the score of 11 to 6. Conley, Nash, Southern, and THORNDIKE turned the trick.

In case you haven't gotten your official Ardsley Curling Club tie, it's waiting for you at the desk at St. Andrews. Get as many as you want. The tab is \$2.50 each, and well worth it. Ask the curler who owns one.

SWEEPING PROPOSAL

Every now and then comes a situation on the ice that causes considerable controversy. Whenever these arise, Duck Soup will publish them in the public interest, and solicit solutions. Case in point:



Let's say Cuyler Stevens, Skip, has just delivered his last stone. It's an outturn draw, and the weight is good.

But...there is a big slope on the righthand side of the ice. And as the stone approaches the house, it falls off to the right, against the turn.

Art Kemp, #3 in the house, quickly calls on the sweepers to bend their brooms. Cuyler, at the other end, immediately calls them off.

Now the question is, which call is right. To sweep or not to sweep -- when a stone is falling off against its turn.

Art says, "By sweeping, the flight of the stone is speeded up. And the faster a stone is traveling forward, the less opportunity it has to bend -- either way."

Cuyler says, "No: The slower a stone travels, the more it curls. True, the stone is falling off against its spin. But as it slows down approaching the house, its spin has more of a chance to work. Sweeping only makes it fall off more, because you are speeding up the flight and not giving the curl a chance."

The sweepers said nothing -- printable.

ROGER LUECK COPS FIRST ANNUAL DUCK SCUP AWARD!

In a most erudite letter that filled the bulk of three pages with formulas, diagrams, and profound scientific analysis, Roger Lueck won the first and only contest he has ever entered. Roger's entry was the unanimous choice of the judging committee, and Rog will be awarded a brand new Ardsley "25th" Anniversary Pin at an early date.

Here are several quotes from Roger's answer to the problem, "To sweep or not to sweep" when a stone is falling off against its turn:

"In pursuing its course down the ice, a stone is under the influence of three force vectors. These are the weight vector "w" (this represents the forward motion), the precession vector "p" (representing ár V

the effect of the turn), and the gravity vector "g" (representing the effect of a lateral slope in the ice). The "p" and "g" vectors are at right angles to the "w" vector. The magnitudes of the lateral precession and gravity vectors are always small in relation to the weight vector. If the surface of the ice is at exactly 90° to a line drawn from the surface of the ice to the earth's center of gravity, the gravity vector becomes zero. This seldom occurs."

"...now if there is a lateral slope to the right in the ice and the stone is thrown down the center line with an in-turn, it will come to rest on the tee line at a distance from the house center greater than $x_2 + g$. Therefore, $(x_2 + g) - x_2 = g$."

"...a word about sweeping! Sweeping is a micrometer adjustment which the skip possesses to exercise a minor degree of control on the several vectors. Heavy sweeping decreases the ratio between the lateral vectors and the forward weight vector. No sweeping permits each vector to exercise its normal influence."

"If, by the method described above, the men had predetermined the gravity vector and its relation to the precession vector, the answers to your questions are at once apparent. If the gravity vector was greater than the precession vector, the thing to do was to maintain as low a ratio as possible between the lateral vectors and the w vector, in which case Art Kemp was right. On the other hand, if the g vector was even a trifle less than the p vector, then the thing to do was to maintain as high a ratio of these vectors to the weight vector as possible, in which case Cuyler was right. If the relationship between the g and p vectors was unknown at the time the stone was thrown, there is nothing to do but argue."

Duck Soup can't arque with you, Rog--you win, hands down!
