Swedish Curlers

The visiting team of Swedish curlers will arrive in New York about February 10. After some sightseeing they will curl at St. Andrews on February 12. For this, St. Andrews is postponing their regularly scheduled February 12 curling meet with other clubs. The visitors will come out by bus for lunch and there will be six matches during the afternoon. Each of the four Westchester clubs will present a rink, the Wicks will present a rink to curl with the Swedish ladies and the last rink may be a potpourri drawn from the four clubs.

The curling will be followed by cocktails and dinner. Members of all clubs are invited and indeed urged to attend the luncheon or the dinner or both and to spectate. Members will sign for their lunch or dinner and the cost of transportation, entertainment and meals for the visitors will be allocated to the participating clubs. Those who curl will pay a \$5.00 entrance fee.

We hope that as many as possible will attend some or all of the festivities arranged for our visitors. It may be a good background when you next curl in Sweden.

We are indebted to Joe Ringland for forwarding a brief note taken from a mid-western newspaper which illustrates one of the wide variety of crises that may face curlers in competition. Engaged in a tight match in the finals of a big bonspiel, the situation was reported thus:


There are openings on almost all of the other rinks.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING AND DINNER AT THE ARDSLEY COUNTRY CLUB, WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 23

All members are urged to be present. Very important matters will be before the members for decision relating to the new curling rink proposed to be built near the first tee of the Ardsley Country Club.

Bar service available at 7 P.M. Dinner at 8 P.M.

<u>Sign your name</u>, check whether you will be there or not, and return the enclosed postcard to Charlie Colgan.

To further proceedings toward the building of a new four sheet curling rink overlooking the Hudson River near the first tee of the Ardsley Country Club, a Finance Committee has been appointed: Ashley Thorndike,, Chairman; Lester Graaskamp, Virgil Hager, Buren McCormack and George Shirk. This committee and the Planning Committee - Bob Reed, Chairman; Ralph Sheets, Cuyler Stevens, Dick Wells and Bill Wood (Hal Sothern by proxy) - met Sunday evening and approved a plan for raising funds to finance the cost of the new rink.

The group agreed that the most desirable and economical site would be near the new golf house planned by the Ardsley Country Club. The latter would have bar,

food and locker facilities, available to the Curlers and making it unnecessary to incorporate those into the structure for the new rink. Parking accommodations are already there. We are encouraged to believe that a long-term lease at nominatl rental, for sufficient land for the new rink, can be obtained from the Country Club, if the curlers can give positive evidence of their ability to finance such a rink.

Based on cost records from several other curling rinks, it is estimated a four sheet rink, in keeping with the Country Club's golf house, can be built for a cost of not more than \$140,000. It is proposed that the Hudson River Curling Corporation, a non-profit New York corporation, be formed to construct the rink. The Ardsley Curling Club and the New York Caledonian Curling Club would provide the funds for construction by capital contributions to the Hudson River Curling Corporation, and by their members' purchase of 4% Notes of the Hudson River Curling Corporation. Such a rink would accommodate 200 men curlers - 50 men per sheet. (St. Andrews now has about 56 men per sheet).

Voting control of the Hudson River Curling Corporation and allocation of curling time would be in proportion to the funds provided. Desiring no less than a one-half interest in the curling time available, the Ardsley Curling Club must provide at least one-half of the estimated costs - that is, \$70,000. We would thereby be entitled to 100 memberships (for a reasonable period additions to our present membership would first be available to Ardsley Country Club members). The New York Caledonians are confident of their ability to raise one half of the needed funds.

\$70,000 from the Ardsley Curlers. Without these funds (and Caledonia's) firmly at hand, the Country Club could hardly be expected to grant the desired lease, and no firm commitments for plans and construction could be sought.

The Planning Committee and the Finance Committee, in meeting Sunday, agreed that the present members must be the chief source of these funds, and recommend to the membership approval of the following:

- Each member agree to make a capital contribution of \$200 toward the new rink. In this form, this payment would be free of the 20% dues tax. This would raise about \$10,000 of Ardsley's share. (All new members would be required to make a contribution of the same amount.)
- 2. The remaining \$60,000 needed from Ardsley would be raised by the sale of 4% Capital Notes to the members.

Season payments of \$120 from each of 200 members (Ardsley and Caledonia) - (\$112.50 ice rental to Hudson River Curling Corporation and \$7.50 dues to the respective clubs) would produce \$22,500 income to the Hudson River Curling Corporation for the curling season. This should provide \$10,000 per season for operating expenses, \$2,500 for maintenance and repairs, and leave \$10,000 for interest and amortization of the \$120,000 of Capital Notes of Hudson River Curling Corporation. At this rate, the Notes could be repaid with 4% interest within 17 years. Income from Capital Contributions from new members (at \$200 each) and any revenues from women's and mixed curling, could provide faster repayment of the Capital Notes.

In a previous approach to financing a new rink, the Ardsley Curlers were almost unanimous in their willingness to accept a \$300 per member Capital Assessment to a Building Fund. Now that we have in prospect a most desirable site which promises the lowest possible cost (no land cost, no parking lot cost, low utilities connections) and have assurances of the Caledonians as a partner, I urge the members to support the recommendations of their committees. They are unable to proceed further without your pledge of financial backing.

Please return your postcard (SIGNED) to Charlie Colgan indicating whether you will be present at the Dinner, Wednesday, January 23. In either event, vote "yes" or "no" on the proposed financing plan. A "yes" vote indicates you approve the plan for each member to make a \$200 Capital Contribution toward the new rink. Wouldn't you like to curl on ice that takes the proper bend on either turn?

The Farmington and Highland Curling Clubs resigned because of diminished membership.


Point Curling

Closing Dinner

The Closing Dinner for the 1962-63 Season was held on April 3, 1963 at the Ardsley Country Club, following the customary pre-dinner ceremonies in the panelled study. There were present 32 active members and Vic Hockmeyer (presently Associate from Irvington, Virginia) who had arranged his schedule to enable him to be here. It was very pleasant to see Vic again.

The President called the meeting to order about the time coffee was served. He reported briefly on the winning of the Iceless Ronspiel by Ardsley, courtesy of Messrs. Wood and James, who won the Ardsley Bowl with the low team gross.

Curling Chairman Kemp reviewed the season, with the highlights of the winning of the Griffith (HASTINGS), the Dykes (SIBERT), the Caledonian (STEWART), and the Jug Ogden (MCCORMACK-WARNER). He reported also the winning of the Ardsley Cup in the Annual Washington's Birthday competition with St. Andrews.

President Sheets then awarded the Ardsley Bowl to the winners and the Windeler trophy, symbol of the club championship, to Ad Hastings, the peerless leader of the winning rink. Buren McCormack took temporary custody of the Jug Ogden trophy for his rink but apparently its permanent home is in the trophy case at St. Andrews.

Ad Hastings took occasion to note that Bart Eddison, who was on his winning Windeler rink this year, was a winner of the Windeler pin 30 years ago.

The Curling Chairman also remarked upon the experimental point curling competition held on the extra ice late in the season; which was led by Bill Wood, followed by Ad Hastings. In a brief discussion, the consensus of the members was in favor of more point curling if possible, including some at the beginning of the season, assuming ice were available.

Bill Wood, the present Grand National President, took home an additional trophy - the famous and cherished Fur Lines.

The President then reported on the new ice situation, saying that the possibility of combined action with Caledonia seemed a very realistic objective, provided something were done soon. Ash Thorndike reported on the inquiries made so far by the Finance Committee, which have led that committee to believe, on the basis of inquiries and answers so far, that they could produce in the neighborhood of over \$60,000. Treasurer Graaskamp reported that 37 members have so far responded positively to the \$200 capital assessment, producing a fund of \$6,850 (\$600 of this from 3 Associate members). He stated he expected the members who have not yet responded would be heard from in the near future.

The President then reported that the new die for the Ardsley Medal (the first award in the Cuthbertson) approved by the Executive Committee of the Grand National at the annual meeting in Schenectady on March 1, would be put in process and that a Committee would be appointed with power to design the new pin. The proposal received unanimous approval.

Dick Wells then presented the report of the Nominating Committee which recommended the following candidates for office:

President - Virgil Hager Vice President - Robert L.Reid Treasurer - Lester W. Graaskamp Secretary - William P. Rogan

There being no further nominations, the President called for a voice vote and the foregoing slate was unanimously elected by the members present.

There being no further official business to come before the meeting, and after several expressions of affection and admiration for Bart Eddison for his many years of fine curling, the meeting adjourned.

U.S. Men's Curling Association

The most recent issue of Curling News reports, and it is a pleasure to pass this on, that Bill Wood is one of the new regional Vice Presidents, Linc Seibert of St. Andrews is the new President of the U.S. Men's Curling Association, and Don Dunn of St. Andrews is one of the new directors.

The 1964 U.S. National Championships will be held in Utica, and the 1965 Championships will be held in Seattle.
