ATTENTION CO-SKIPS: You are to alternate the skipping of your rinks or arrange so that each Skip handles one-half of the matches. Co-Skips may not curl together unless they are unable otherwise to get a full rink. You are also obliged to arrange your curling so that each man on your rink will have an equal opportunity to curl. Keep a record of your men who have curled for you, and rotate the opportunities.

RULES GOVERNING PLAY IN THE WILDS MATCHES 1955-1956

- 1. Matches shall be played according to schedule, except that if in the opinion of the Committee justifiable circumstances necessitate a postponement, the Match shall be played as soon as possible.
- 2. The Sponsor Club identification of the Rinks entered in this competition, together with the names of the Skips, and all members assigned to the various Rinks, shall be filed with the St. Andrew's Curling Committee.
- 3. Changes in the designated team positions are permissible.
- 4. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one match. If only one substitute is used, that substitute must play LEAD. If two substitutes are used they must play LEAD and NUMBER TWO respectively.
- 5. Rinks will be penalized ONE point and ONE end if not on the ice and ready to play within 10 minutes of the time scheduled. An additional point and end will be added to the penalty for each succeeding 5 minutes tardiness.

(NOTE: This penalty is imposed by the Curling Committee and MAY NOT BE WAIVED by mutual consent of the Skips.)

- 6. The Rink winning the greatest number of Matches will receive FOUR WILDS Medals. In the event of a tie between two or more Rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-off".
- 7. Each Match to consist of 10 Ends.

This will necessitate finishing all ends.

Copies of your schedule should be in the hands of each member of your rink.

MEMORANDUM FROM THE CURLING COMMITTEE

This season the improvements in the ice-making machinery at St. Andrews have permitted an increase in the curling season to 17 weeks. The increased length of the season permits certain changes in our intra-club matches which the curling committee feels will provide a greater amount of competition for all members of the Club and add to the interest in the Windeler and the Blanton.

We plan to run the Blanton competition as a round robin rather than a two-division play-down series. There will be eight Blanton rinks, each of which will play all the others for a total of seven matches per rink as compared to the four matches provided in previous years. The winner of the Blanton round robin will receive the Blanton Gold Medal and the runner-up will receive the Blanton Silver Medal. In case of a tie or ties, the schedule provides sufficient open ice to permit play-offs.

In order to provide an added incentive for skips in both the Blanton and the Windeler, the committee has decided this year to inaugurate a practice which has been followed successfully in some other clubs and to run these two competitions as a ladder for skips. This year's Windeler skips will include six carried over from last year on the basis of their performance in last year's Windeler. The other two positions will be filled by the skips who win this year's Blanton Gold and Silver Medals. This year's Blanton skips include one dropped back from last year's Windeler, five holdovers from last year and two new "challengers".

Next year we propose that the two skips finishing lowest in this year's Windeler will drop back and compete in the Blanton. Similarly, the two skips finishing lowest in this year's Blanton will be dropped from next year's Blanton. Their places will be taken by two new "challengers". Thus, when the plan is fully effective, each year there should be six holdovers in the Windeler plus the two successful Blanton skips for that year and four holdovers in the Blanton, plus two new skips and two skips dropped back from the previous year's Windeler. In this way each skip will be obliged to maintain his position by success on the ice rather than by reputation, and the plan will provide automatically an infusion of new blood in the Blanton. Skips who have dropped from the Blanton will, of course, be considered by the curling committee as potential challengers for readmission to the Blanton after one year on the sidelines.

This year the curling committee has, as in the past, selected the Blanton rinks with the objective of making them as evenly balanced as possible. In the Windeler, however, we are proposing, in order to add a further element of skill to the skip's assignment and to eliminate the frequent alibi that a given skip's chances have been ruined by excessive absenteeism foisted on him by the committee's selection, that the Windeler skips, when their names are known after the completion of the Blanton, conduct a draft under the supervision of the curling committee, somewhat after the fashion of the draft of the National Football League. Thus, the highest-rated skip this year would receive last choice on the first and possibly the second round of player selections and the lowest-

rated skip (in this case the winner of the Blanton Silver Medal) would receive the first choice in the first and possibly the second round of selections.

Since we are putting an incentive feature into the Blanton competition, the curling committee has carefully considered the rule which has been in existence for many years which prohibits Windeler skips and certain other named senior curlers from skipping as substitutes in the Blanton. It is our feeling that in the past in the Blanton when the regular skip has been absent, the prohibition against the use of a senior skip has produced some results which while interesting were not necessarily conducive to the best competition. For this reason, and because the club now has a dozen or more curlers of relatively comparable ability as skips, we are rescinding this rule for this year's Blanton play with the understanding that each Blanton skip is to make every effort to skip all Blanton matches regardless of his current standing in the competition. In his absence, his normal vice-skip regardless of whether a senior skip or otherwise may skip the rink.

Vic Hockmeyer has expressed a desire to be used as a substitute only during the Blanton competition. Accordingly, we have not assigned him to any of the Blanton rinks, but urge skips to invite him to substitute. He may be used as a substitute in the normal substitute position by any skip unable to recruit a rink from his regular membership at the usual penalty of two stones. Other curlers used as substitutes who rate a penalty of two stones include Eddison, Hastings, May, Sheets, Sothern, Stevens, Sutphen, Thorndike, Wells and B. R. Wood. All other substitutes rate a penalty of one stone. The penalty for curling with only three men on a rink is one stone. With only three men on a rink, the lead and number 2 are each to curl three stones per end.

Play in the Blanton is to start promptly at 8:15 p.m. Skips are reminded of their obligation to provide as nearly as practicable equal opportunities to curl to all of their rink members. This rule applies as well to the Wilds and the Jug Ogden. Wilds co-skips are to divide the skipping of their rinks equally over the entire competition (six matches for each skip) and are not to play for each other unless a complete rink cannot otherwise be obtained from their Wilds rosters.

There are enclosed a list of Blanton and Wilds rinks and a copy of the schedule for the season as it applies to Ardsley matches in the Blanton, Windeler, Wilds and Jug Ogden. In connection with Thursday night curling, skips should note the ice assignment which varies week by week. The principle of rotating sheets with Caledonian on Thursday nights has been fully accepted by the officers of the Caledonian Curling Club. The over-all schedule showing sheet assignments for the Westchester County Curling Association will be posted at the bulletin board at St. Andrews. Skips are requested to observe meticulously sheet assignments on the nights we are curling with Caledonian.

Please note that one Windeler match has been scheduled for Sunday afternoon, February 8, in place of the match which normally would have been played on Thursday evening, January 29, at which time the Cuthbertson Bonspiel will be in progress.
