BUILDING PROGRESS

The site has been cleared and stakes mark the location of the curling rink. On June 11th a ground-breaking ceremony was held at the site with Messrs. Colgan, Graaskamp, McAfee, Robinson, Sibert, Wells, Brandt, Hastings, Eddison and McCormack participating. Thanks to Gordon Hamersly and Lee Heffner, this event received excellent coverage in a number of the local newspapers.

A few technicalities of a legal nature had delayed us briefly but Charlie Colgan now assures us that these minor obstacles have been removed. The building contract in its final form is being signed by Ed Sibert and Al Ross, the builder, on June 29th. Mr. Ross will then proceed with the actual construction, which should take about ten weeks. The Curling Club, incidentally, has employed Mr. Stephen H. Hart of Irvington to represent us on the scene during the period of construction.

MEMBERSHIP

Since the annual meeting in April, the Membership Committee under the leadership of Mac McCormack has been actively at work on its program to increase the men's membership of the Club to a minimum of 100 for the season 1966-67. The following actions have been taken:

- 1) A new schedule of dues for the several classes of membership and an initiation fee for new men members have been established. The new schedule was sent to each active member with Mac's letter of May 17th.
- 2) All active members have been asked to indicate their intentions with respect to curling this coming year. With most of the replies in at this writing, it is indicated that only Willy Gorrissen will not plan to participate next year. We greatly regret Willy's withdrawal for 1966-67 and hope that he will be back with us the following year.
- 3) The associate members have been circularized for indications with respect to their intentions to curl. Albie Shaw and Paul Conley will again become active members and we are, of course, delighted that they are going to be on the ice next year. In addition, while he has not been an associate member in recent years, former active member John Lanigan has indicated that he will also be able to curl again in 1966-67. This is a most welcome addition to the color as well as to the decibel level of the Club.
- 4) The Membership Committee has compiled a list of all persons who have been suggested to us as possibly being interested in curling. The Committee with the assistance of many of the other members of the Club is in the process of getting in touch with all of the individuals named as prospects to determine the extent of their interest and inform them about the game and about the program of our Club. Additional suggestions continue to be received by the Committee and these persons will be contacted as seems appropriate having regard to our agreement with the Country Club. The Membership Committee will welcome your additional ideas with respect to prospects.
- 5) On June 1st an indoctrination meeting for the purpose of informing interested prospects was held at the Ardsley Country Club. All members of the Ardsley Country Club as well as all other persons who had been suggested as prospects were invited to attend this session. Al Koehl acted as chairman and was in his usual inimitable form. Two films, one explaining the game, were shown. Mac McCormack described the membership program. The meeting was attended by an overflow crowd and appeared to have been successful in stimulating considerable enthusiasm on the part of prospects. In spite of the large turnout, many interested persons were unable to attend. It has been suggested that the Committee stage another similar presentation later in the year. In all probability this will be done in September.

- 6) A letter has been sent to every member of the Ardsley Country Club advising him of the opportunity to join the Curling Club under the terms of our agreement with the Country Club. The Membership Committee has asked for response from the Country Club prospects by July 15th and has provided a return post card. The returns from this mailing have only begun to come in but they show considerable interest. To date we have received affirmative responses from two prospective male members, three female members and one couple interested in mixed membership. Others have asked for and are receiving additional information. Stu Stevenson, who as a member of the Country Club received the Membership Committee's letter, returned his post card marked, "Not Interested," and added, "My wife doesn't like to me associate with curlers. After what they have done to me through the years, I think she is right." In spite of this, we hope that Katy will see the light and that Stu will let her join the ladies.

Accordingly, they are now members and we are delighted to welcome them to the curling britherhood.

8) The able chairman of the Membership Committee, Buren McCormack, is in Russia for the month of July trying to master the intricacies of the new "hammer and sickle" slide delivery which the Red comrades claim to have invented. In the meantime, the work of the Committee goes forward under the direction of Bob Whitman and Dan Lackey. They or other members of the Committee will probably be in touch with you during July to ask your further participation in the solicitation of specific new members. While the Committee has already made contact with a large number of the prospects on our original list and while the interest shown to date is most encouraging, there remains a great deal to be done if we are to reach the goal of 100 active men members by the beginning of the season. The Committee will need and will appreciate the help of every member of the Club. There are enclosed five copies of reprints of the June 12th article in THE NEW YORK TIMES covering the ground-breaking ceremonies. Al Koehl secured these for us. It is suggested that you use these to show your friends who may be prospects for membership.

FINANCES

Graasy reports that we are solvent and that most of the pledges have now been met in full. The few individuals who have not yet paid have been asked to settle with Graasy by July 15th.

Several very nice gifts have been received, the latest being an offer from Bill Kimbel to furnish all or part of the warm room. While the details haven't been worked out, Bruce May's Committee is getting some estimates and will come up with a few ideas of what might be done.

Dear Bruce:

I am sure you and your house committee have thought of this problem but just in case:

Some of us have talked informally about some sort of plaque in recognition of Bill Kimball's generous gift for decorating the warm room. I am heartily in favor of this but we should bear in mind other contributors: (a) Libby von Bernuth gave the Club \$1,000 for the fireplace in honor of Carl; (b) Edith Townsend, widow of Charles Townsend, formerly a member of Ardsley, contributed \$500 toward the new rink in memory of her husband (see minutes of Special Meeting of Directors, March 24, 1966); (c) it is my understanding from several sources that Paul Barrett has donated the stone which will be the facing for the fireplace.

Since Paul Barrett is not yet a member of the Curling Club, this is a particularly gratifying donation.

This gives us really four principal donors to the decoration of the warm room - I do not believe we have made any specific allocation of Edith Townsend's \$500, but it would, I think, be appropriately dedicated to the warm room.

We could consider either separate small plaques in different places or perhaps we should consider having prepared one "master" plaque - perhaps with room for additional listings later - which Mr. Bruce May page two November 30, 1966 would cover in one place these four donations for the warm room. It could also note that the chairs have been contributed by members, following your excellent suggestion along this line. As to the chairs, it has occurred to me that in addition to the seal of the college or university of the donor, you might consider some further identification by having the initials or the name - I think the initials might be better - of the individual who gave the particular chair. You may for example wind up with more than one Yale chair. I would suppose that at a relatively small cost the Club could arrange to have the initials of the donors stenciled on the top of the chair. December 1, 1966

November 16, 1966, commemorated the 34th Opening Dinner of the Ardsley Curling Club. Some fifty of us gathered at the one-time residence of the late Mrs. Ward to welcome many new members into that mystic sport called "Kirling." For those who have never seen the sport, it is a team game of four persons pitted against four adversaries, alternately propelling some 40 pounds of "GLOMERATE" (Please not GRANITE, that is prone to split) into an advantageous position whereby one or more stones of one side lie closer to the mark than the nearest of the opponents. It is played on ice and this is the first time in thirty-four years that we have not been able to take new members down to the ice on the first night to have a go at it. Once this is done, the new member is blooded and all this mush is unnecessary. But, keep your chin up. It won't be long. They are really putting it on now.

Prexy Sibert wants to remind everyone that the U.S. Men's Curling Association Champion-ship is scheduled for the Boston area in March. There will be the usual fine program and anyone who can use advertising space should make early plans and reservations. Notify Ed now... closing is all too soon.

Veep Colgan asks us to notify you that all house facilities of the Ardsley Country Club -- be it food, drink, tobacco, sanitary facilities or what have you -- have been extended to all curlers for the period of yearly activity of the new rink. Just sign your curler's chit and pay your bill. Our host needs it as well as do we.

Some people will not accept adversity or stop curling. Two Ardsley rinks (Hager, McCormack, Koehl and Samuel -- Wells, Nolan, Hockmeyer and Ringland) have entered the Friendly Bonspiel at the Seigniory Club, Montebello, P.Q., the first week in December. And, the girls get a free ride to shop Montreal. In addition, we will be represented that weekend in the District Medal at Norfolk by Colgan, Stewart, Sibert and Upjohn.

This is our issue to distribute goodies to our loyal readers and what follows has been inserted and enclosed at the requests respectively of the Curling, Teaching, and Ice Committees. Our apologies for burdening you with such a slug of reading material in one mailing.

Grand National Bonspiel Schedule (Curling Committee)

Enclosed is your Grand National Curling Schedule. Get yourself on a rink and go bon-spieling. It's the mostest. Just 'phone Bonspieling Chairman Dace Stevenson and insist that he include you on the rink that is going to Edinburgh, Race Brook, Tuxedo Park, Hanoi or any place listed thereon.

Blanton Medal (Curling Committee)

There are enclosed the following documents relating to the Blanton Medal competition:

- Rules of play for this competition. Please note that in view of our changed circumstances (i.e., our own ice and larger membership) the Blanton this year is an entirely different competition from that of the immediate past and the rules, particularly those relating to substitutes, have been extensively revised.
- Rink assignments.
- 3. Schedule

For the benefit of new curlers, the Blanton Medal (named for our late member Alec Blanton) is our first intramural competition of the year. It will be played as a round-robin during December and January, beginning as soon as ice is available. Each team consists of a squad of six or seven and all members are represented on one of these squads. Your Skip is responsible for advising you when he expects you to play.

The schedule is set up to start on Thursday, December 15th. Let's hope we make it. If further delay in completion of the ice requires postponement of any matches, Curling Chairman Joe Ringland has space reserved later in his ice schedule to handle such a contingency.

Instruction and Practice (Teaching Committee)

With our expanded membership we have an unusually large number of beginning curlers this year. Fortunately, whenever the ice is ready, we are also going to have a lot of ice available for practice.

To provide instruction for the new members (and it is hoped some of the old members as well,) Prexy Sibert has appointed the following Teaching Committee:

The Committee hopes to secure the participation of all members of the Club in the informal scrub matches which will be a part of the training process. At the beginning and for perhaps the first three weeks after the ice is available, the Committee will schedule training sessions for most of the "open" ice (i.e., ice not otherwise scheduled for competitions by the Curling Committee.) These sessions will last about 2 to 2-1/2 hours each. For about the first hour of each session, the new curlers will be taught the elements of the curling delivery and how to use a broom. The remainder of each practice session will be devoted to a scrub match of from four to six ends to give the new men a feel for the game itself.

At each of these sessions, the Committee hopes to have present eight members of the Club or enough for two teams as follows:

An instructor: He will be a member of the Teaching Committee

A second experienced curler: He will assist the instructor and serve as Skip of one of the two teams in the scrub game.

Two members with some curling experience.

Four members who are either completely new to the game or started curling only within the recent past. It is hoped the latter group will welcome the opportunity for instruction and practice.

The emphasis will, of course, be primarily on practice for the new curlers with second attention being given to those who have played a short time. However, in the process the Committee asks every active member to fill in as a participant in at least one of these training sessions. The Committee hopes all members will help by joining in this educational effort.

There is enclosed a schedule for these instructional sessions listing for the first weeks of expected play the makeup of the practice rinks. Any sessions missed at the start because of delays in completion of the ice will be rescheduled later.

Please examine this schedule at once. If you are unable to attend a session for which you are scheduled, please advise the instructor in charge promptly so that he may obtain a substitute. Where feasible, we have tried to avoid conflict between an individual's schedule for these sessions and his possible involvement in Blanton matches. However, this has not been possible in all cases. If your Blanton Skip invites you to play in a match which conflicts with one of your practice sessions, the Blanton match should take precedence. But, in such case, please be sure to advise your instructor that you will not be available.

After a few weeks of these sessions, depending on how successful they are, the Committee plans to reduce or eliminate the group sessions and schedule open ice for practice, with an instructor available for those who want individual help.

The Teaching Committee has prepared for the benefit of new curlers some instructional material entitled "Notes for New Curlers." This material is enclosed with this copy of DUCK SOUP for all new members. Copies are also enclosed for recent members in the hope that this group may wish to brush up on technique. Any older curlers who would like to obtain a copy of the "Notes" should contact a member of the Teaching Committee.

Rules for the Ice (Ice Committee)

There is also enclosed a set of rules governing the use of the rink prepared by the Ice Committee consisting of Messrs. Hager, Sheets and Hastings, Chairman. Please observe these rules.

Addresses and Telphone Numbers (Your Editor)

Rules for Blanton Competition

1966-67 Season

GENERAL

- 1. All men curlers will be assigned to a Blanton rink by the Curling Committee, including new members who join after the season has started but before the competition has been completed.
- 2. There shall be 12 rinks.
- 3. The Curling Committee shall designate one man on each rink to be Skip. For any match where he cannot participate, the Skip may designate any other member of his rink to act as Skip for that match.
- 4. A match must be skipped by a member of the rink -- the named Skip of his alternate.
- 5. The Skip shall be responsible for giving each other member of his rink an equal opportunity to curl. He may play members of his own rink at any position he desires, regardless of their ranking for substitution purposes (see Rule 20). When he is unable to raise 4 men from his own rink for a given match, he may use substitutes from other rinks, per rules outlined below.
- 6. The competition shall consist of a complete Round-Robin; i.e., each rink will be scheduled to compete once with each other rink.
- 7. The winner and second place rinks shall be determined on won-and-lost records. In case of tie for first or second place, the Curling Committee shall arrange for playoffs.
- 8. Members of the winning rink will receive Gold Blanton medals. Members of the second place rink will receive Silver Blanton medals.
- 9. Each match shall consist of 10 ends. In case of ties, an extra end(s) shall be played to determine the winner.
- 10. No match may be postponed, even by mutual consent of the two Skips, unless there are extenuating circumstances in the judgment of the Curling Committee. In such cases, they may reschedule the match.

TARDINESS

- 11. Any rink which fails to field a team of at least 3 men within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time shall be penalized 1 point and 1 end. An additional point and an additional end penalty shall be assessed for each additional 10 minutes of tardiness.
- 12. If a rink starts with only 3 men, but the fourth member arrives before the match is completed, there shall be no point penalty. During the time when there are only 3 members present, the play shall be as prescribed in Rule 17.

3-MAN RINKS

- 13. Normally, a match shall be played by 4 men, including substitutes if necessary. If it is impossible to raise 4 men, a match may be plated with 3 men. Less than 3 men shall mean forfeiture of the match.
- 14. If a match starts with only 3 men and the fourth arrives later, there shall be no point penalty. (This is a repetition of Rule 12.)
- 15. If a match starts with 4 men and it is necessary for one to retire during the match, there shall be no point penalty.
- 16. If the entire match is played with only 3 men, there shall be a 1 point penalty.
- 17. While playing with 3 men, the first two men shall throw 3 stones each. The Skip shall throw the final 2 stones.

SUBSTITUTES

- 18. Where a Skip is unable to raise 4 men for his own rink for a match, he shall attempt to fill out the complement by substitutes from other rinks.
- 19. For the purpose of the Blanton competition, all members have been rated by the Curling Committee as Skip, No. 3, No. 2, or Lead. (All new members without known previous experience have been rated Lead for this season.) This ranking for the membership is shown as the Attachment to these rules.
- 20. Skips who substitute shall carry a penalty of 2 points. All others shall carry a 1 point penalty.
- 21. A substitute may be played at any position on the rink, subject to the following:
 - a. He may not skip the match (see Rule 4).
 - b. He may not play at a higher position than a similarly ranked member of the rink on which he is substituting. For example, a substitute who is ranked No. 2 cannot play at a higher position than a regular member of the rink who is ranked No. 3 or No. 2. (No. 3 is considered a higher position than No. 2; No. 2 is higher than Lead.)
 - c. For the purpose of the position at which he may play as a substitute, a Skip shall be considered like a No. 3, except for the size of the penalty (see Rule 20).

POSTING PENALTIES

22. Before the score for the first end is posted, a Skip shall announce the amount of penalty points that he has — substitutes, or playing with only 3 men. The score for the first end shall recognize these penalty points.

- 23. Should a Skip start with 3 men, but expects a fourth to appear, he need not take the penalty for a 3-man rink at the outset. However, if the fourth man has not appeared by the end of the 5th end, the one point penalty shall be posted at that time. Should the fourth man appear later, he may participate in the match, but the penalty point will remain in effect.
- 24. Penalty points shall not affect who has last stone on the next end.
- 25. In order to avoid embarrassment through inadvertent failure to announce penalty points, it is suggested that both Skips query the other on this subject during the first end.

Rules for a "Ladder Competition"

- 1. Any group of 6 men can enter themselves as a team in the competition. No more than two members may have a Blanton ranking of Skip or No. 3, and at least one must be a member of the club. When appearing as a team, at least 3 of the 6 must compete; otherwise the match must be forfeited.
- 2. The first 8 teams to enter will be considered in the ladder. By drawing lots, they will be assigned to the top rung, 2nd rund, etc., to start the competition. If there are less than 8 teams at the outset, they will be assigned only to the extent of the number of teams. Later entries will be assigned to rungs as their applications are received until the ladder is filled.
- 3. Entries over and above 8 will be assigned to the challenge group in the order of their making entries.
- 4. On the first weekend of the competition, each even-numbered team may challenge the odd-numbered team immediately above, i.e., team 8 may challenge team 7, team 6 may challenge team 5, etc. If the challenging team wins, it steps over the loser in ranking.
- 5. On the second weekend of competition, team 7 may challenge team 6, team 5 may challenge team 4, team 3 may challenge team 2, and the top listed team in the challenge round may challenge team 8. (Note that team 1 draws a bye this weekend.) If the team from the challenge list wins, it steps into 8th place. The loser drops to the last spot in the challenge list.
- 6. On the third weekend of the competition, team 8 may challenge team 6, team 7 may challenge team 5, team 4 may challenge team 2, and team 3 may challenge team 1 (a jump challenge weekend). A winning challenger steps into the spot of the team it beats; the loser drops down one rund only.
- 7. The order of the challenging repeats for the 4th, 5th, & 6th weekends, etc.
- 8. Any team at the top of the challenge list who cannot challenge on the week-end when it has the opportunity 2nd, 5th, 8th weekend, etc. should pass that privilege to the next team on the challenge list.
- Any team who challenges, and the challenge is not accepted, wins by default. Any team who is ready to accept a challenge, but is not challenged, wins by default.
- 10. Any team who fails to challenge, or fails to accept a challenge, or fails to state that it is ready to accept a challenge, on two consecutive weekends, is automatically dropped from the competition. (That team may, of course, re-enter the competition by entering the bottom spot on the challenge list.
- 11. Scoring for the season shall be as follows:

Win by competition - 5 points per game Final standing-2nd rung-7 pts.
Win by default - 3 points per game " " -3rd " -6 "
Final standing-top rung - 10 points etc.
" " -8th " - 1 pt.

Blanton Team Etiquette

Curling Chairman Joe Ringland has asked us to publish the following comment re Blanton Skips' etiquette:

"Due to the inexperience of so many new members, the Blanton rules on substitution this year are considerably liberalized. But let's not take advantage of the situation. The first rule: Try to raise a rink from your own roster. Failing that, a substitute is OK (and don't forget the penalty points.) If you are missing a No. 2, try to get a rated No. 2 as sub; if you're missing a lead, try for a rated lead. If you're missing a No. 3, then, and only then, is it OK to try for a rated No. 3 or Skip as sub. In other words, with all the talent now available, there should almost never be any excuse for a Blanton rink appearing on the ice with a senior Skip as a substitute in the lead or the No. 2 position."

Blanton Schedule

Enclosed is a revised Blanton schedule. Matches previously scheduled for December 27th through January 15th are the same as on the earlier schedule. HOWEVER, PLEASE NOTE that matches that had been scheduled on and after January 17th, as well as those that had been scheduled before Christmas, have new dates.

THE ICEMAN'S LAMENT

Good ice is as important to good curling as true greens are to good golf. No real curler would intentionally damage the surface of the curling ice any more than a devoted golfer would make a wedge shot from a putting green.

Our overworked Ice Committee Chairman, Ad Hastings, issues a special plea to all members, new and old, to have a care for the ice. Do not drop your stone in delivering it. Dropping the 42-lb. granite on the ice in front of the hack creates holes which make it impossible for subsequent players to deliver a true shot. By this time, all of us should have had the opportunity to practice enough so there should no longer be any excuse for pounding the stone into the ice on delivery.

Skips and Instructors: Please remind your players to avoid this cardinal sin!

Windler and "Junior Windler" Competitions

The Windler competition, scheduled to start February 12th, is traditionally the club championship. With the increased membership this year, it is impractical to run it with everyone represented. Therefore, there will be two parallel-running competitions: the traditional Windler consisting of the more experienced curlers; and the "Junior Windler" (for lack of a better name) to be skipped by the Ogden Skips.

Since the Ogden matches are played on weekends, and it would appear that each Ogden player should have an opportunity to play one match per weekend, the "Junior Windler" (consisting for the most part of the same players) will be scheduled for one round robbin to be played weekday evenings.

The Windler skips will be the six whose records were best in last year's Windler competition, the traditional procedure. For this year, the other two skips have been selected arbitrarily by the curling committee. Since the personnel for the most part are not regular members of Ogden rinks, they are not scheduled for other weekend matches. Hence, the Windler will be run on a double round robbin basis: one weekday and one weekend match each week.

Since the number of players assigned to each rink will be rather small, each Windler rink is considered paired with a Junior rink; i.e., Wl is paired with Jl, W2 with J2, etc. When unable to obtain 4 men from the basic rink, substitutes should be obtained from the paired rink, without penalty. Failing this, substitutes from other rinks can be obtained, but penalty points will apply.

General Rules

10 end matches; extra end in case of ties.

2. A match must be skipped by a member of the rink.

 No match may be postponed, even by mutual consent of the two skips, unless there are extenuating circumstances in the judgment of the curling committee.

4. Any rink which fails to field a team of at least 3 men within 15 minutes of the scheduled starting time shall be penalized 1 point and 1 end. An additional point and an additional end penalty shall be assessed for each additional 10 minutes of tardiness.

5. If a rink starts with only 3 men, but the fourth member arrives before the match is completed, he may enter the competition them.

6. Normally, a match shall be played by 4 men, including substitutes if necessary. If it is impossible to raise 4 men, a match may be played with 3 men. Less than 3 men shall mean forfeiture of the match.

7. If the entire match is played with only 3 men, there shall be a l point penalty. (See also rule 19)

8. While playing with 3 men, the first two men shall throw 3 stones each. The Skip shall throw the final 2 stones.

Windler Rules

- 9. The skip may play members of his own rink, or men borrowed from the paired rink (without penalty), at any position he chooses.
- 10. Borrowed players from other rinks (other than the paired rink) must play lead, or lead and No. 2, or lead and No. 2 and No. 3.
- 11. No more than two may be substituted from another Windler rink.
- 12. Penalty for a man substituted from another Windler rink: 2 points.
- 13. Penalty for a man substituted from a Junior rink (other than the paired rink): 1 point.

"Junior Windler" Rules

14. Men substituted from Windler rinks (maximum of two) must play lead, or lead and No. 2.

15. Men substituted from another junior rink must play lead, or lead and No. 2, or lead and No. 2 and No. 3. However, if there is also a Windler substitute, rule lk takes precedence.

16. Penalty for a man substituted from a Windler rink (other than the paired rink): 2 points.

17. Penalty for a man substituted from another junior rink: 1 point.

Posting Penalties

18. Before the score of the first end is posted, a Skip shall announce the amount of penalty points that he has --- substitutes, or playing with only 3 men. The score for the first end shall recognize these penalty points.

19. Should a Skip start with 3 men, but expects a fourth to appear, he need not take the penalty for a 3-man rink at the outset. However, if the fourth man has not appeared by the end of the 5th end, the one point penalty shall be posted at that time. Should the fourth man appear later, he may participate in the match, but the penalty point will remain in effect.

20. Penalty points shall not affect who has last stone on the next end.

21. In order to avoid embarrassment through inadvertent failure to announce penalty points, it is suggested that both Skips query the other on this subject during the first end.

Jug Ogden Competition

A word of explanation to new members. The Jug Ogden is an inter-club, round-robin competition among the less experienced curlers. Some matches will be played on St. Andrews ice, some at Ardeley. They will be played on weekends starting January 28th and continuing through the season. There are 4 Ardsley, 4 St. Andrews, 3 N.Y. Caledonia and 2 Mahopac teams in the event. The personnel of the Ardsley rinks, and the complete schedule are enclosed. The general rules are:

- The co-skips should arrange their time so that each will skip approximately half of the matches.
- 2. In general, the two co-skips should not both participate at the same time.
- 3. All regular members of the rink (those above the line in the rink membership) should be given an equal opportunity to participate throughout the season.
- the Those members below the line (the more experienced curlers in the club) should be given one opportunity to curl during the season. When he does curl, it MUST be at lead position, and he MUST NOT give skipping advice to any other member of the rink during a match.
- 5. If a foursome cannot be raised from a rink's own membership, a substitute may be obtained from another rink. No penalty points.
- 6. The co-skips are responsible for seeing that they have a team on the ice when scheduled. Failure to appear at all means forfeiture of the match. Tardiness involves penalties: 1 point and 1 end for the first 15 minutes; 1 additional point and 1 additional end for each additional 10 minutes of tardiness.
