ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB

WINDELER RULES

1965

1. The Committee hopes to be able to arrange ice for playoffs in the case of ties for either the top or bottom rankings in Windeler standings this season. The Committee has decided that if the extra ice is unavailable, ties will be broken by the net-stone count, and it is also possible that the net-stone count may determine eligibility for a playoff ~~match in the event of a three-way tie at either end~~ without sufficient ice for a round-robin playoff, as distinguished from a knock-out playoff. Therefore, all matches should be played to the last stone and the net-stone count will be carried forward during the season.
2. Each substitute, to a maximum of two per rink, shall cost a one-stone penalty except for the following who shall each cost a two-stone penalty: Hastings, Hager, Hockmeyer, Colgan, McCormack, Nolan, Ringland, Sibert, Thorndike, Wells, Stevenson, S., Stewart and Wood.
3. The Blanton rules shall apply generally except as modified above.
4. All matches will be 10 ends, except for extra ends to break a tie after 10 ends.

THE WILDS AND JUG OGDEN COMPETITIONS

RULES GOVERNING PLAY IN THE INTER-CLUB MATCHES

1964 - 1965

1. Games shall be played according to schedule. There can be no arrangements, even by mutual consent, for play of cancelled games.
2. The Sponsor Club identification of the Rinks entered in these competitions, together with the names of the Skips, and all members assigned to the various Rinks, shall be filed with the St. Andrew's Curling Committee.
3. Changes in the designated team positions are permissible.
4. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one game. If only one substitute is used, that substitute must play LEAD. If two substitutes are used they must play LEAD and NUMBER TWO respectively. A Rink shall be considered to have defaulted if it has less than three members, including a substitute, available for play at the scheduled time.
5. A Rink will be penalized ONE point and ONE end if not on the ice and ready to play within 10 minutes of the time scheduled. An additional point and end will be added to the penalty for each succeeding 5 minutes tardiness. If both Rinks are not on the ice and ready to play within 10 minutes of the time scheduled, the game shall consist of NINE ends and shall be reduced ONE end for each succeeding 10 minutes of tardiness.  
  
(NOTE: these penalties are imposed by the Curling Committee and MAY NOT BE WAIVED by mutual consent of the Skips).
6. The Rink winning the greatest number of games will receive SIX medals. In the event of a tie between two or more Rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-Off".
7. Each game to consist of 10 ends, except as set forth in Rule 5.
8. North American Curling Rules shall govern where these rules are not specifically applicable.

## 1965 JUG OGDEN COMPETITION

### SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR ARDSLEY JUG OGDEN SKIPS

- (1) The Jug Ogden competition is designed primarily for junior skips and other curlers who normally play lead or second. However, in order to meet the complaint that senior curlers have no opportunity to curl at St. Andrews's on weekends after the Wilds Competition has been completed, except in bonspiels, Jug Ogden skips are required to offer each of the senior curlers listed below the line not less than one opportunity to curl during the competition. Subject to this obligation, the skips are urged to afford the members listed above the line the first opportunity to curl. If they are unable to fill their rinks from the names on the upper portion of the list, they are free to take players from the lower portion.
- (2) Players shown below the line can only play lead or second.
- (3) There is no penalty for substitutions, except as noted in the rules.
- (4) Regular skips and vice-skips (those listed below the line) when substituting must keep out of the house and refrain from advising the skip.

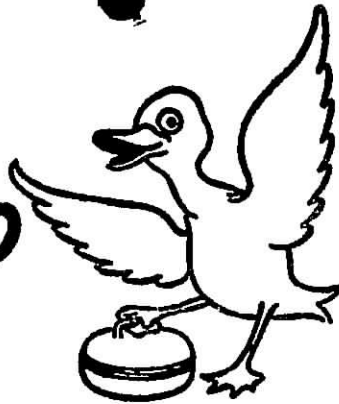

Anyone doubting the effect of good sweeping should be interested in an article in Sports Illustrated (Jan. 25). At the recent Tournament of Champions in Toronto, a machine delivered a series of stones with exactly equal velocity. "Stones that had the benefit of sweeping travelled as much as 12 feet farther than those left on their own."

This illustrates another critical factor - often overlooked - the ability of a skip to make a split-second decision and to use his sweepers to guide a stone to its most useful position. This is so easy to muff - so inviting to a hindsight remark.

We are indebted to "Grassy" for bringing up a very fine article in the December Industrial Bulletin of Arthur D. Little, Inc. of Cambridge, Mass. Entitled Rinkmanship the article thoughtfully describes the game of curling. When you consider the audience for this publication it is even more remarkable that they would do such a story. Would you agree with the authors statement that "unlike many other ulcer producing games, decorum and courtesy are built into the regulations and missed opportunities are quietly ignored". Maybe we should reproduce the article and distribute copies if only for the visiting firemen who can never see through to the heart of the game because of "those men in silly hats, sweeping."

Kenny Stevenson sent us an article entitled "Shuffleboard With Cold Feet" published in an industrial house organ. The story was particularly interesting because in Omaha, the curling facilities were financed and built by the Ak-Sar-Ben Civic Organization which rents the facilities back to the curlers. Maybe we can get the Thursday Club to handle this as their 1965 project!

One memorable part of the Cuthbertson Bonspeil which begin Feb. 4th is the dinner for participants plus members and wives, at the Ardsley Club. Preceding this will be cocktail parties at the homes of Messrs. Gorrissen, Peyser, Thorndike, Warner, and Wells.

Now don't get excited - you can't crash them all. The Committee has integrated and allocated all of us very nicely thank you, and lovely hostesses will see that each member has an invitation. We'll have a ball.

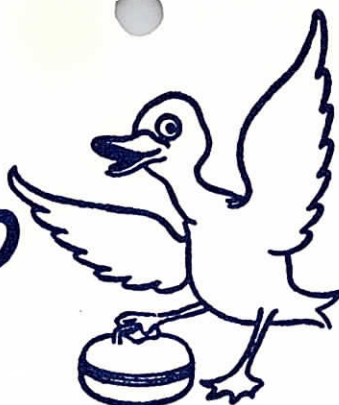

### The Cuthbertson

You sensed that it was going to be a great tournament when Plainfield, the newest grand national member, beat the Montreal Thistles in 9 ends!

But if you hadn't actually seen the finale, you wouldn't believe it. What a finish! It was in the finals of the big competition for the Ardsley Medal and squared off were Pointe Claire (Wright, Skip) from Quebec and Montreal Caledonia (Boyd, Skip), two great Canadian rinks. These two teams, in fact the same eight curlers, had met last year in the same finals and were all tied after the regulation 12 ends. Pointe Claire won by one point in the extra end---a great match.

Now they were at it again. Half way through, though the teams were about even, it seemed that the pressure of three days of tough curling with the late hours, dinners and parties was beginning to have its effect. But still Boyd continued to make difficult take-out "doubles", and Wright his graceful draw shots. Then Montreal began to pull away, winning several consecutive ends.

In the twelfth end it was Montreal by 9-5, an enormous lead. Everybody thought it was all over. Then a couple of shots were missed, and when Jim Wright, the Pointe Claire skip, came to the hack for his final shot, he was lying 3, and all he needed was a draw within the white circle for a 4 end and a tie. You've never heard such excitement behind a plateglass, for this was a shot he had been making all afternoon. His stone was laid so gracefully that as it started down the ice, it seemed to be traveling so slowly that it might not make the house. So everybody swept. Wright ran ahead of the stone joining the frantic sweepers, and the three of them pulled the stone to the front of the house and then it very slowly---drifted---right---on---through. The game was over, and Montreal had won 9-8. The perfect shot had been made and lost. What a game!

In the finals of the Caledonian, Winchester (Eteson) beat the Canadian club (Yurko) 13-8. In the Mahopac, Nashua (Collins) beat Nutmeg (Will) 11-7.

The Ardsley team of Colgan, (Skip) Stewart, Sibert, and Hockmeyer beat the Canadian club 10-4, then lost to Pointe Claire 9-6. This moved them into the second consolation in which they beat Mahopac 9-7, then in a sort of tit for tat lost to the Canadian club whom they had beaten earlier, by 15-6.

Ash Thorndike was vice skip on the team entered by the Westchester Curling Ass'n., and skipped by Reg Clute. They won 3 and lost to Pointe Claire in which, incidently, a six end was scored against them!

I asked Joe Milano if anything unusual had happened in the matches which he saw, and he said, "You're darned tootin'". Toward the end of the match with Albany, Caledonia, Ty Halstead, skip, had made what seemed to be a perfect shot. John Henderson, eager to sweep, let the stone get a little ahead of him. Ty yelled "sweep" and John in his haste lost his footing, fell in front of the stone! In a split second he arched up his stomach, the stone going under him, then he flopped back quickly enough to raise his arm (which had been supporting him) and let the stone glide on under it. In an instant John twice had to get parts of his body out of the way, and the stone never touched him - the shot was made and became an important part of their win over Albany.

Later I hunted up John who said the stone was so close to his face that he could have read the trade mark! This reminded Ash Thorndike of the time when, as a new curler, he fell flat on his "you know what" and expecting his anxious teammates to hurry and help him to his feet, heard his skip bellow, "Will you please get the hell out of the way"!

The Cuthbertson ended with the traditional presentation of the medals to the winners, and Virg made all of us proud of him.

Those responsible for the arrangements for the bonspiel deserve congratulations. The cocktail parties, the dinner, and most important of all - the ice were excellent. In fact Boyd, in his brief remarks when accepting the gold Ardsley medal, said that the ice was "second to none" - a great compliment to St. Andrews.

The President, Mr. Hager, called the meeting to order at 9:15 P. M. Present were Messrs:

Mr. Rogan was named as Acting Secretary and took the minutes of the meeting.

The President opened the meeting by thanking Messrs. Thorndike, Colgan, Brandt and Wells as the building committee, Sibert, Vice President, Graaskamp and Sheets, finance committee, on behalf of the entire membership for their skillful and unremitting efforts during the year just closed, and asked Mr. Thorndike to report on the status of the building plans.

Mr. Thorndike reported as follows: (1) the committee was unanimous in the position that a three (3) sheet rink be provided at this time, on the grounds (a) that no real saving would be effected by starting with two (2) sheets and later adding two (2) more, and (b) during the time the first two (2) sheets were in

operation, they would not provide adequate curling for the required 100 members. (At this point, his remarks were interrupted by a general expression of approval.) Approximate estimated figures for an original two (2) sheet set-up were reported at \$90,000.00 and for three (3) \$120,000.00. (2) Financing appeared within reach on the following plan:

Cash in treasury at this time	\$10,000.00
Fifty (50) new members @ \$200.00	10,000.00
Cash loans from 50 members at average of \$1500.00	75,000.00
Financing from outside sources	<u>25,000.00</u>
Total	\$120,000.00

(3) Ice machinery for (3) sheet operation \$17,000.00 (as compared to \$13,000.00 for (2) sheets); building to cost \$40,000.00-\$50,000.00;

(4) Cash loans from members would be promissory notes on which the first \$1,000.00 would bear no interest, any balance interest at 4%; loans by non-curlers and other friends of the club would be interest-bearing in full at 4% with provision that these notes would have priority for payment off over the notes of curlers.

At the close of this report, general discussion drew questions and remarks from Messrs. Marshall, Ringland, Koehl, Gorrisen, Colgan and others, all of which were answered to the satisfaction of the questioners and all present.

Mr. Colgan then reported on the situation with respect to negotiations with the Ardsley Country Club as follows: (1) the Country Club is clearly interested in working out a fair and reasonable arrangement under which some of the important points discussed and tentatively agreed upon, subject to approval by the membership of both Clubs, are: (a) a lease of land sufficient



for our purposes at \$1.00 per year for 25 years with options; (b) access and parking privileges; (c) Curling Club builds on leased land; (d) when cost of building fully paid out, building will become property of Country Club; (e) Curling Club controls membership with a special "bridge" provision that present members of the Country Club and new members accepted by the Country Club are automatically acceptable to the Curling Club on meeting all the financial requirements of the Curling Club, and, reciprocally, present Curling Club Members and new members are automatically acceptable to the Country Club, subject to meeting the financial requirements of the Country Club, this "bridge" provision to last for a term to be agreed on by the two Clubs; (f) at the time title to the building reverts to the Country Club, as provided in (d) above, special arrangements will be made to protect those members of the Curling Club who are not then and do not then or thereafter become members of the Country Club, providing for the said Curling members to continue as such. Mr. Fiske inquired whether this plan had the approval of the Country Club and Mr. Colgan responded that the Curling Club should be ready to make a commitment on a "when and if" basis. Mr. Thorndike added that the Country Club could not move in this matter before early June and Mr. Stewart contributed the information that the Governors of the Country Club had been asked whether they would go along "on principle" with the plan above outlined, and appeared favorably disposed, but would be obliged to submit the entire matter to a vote of the Country Club's active members at a meeting to be called.

At this time the attention of the membership of the Country Club is fully engaged with the problem of the solution of the handling of the first eighteen holes and it is deemed not to be a propitious time to bring on the Curling Club matter until the golf course question has been resolved. Mr. Hager stressed the advantage of having the Curling Club group committed and ready to go as soon as the Country Club is in a position to move.

Mr. Wells motion "that the committee report be approved and that the officers of the Curling Club be authorized to proceed with building plans and financing procedures subject to a report back to and ratification by the Curling Club," was seconded by Mr. K. Stevenson, and unanimously approved.

Questions directed to the plan were then discussed and answered to the satisfaction of all present, as follows:

Mr. Ringland: Non-members of the Country Club are protected as active Curling Club members as to food and drink privileges in the same manner as now enjoyed in the St. Andrew's arrangements.

Mr. May: The so-called "bridge membership" privileges between the two clubs will remain effective for at least one (1) year and as to each club, to the extent memberships in the different categories are available.

Mr. Kemp - Curling Club associate members are to have precedence over Country Club applicants for a reasonable period of time.

Mr. Briggs: Possibility that the lease for nominal rent plus operating costs (including utilities and share of real property taxes) could be cancelled by default in any of these payments at any time during the 25 years would be protected by a reasonable grace period, after which dispossess proceedings would become available to the Country Club as Lessor.

The President reported that a contract for the purchase of 24 pairs of matched stones, for delivery in October, 1965, had been negotiated and upon motion by Mr. Koehl seconded by Mr. Warner, was unanimously approved.

The President, on behalf of the entire membership, gave the sincere thanks of all for their service to:

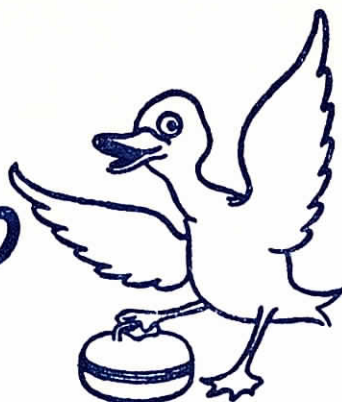

held on June 23, 1965 at the home of the President

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The President, Mr. Hager, called the meeting to order at 8:16 P.M. The following 28 active members were present:

On motion, the minutes of the meeting of April 29th, 1965 were accepted without reading.

The President opened the meeting by requesting a report from the Ice Committee, consisting of Messrs. Thorndike, Chairman, Brandt, Colgan, Graaskamp, Hager, Sheets, Sibert, and Wells.

Mr. Wells reported that he had had discussions with Mr. Robert Roy about obtaining a loan to finance the Club's new Ice from Sunnyside Federal Saving and Loan Association of Irvington and read his letter to Mr. Roy of June 15, 1965, a copy of which is attached. Mr. Wells added that recently Mr. Roy had suggested that since the Curling Club was a membership organization the Bank might require the members to endorse the note, but suggested that we proceed on the basis that we will obtain the necessary loan. The President charged a committee consisting of Messrs. Graaskamp, McAfee, and Brandt, of continuing negotiations with Mr. Roy in Mr. Wells' absence.

Mr. Colgan reported that it would be necessary (a) to form a new membership corporation, (b) to work out the "bridge" arrangement for reciprocal membership with Ardsley Country Club and (c) to negotiate house privileges for curlers with the Country Club. The President said that he had told Mr. William Marshall, President of the Country Club, of the seriousness of the Club's plans and was advised that the Governors of the Country Club approved of working out a mutually satisfactory arrangement with the Curling Club. The President said he also discussed with Mr. Marshall (a) the availability of electricity, water and sewerage, (b) a share of the bar receipts generated by curlers and (c) the possibility that the planned lift for golfers be available to curlers. A general discussion followed in which Mr. Sothorn requested that the new site be staked, and Mr. Ryan raised the question of whether the new facility could be made a dual purpose building. The President requested Mr. Brandt to look into the possibility of sound-proofing the building.



Continued -2.

Mr. Edison then moved, Mr. Sothern seconded, and it was unanimously voted that the Club proceed on the basis of Mr. Wells' letter of June 15th.

Mr. Graaskamp reported that verbal pledges of \$66,000. bonds had been received from active and associate members and three friends, and that the solicitation was not yet completed. A letter pledging the purchase of bonds was then distributed, signed and returned to the Treasurer, Mr. Graaskamp.

Mr. Brandt reported that, (a) he had discussed building plans with Architect Ed. Wallace, who had planned the rink at Darien, (b) the committee recommended that the Club build three sheets now, rather than two sheets now and add two sheets later and (c) Butler construction be used.

Mr. McAfee then moved, Mr. Stewart seconded, and it was unanimously approved:

RESOLVED that the proper officers of the Club be and they hereby are authorized and directed to take any and all such action, including the execution and filing of any and all documents, which may be necessary or desirable in connection with incorporating the Club as a membership corporation under the Membership Corporation Law of the State of New York, the execution of a lease with Ardsley Country Club, the obtaining of a mortgage loan from Sunnyside Federal Saving & Loan Association of Irvington, or other lending institutions, the soliciting of bids from contractors for the construction of the new curling facility on the premises to be leased from the Ardsley Country Club, the application for a building permit, including an application to the Board of Zoning Appeals of the Village of Irvington for a permit under the Village Zoning Ordinance, the issuance and sale of promissory notes to members of the Club, and to a few friends of the Club who are particularly interested in a new curling facility, all to the end that the Club may be organized and the facility constructed as promptly as possible.

Membership Committee Chairman McCormack stated that he would need the support of the entire membership to increase the Club's membership to the planned total and would mail out return cards shortly for the names of prospective new members. He suggested that the Club try to interest Sleepy Hollow Country Club members in curling and requested ideas for the membership drive. Mr. Rogan suggested distributing pamphlets on curling and having a Cocktail Party at which curling movies would be shown (Mr. Wells suggested the Briar movies). Mr. Sheets suggested displaying an architectural rendering of the new facility. Mr. Stewart said that the Country Club members would vote on the curling proposal in July, suggested that a letter be mailed inviting them to a meeting after Labor Day and that the invitation be extended to prospective non-Country Club members. Mr. Wells stated that the provisions of the By-Laws dealing with the election of new members are cumbersome and proposed that consideration be given to revision.

At Mr. Rogan's suggestion, the membership stood for a moment of silent prayer in memory of our friends, Bob Reed and Cuyler Stevens.

On motion of Mr. Thorndyke, seconded by Mr. Sheets, and unanimously voted, the meeting was adjourned at 10:14 P.M.

Dear Bob:

This will confirm the information I gave you at our meeting this morning regarding the plans of the Ardsley Curling Club with respect to the construction of new curling facilities. The Curling Club proposes to build a new curling rink on ground to be leased from The Ardsley Country Club. The estimated cost of the project is \$125,000. Of this amount the Curling Club proposes to raise at least \$75,000 from its own funds and from subscriptions by its present active and associate members and by nonmembers interested in promoting the development of new curling facilities in Westchester County. The Curling Club seeks to finance the balance required for the project up to a maximum of \$50,000 through a proposed 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ -year leasehold mortgage as discussed with you.

The Ardsley Curling Club is an organization of curlers which has been in existence since the early 1930s. Membership is largely made up of residents of Irvington, Ardsley Park and adjacent communities. At the present time there are 55 active members and a number of associate or inactive members. A great many of these are people who will be known to you. I will be glad to furnish a roster of the active and associate members if that would be of interest.

During its entire existence the Curling Club has used the ice facilities at The St. Andrew's Golf Club in Hastings. These have been rented from St. Andrew's and additionally members of the Curling Club have enjoyed house privileges at The St. Andrew's Golf Club during the winter season. Because of rapid expansion in general interest in curling in our area plus the growth in the membership of our club and the growth in the number of St. Andrew's Golf Club members who are curling, the facilities at St. Andrew's are no longer adequate to meet the demand for curling ice in the area. It is in order to provide more and better facilities for our own membership that the Ardsley Curling Club now proposes to construct a new rink.

The Curling Club expects to enter into a 25-year lease with The Ardsley Country Club at a nominal annual rental for a site for the new facilities located on the recently acquired Gould House property of the Country Club and closely adjacent to the new Club House of the Country Club. In this way utilities and parking space will be available for the new curling operation and, in addition, the bar and restaurant facilities and the locker rooms of the Country Club can be used by the curlers. Arrangements between the Curling Club and the Country Club will provide a basis by which curlers

who are not members of the Country Club will have Club privileges during the curling season. In return, Country Club members who may wish to join the Curling Club will have certain priorities with respect to openings for new memberships in the Curling Club. The Curling Club will remain solely responsible for financing the new curling facilities. It is anticipated that at the end of the lease term, provided that all indebtedness of the Curling Club has been retired, the Country Club will acquire ownership of the curling facilities with continuing membership rights of curlers who are not then members of the Country Club adequately protected.

The proposed new facilities will have three sheets of curling ice, a warm-room, an engine or utilities room, toilets, etc. The building will be approximately 185 feet by 50 feet. It will be constructed of the Butler-type prefabricated steel. The estimated cost of the facilities complete is \$125,000. This estimate is based on the design of Mr. Edward Wallace of Darien, Connecticut, the architect who designed the curling facilities constructed at the Country Club of Darien during 1963. The latter is the most recently built curling rink in this part of the country and the layout is similar to that planned for the Ardsley Curling Club, the only difference being that Darien has a concrete block wall construction and uses a built-up truss type of roof and has somewhat more elaborate warmroom facilities than we plan. Mr. Wallace's estimate of the cost of our proposed facility has been checked by the contractor who built the Darien facility with appropriate changes included for increases in construction costs as between Westchester and Fairfield County and for increases in labor and materials since 1963. We are satisfied that the estimate represents a conservative forecast of the bids that will actually be received.

The Curling Club proposes to finance the facility as follows:

1. \$10,000 of cash from the Club's present funds.
2. \$65,000 of subordinated notes to be sold to the active members, to associate members and to other persons interested in promoting curling in this area. It is proposed that the first \$1,000 of notes purchased by each active curler will be interest-free. Notes purchased by each active curler in excess of \$1,000 and notes sold to associates and others will carry an interest rate of 4%. We have preliminary indications from active members, associate members, and others that a minimum of \$65,000 of these notes will be purchased. There is a good probability that \$5,000 to \$10,000 additional will be subscribed by members and by others who have not yet been approached but who are regarded as prospective buyers. Any increase over \$65,000 in the amount of notes subscribed will, of course, reduce the amount of the leasehold mortgage.
3. The balance required through the leasehold mortgage. The maximum amount would be \$50,000, reduced to the extent additional notes were purchased as indicated above.

There are attached copies of the two statements I handed you this morning. One of these shows the estimated annual cost of operating the new curling facility and the other forecasts revenues for the first four years, by the end of which time we would expect to have achieved a full level of membership. With respect to the estimate of annual expenditures, the cost figures are based on a careful survey of the experience of other clubs, including St. Andrew's and Darien, adjusted where appropriate to the conditions with respect to taxes, power, etc., which will apply to the Ardsley circumstances. With respect to the income projections on the second sheet, we have anticipated that we will in the first year increase the active membership by 35 new men curlers. Inasmuch as curling will be the principal winter activity conducted on the grounds of the Ardsley Curling Club and inasmuch as the membership will be open to present members of the Country Club, we expect that there will be no difficulty in obtaining the first 35 additional members. There has always been a substantial waiting list of persons desiring to join the present Ardsley Curling Club and, while the financial burdens under the new arrangement will be somewhat increased, we do not anticipate difficulty in filling our roster. After the first year we project 25 new active members for the second year and 20 new active members for each of the third and fourth years, which will bring the membership to the level of 150, which is regarded as the approximate capacity of the new facility. In addition, provision is made for building up an active women's curling group and for a mixed curling organization. Both of these activities have proved to be popular at St. Andrew's. They permit use of the facilities during weekdays and other off hours when they would otherwise stand idle if curling were confined to men only.

Additional cash will probably be received during the first four years from the following:

1. Each new active member will be urged to subscribe to subordinated notes. We have no way of predicting how much money will be raised from this source but on the basis of our experience with the present active group we expect to receive some additional funds from purchases by new members. Funds so obtained will be used to reduce the leasehold mortgage.
2. If there is open ice unused by the curlers in the Ardsley Curling Club during the four-year period of building our membership up to maximum activity, we will consider renting the ice to outside groups (for example, to members of Sleepy Hollow who may wish to develop an interest in curling at that club) on a basis similar to the arrangement we have up until this time had with St. Andrew's.

The structure of dues and initiation fees used in preparing the income projection represents our thinking at this point regarding what will be appropriate. I am sure you will understand that should the project go forward, there may be some changes in detail from the dues and initiation fee structure assumed for this projection. The objective, however, will be to provide sufficient revenue to cover debt service on the leasehold mortgage and all operating expenses and leave a comfortable margin.

The projected bar profits represent an estimate based on the experience of other clubs adjusted to give effect to a sharing of such profits with the Country Club. An arrangement of this type has been accepted in principle by the governors of the Country Club.

At our meeting this morning you indicated that you would like to inspect the Darien facilities. I will be glad to arrange for this at whatever time seems suitable from your standpoint.

I believe this covers most of the salient points. No doubt there will be details on which you will want further information and I will be glad to provide this at your request.

As mentioned this morning, I would like to call you sometime late on Thursday so that I can receive your reactions in advance of my meeting Thursday evening with the committee of our Club which is working on this problem.
