RULES OF PLAY

- (1) Windeler matches are 11 ends.
- (2) Skips are expected to provide equal opportunities to curl to all the members of their rinks.
- (3) Substitutes must lead, or if two substitutes are required, must play lead and second. The penalties for substitutes are two stones for the Windeler skips and one stone for all others.
- (4) The penalty for any rink fielding only three curlers is one stone. If a rink must play with three curlers, the lead and the second are each to play three stones.
- (5) It should be noted that the match between W-1 and W-3 is scheduled for 2:45 P.M. on Sunday, January 24, the match between W-2 and W-8 is scheduled for 2:45 on Saturday, February 20, and three matches are scheduled for Thursday, February 25, rather than Tuesday, February 23, when the St. Andrew's Club will be closed.

RULES OF PLAY

- (1) The Jug Ogden competition is designed primarily for junior skips and other curlers who normally play lead or second. However, in order to meet the complaint that senior curlers have no opportunity to curl at St. Andrew's on weekends after the Wilds has been completed, except in bonspiels, the skips are required to offer each of the senior curlers listed below the line in the foregoing rinks one opportunity to curl during the competition. Subject to this obligation, the skips are urged to afford the members listed above the line the first opportunity to curl. If they are unable to fill their rinks from the names on the upper portion of the list, they are free to take players from the lower portion.
 - (2) Jug Ogden matches are 10 ends.
- (3) Only those who do not play skip or vice-skip regularly in their club competitions are eligible to play those positions in this competition. In other words, players shown below the line in the above listing can only play lead or second.
- (4) Because of the tight time schedule for these matches, the following penalties will be enforced: one stone and one end for each 15 minutes or fraction thereof that a rink is late in appearing for a match.
 - (5) There is no penalty for substitutions.
- (6) Regular skips and vice-skips (those listed below the line above) when substituting must keep out of the house and refrain from advising the skip.



No need to elaborate about this brilliant victory. Just this -- going into the last end one rock ahead, Ada placed two perfect stones in the house. Then Dunn, Haight and Seibert guarded them like jewels. What are we saying? That's what they were!

A UNIFORM -- FINALLY!

For years St. Andrew's rinks have gone to important bonspiels clad in miscellaneous (but nice) clothing -- contrary to the trend in curling procedures. Your Curling Committee recognized this fallacy and commissioned Donald Dunn to solve the problem. He did and here's how --

"The Curling Committee has approved a certain azure blue sweater (made in Edinburgh, Scotland) worn by our Douglas winners, as an appropriate curling uniform for Saint Andrew's curlers. The Committee has also approved the patch worn on the sweater by the

said Douglas winners. Approval by the Committee, of course, does not mean that wearing of the sweater is in any sense obligatory.

"The sweater can be purchased by giving your order and your size (also specifying whether you want a patch) to Mr. Cleary at the Club. The sweater will be delivered before the next curling season and the charge will be placed on your bill. It is your responsibility to select and order the right size. There are 5 of these sweaters available at the Club owned by Messrs. Fiske, Seibert, Haight, Dunn and Ada. They are all size 44. Try one of these on before you order.

"The sweater, the customs charge, and the mailing, together with the patch, will cost about \$20.00, probably a little less."

We hope as many as possible St. A curlers will order. Our guys representing New York State will be so garbed in the U. S. Men's Nationals at Chicago.

HOW WE DOIN' DEPARTMENT

New York newspapers' improved coverage of Grand National's various bonspiels provide results as the events happen. Coverage is also provided in North American Curling News and at that semi-circular podium operated by Walter.

BLANTON WIND-UP


