MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The beginning-of=the-season membership meeting was held at Virge Hager's house on November 3. Minutes of the meeting will be enclosed with a later issue of DUCK SOUP, but for the benefit of those who couldn't attend, the gist of the meeting was to welcome Bob Irons back as an active member and to elect Bob Whitman as an active member and Ed Childs as an honorary member. Dick Stoehr was also elected an active member, but unfortunately Dick will not be able to be with us this season.

At the meeting Virge Hager reported that, because of unexpectedly high bids from builders, we could not proceed with the building of our own ice for use this season. The membership authorized the officers of the Club to continue with their building plans and, if they considered it feasible to construct an ice facility within our budgetary limitations, to have the footings put in before the end of the year. We understand that the Building Committee has been working and that prospects look good.

THE OPENING DINNER

A jovial opening dinner was held on November 10 at the Ardsley Country Club. Since our unsuccessful attempt to obtain an acceptable bid (all bids were above the budget) on the building in September, we have been working with the architect and several contractors in hopes of amending certain specifications to reduce cost of construction. Last week the final site of the building on the Ardsley Country Club property was agreed to by Bill Marshall, President of the Country Club, and we placed appropriate markers at the boundaries of the proposed building.

The Ardsley Curling Club has already incurred considerable expense in connection with this project, including architect and consultant fees, purchase of stones, and surveying costs. It is expected we will need additional money as soon as the contract is let.

This is how the score board looked as our rink - Wells, Thorndike, Nolan and D. Stevenson - came off the ice in the middle of the twelveth end as the Ardsley Medal winners. There was nothing wentful about the match except fine, steady curling by both teams.

SWEEPING

Your Curling Chairman commends to the attention of all active curlers, the enclosed article on sweeping from the March issue of "The Curler". While the season is nearly over, the Committee suggests that you save the article for future reference and that you might like to brush up on your sweeping during the summer months.

GUARDING

Your Secretary suggesteth that thou plan not a running shot when thou art asked for a guard, lest thou pass thine own shot through, so sending thy skip up in the air; such play getteth his goat, queereth his game, causeth him to swallow his tobacco, and to revile thee openly.

CURLING TIP # 19

The Art of Good Sweeping

by Ross Murdoch

Ross Murdoch played second for Norm Houck's 1964 Tournament of Champions rink.

One of the most important aspects of the curling game is sweeping. Good sweeping gets results.

To sweep well, you must use the proper equipment. Choose a broom with a comfortable weight and a handle of size and length that suits you. Wear a very tight pair of gloves, for loose or bulky ones tend to roll up and cause those miserable blisters.

What is the proper grip? If you are a right-handed sweeper, place the handle of the broom across the palm of the right hand so that the end of the broom is just about flush with the top of the index finger and the top of the thrumb. Place the left hand under the handle so that the handle rests across the palm at an angle of about 45°, then wrap the thumb and fingers around the top of the handle.

In the grip, the right and left hands should be a comfortable distance apart, approximately 10" to 12".

All sweeping action comes from the fast movement of the left hand and wrist; the right hand follows the handle and is used for a guide.

The footwork to employ as you move up the ice on the left side of the rock being swept is most important. Your feet should initially be shoulder width apart. Slide the left foot forward about two feet, putting a little weight on the right foot at the same time. Then bring up the right foot alongside the left. This is, of course, a very fast, coordinated motion.





March 16, 1966

If he lost one, he would end up tieing Nolan with 5 wins and 2 losses and, as it turned out, would have lost on stone count. So everything hung in the balance on Friday night. With Nolan chewing his nails in the gallery, Colgan came through with another victory, beating W-8 (Malm's rink) 11-8. Colgan finished the competition with 6 wins and 1 loss, and to whom do you suppose he lost one match? - Nolan!

At the other end of the spectrum we find Malm and Sibert, with 2 wins and 5 losses. However, last year's winner, Sibert, wins the Furline on stone count.

THE SCOTCH CUP, Vancouver, Mar. 21-24

Teams from Canada, France, Norway, Scotland, Sweden, Switzerland and the United States (North Dakota) competed in this world championship. This is the first time this competition has been held outside of Scotland. The Canadian team won it for the seventh time in 8 tries.

Next year the U. S. Men's Curling Championship will be held in Boston to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Grand National Curling Club of America.

SPECIAL MEETING OF MEMBERS

Following the Closing Dinner, a special meeting of members was held at the Ardsley Country Club on Thursday, March 24. Represented were 45 Active members (38 in person and 7 by proxy) and 2 Associate members.

President Hager, who acted as Chairman, opened the meeting by announcing that Harold Leaf of St. Andrew's had informed him that the March 27 issue of the Sunday News would feature a 2 page spread of color photographs of curling at St. Andrew's which would include pictures of Ardsley Curling Club members.

He also reported that the Club's by-laws were not in final form, but that the Law Committee was working on them and that they should be completed by the next membership meeting.

He then stated that the first order of business was the election of directors for the coming year. After hearing the report of Nominating Committee Chairman McCormack, the membership passed a resolution unanimously electing the following:

Colgan Graaskamp Hager McAfee Robinson Sibert Thorndike Wells

There followed a discussion of the New Rink proposal. Vice President Colgan reported that the Leasehold Agreement with the Country Club was in final form. It provides

- 1. for a 50 year lease of land for the Rink at \$1 a year plus any tax increase,
- for access through the present driveway and parking lot (or any substitutes) and construction access, if needed,

- 3. that the Curling Club will be responsible for operating costs,
- 4. that the Curling Club can issue up to \$50,000 of notes for repairs or improvements in addition to the existing financing, and
- 5. that when all debt is paid, the building becomes the property of the Country Club.

He also reported that the Interclub Agreement was in final form. It provides

- Curling Club members with signing privileges and the use of the Clubhouse in connection with curling activities,
- the Curling Club with 25% of the gross beverage sales to curlers, which is to be applied against the Mortgage and Notes,
- 3. that Curling Club members can join the Country Club and Country Club members can join the Curling Club automatically, if vacancies exist, with each Club setting its own membership limits and classes of members,
- 4. that after 15 years the Country Club can provide the money to pay off the building debt and thus "buy out" the Curling Club,
- 5. that whenever the Country Club becomes the owner of the building, Curling Club members will have 5 years of curling privileges at the same rate as Country Club members and the right to join the Country Club, and
- 6. that if the Country Club dissolves, the Curling Club, within 90 days, may buy the leased land together with land for parking and access at a price to be agreed upon or an appraised price.

He further reported that we had received a committment letter dated February 17, 1966 from Sunnyside Savings & Loan Association for a \$50,000, $12\frac{1}{2}$ year, 6% Mortgage (this will entail payments of interest and principal by us of about \$475 per month).

President Hager then reported that

- an application for a special permit under the Irvington Zoning Ordinance had been filed and a public hearing would be held April 6. Favorable action is anticipated, and
- 2. the Irvington Planning Board had recommended favorable action conditioned upon reasonable landscape screening as required.

Assistant Secretary McAfee reported that we had received an exemption from registration under the New York Blue Sky Laws and that the Notes on the Club's borrowing from members would be ready to be issued shortly.

Building Chairman Brandt reported that a construction contract had been negotiated with builder Al Ross which would involve a construction cost of approximately \$130,000. While certain changes in the plans had been made to reduce cost, the finished rink of 3 sheets and a warm room would be substantially similar to the Nutmeg Rink at Darien. It would have two 6 foot picture windows facing East; also a 6 foot fireplace, most of the cost of which had been donated by Libby von Bernuth in memory of her husband, Carl. He also discussed other aspects of the proposed building.

Vice President Wells reported that he had checked Ross with the Sunnyside Bank and with other sources and that in his judgment Ross was a competent builder who could do the job. He expressed the hope that construction would begin in May and be completed in August.

Treasurer Graaskamp reported on finances, saying that with money in hand, the mortgage loan and performance on the outstanding commitments, we would have the money for construction of the Rink. President Hager noted that Canadian Ice Machinery Company is holding its price quoted last year.

After further discussion, the membership unanimously authorized the directors and officers to to proceed to complete the building program.

President Hager then thanked all the members for their efforts in connection with the building program and called on Albie Shaw.

Albie reported that Edith Townsend had very generously contributed \$500 toward the construction of our New Rink in memory of her husband, Charles. Charlie Townsend was one of the charter members of the Club.

Membership Committee Chairman McCormack then thanked President Hager for his fine leadership during the past 3 years and asked for the assistance of the entire membership in securing new members.
