TO: All First and Second-Year Curlers

FROM: Teaching Committee

Between now and December 10th we hope to offer all beginning curlers several opportunities to practice under the eye of one of the experienced members of our Club and to receive coaching as may be appropriate. We also want to offer all second-year curlers the opportunity for at least one such practice session.

There is attached a schedule covering these sessions. Please note the time assigned to you. If for any reason you will not be able to make a session scheduled for you, please try to exchange times with one of the other persons listed. If you are unable to arrange a substitute for your scheduled appearance and will not yourself be able to appear, please let your instructor know.

These sessions will be limited to four participants each from the group involved. If we pick up any new members during the course of these sessions, we will perhaps invite them to participate as additional trainees.

Because of the scheduling problem involved, we have decided to dispense with the eight-man sessions used last year which involved playing a few ends. These sessions will be devoted solely to practicing shots with the help of the instructor and should not require more than an hour to an hour-and-a-half of your time. We have limited the sessions to four in order to reduce standing and waiting for those not actually delivering stones. After the hour-and-a-half of scheduled practice with the instructor, the ice will be open for such further practice as trainees may desire.

In addition to these scheduled sessions there will be open ice on all three sheets from 7:30 p.m. for thirty minutes before each regularly scheduled evening match. Those wishing to practice by themselves may do so at this time. We will also have certain open ice for which neither matches nor practice sessions have been scheduled. These are also listed on the attached and may be used for informal practice as you desire.

Every new curler has been given a copy of the manual, NOTES FOR NEW CURLERS, and every second-year curler received one of these last year. If for any reason you have lost or misplaced your copy, please let your instructor know and he will obtain a replacement for you.

The Committee has decided to revive competition for the Kimbel Challenge Plaque this season. This plaque was actively competed for in the past but, due to a lack of ice, competition had to be discontinued.

This year there will be one sheet of ice reserved for the Kimbel at 2:45 P.M. December 2nd (sheet 3) and one each Saturday thereafter ^{at 5:15 PM} during the season and ending March 30th except when a Bonspiel interferes.

Larry Davis (Skip), Dean Russell, Bill Miller, and Bradford Smith, a St. Andrew's rink, were the last successful defenders and are the present holders of the plaque. Dean Russell and Bill Miller are not curling with us this year. Therefore it seems proper for Larry Davis and Brad Smith to organize a rink to defend the Plaque in the first instance.

The competition will be played by rinks composed of members of the above named curling clubs. Any five curlers (providing for one alternate) from any of the clubs may form a rink and challenge the defender at the time of their scheduled match.

If you are interested in entering this competition, form a rink,

and send in the enclosed card. Be sure to put a stamp on it. All members of the rink must be curling with the same curling club. There will be a draw by lot from all cards that are received by November 29. If more than enough rinks for the available ice wish to enter the competition, those which are not drawn will be held in obedience for substitutions if cancellations occur. The schedule will be posted on the bulletin board in the St. Andrew's Warm Room.

This fine trophy was donated by William A. Kimbel, a former St. Andrew's curler and Ardsley Curling Club member. The spirit in which it was donated and competed for in the past is exemplified by the inscription on the plaque, which reads as follows:

"In appreciation of the friendly association inspired by the Curlers of St. Andrew's Club through their constant fidelity to the exacting traditions of the brotherhood, this trophy is presented to them for competition."

The rink which wins the most matches in the competition during the season will receive four Kimbel Medals. Mr. Kimbel has donated a sufficient number of these medals for many years of future competition.

THE ST. ANDREW'S CURLING COMMITTEE

RULES GOVERNING CHALLENGES AND PLAY
FOR THE KIMBEL CHALLENGE PLAQUE-
1967 - 1968

1. Holders of the Kimbel Challenge Plaque must stand ready for challenge at 2:45 P.M., Saturday, December 2, 1967 on St. Andrew's ice and thereafter as set forth in the "KIMBEL SCHEDULE" posted on the bulletin board in the St. Andrew's Warm Room.
2. Rinks must be composed of members of the following clubs and all members of each rink must be members of the same club: Ardsley Curling Club, Mahopac Curling Club, New York Caledonian Curling Club, St. Andrew's Curlers.
3. Challengers will be assigned by the Committee from among the cards initially returned to the Committee. After such first assignment the challenges, stating makeup of the rink, i.e., Skip, Vice-Skip, Number Two, Lead and Alternate, must be entered on the Kimbel challenge card opposite the date on which the challenging rink will be ready to play against the then defending rink.
4. A challenging rink which defeats a defending rink becomes the holder of the Plaque and must then stand ready for challenge so long as it continues to hold the Plaque.
5. Not more than TWO substitutes are permitted in any one Match. If only one substitute is used that substitute must play Lead. If two substitutes are used they must play Lead and Number Two, respectively.
6. Anyone taking part in the 1967-1968 competition as either Skip or Vice-Skip of a defeated rink shall thereafter be limited to playing Number Two or Lead in the makeup of any other rink and the Skip and Vice-Skip of such other rink must be different from the Number Two and Lead of the original rink.
7. Postponement of a Match is not permitted unless unfavorable ice conditions prevail.
8. If the defending rink does not appear at the scheduled time the Match must be defaulted to the challengers and the challengers will receive credit for a match won.
9. If the challenging rink does not appear on the scheduled date the defender receives credit for a match won, unless the challenging rink arranges for another rink to play the match and a match is actually played. In that event the default is without consequence.
10. The rink winning the greatest number of matches will receive FOUR Kimbel Medals. In the event of a tie between two or more rinks, the Curling Committee shall decide the details of the "Play-off."
11. Each match to consist of 8 Ends.

Since our last report Yale beat Harvard, and Navy outlasted Army, the football season (amateur) is over and curlers to make up rinks are easier to come by. The faithful, however, have kept at it regularly, results have been accumulating and are duly summarized through Sunday December 10th for the three current men's events.

BONSPIELS. A few of the Ardsley Foreign Legionnaires have been out foraging, but to date only one detailed report has been made. Two Ardsley rinks spent a very pleasant week-end at the Seigniory Club in Canada, contesting the very considerable skills of Canadian curlers. The occasion was the Twenty-Eighth International Friendly Curling Games on December 1-3. Skip Ash Thorndike, accompanied by Virg Hager (3), Mac McCormack (2) and Bob Samuel (1) made the best showing of any Ardsley rink in recent years. In fact this was the only one of the 14 American teams (playing 14 Canadian teams) to win all three of its matches. The first match was a real squeaker. Going in to the final 10th end all tied, Ash's group managed to bury one of its red stones in the center of the house and keep it there, to win 9-8, defeating the Royal Montreal rink skipped by Ivan Ibbotson. This Canadian group, by the way, were the defending champions and had beaten this Ardsley team last year. In their second match, against a Montreal Thistle team skipped by J. M. McAvity, Ardsley slid home to a 15-4 victory. And precisely the same score was posted in its final match, against a St. George rink skipped by Ted Thompson. The final shot of the third match, by Skip Thorndike, was beautiful running stone through a 14 inch port to knock out the opponent's shot rock and lie two.

Ash says one of the secrets of his team's success was in using draw or slightly over-draw weight on the Seigniory Club's keen ice; in three matches no more than a half dozen Ardsley rocks went through the house. Bob Samuel says he never wants to hear the word SWEEP again.

Meantime, Ad Hastings, a veteran of the Seigniory encounters and a one time runner up in this event, had a difficult week-end. His team was Russ Weston (3), Ralph Sheets (2) and Harry Thompson (1). It was the first time on the ice this year for Weston and Sheets, two retired associate members. This rink lost to H. C. Fortier's Thistle team by 7-4, to O. F. Howe's Ottawa team 13-3, and to E. R. Pooler's Toronto Granite team 15-4.

The winner of the Seigniorly Friendly must win all three matches and have the largest number of plus stones (with a limit of 10 for any single match). Thornkike's plus 21, on this basis, put his group in fourth position when the competition was over -- not enough for a trophy but more than adequate for a very happy feeling. Two Canadian teams, a Toronto Granite team skipped by Dr. G. Morgan, and a Toronto team skipped by R. K. Northey, tied for first place. Northey was awarded first on the basis of his aggregate plus score, including stones above the ten limit.

DISTRICT NO. 2 CHAMPIONSHIP. Late news. I am informed Chuck Stewart led a very successful foray into Philadelphia Dec. 2 and 3 and came away the winner beating out St. Andrews. This puts him in the Royal Victoria Jubilee Trophy, representing the Grand National at Ottawa January 19-21st. Congratulations!

H. LAWRENCE ACHILLIES

An enthusiast, a friend to Curling in general and to the Ardsley Curling Club in particular and one of our major benefactors, has written a most appreciative acknowledgment of the plaque in his honor now in the Warm Room. Forty years a curler - ten with Ardsley - are memories he will always treasure.

FUNICULAR

For those who are not members of the Ardsley Country Club and will not receive its Report on Construction Projects, the following excerpt will be of interest:
"The funicular leading from the 18th green and Curling Rink is an essential facility as the golfers and curlers who are forced to climb the hill will aver. It has been equally difficult to construct. Facilities of this type are relatively unique in this area. Initially we contacted several of the major elevator manufacturers including Otis, Westinghouse, Hutton, Armour and Stanley. Their lack of interest in a small, unique facility was consistent. Subsequently we learned of a West Coast firm named Dwan & Company who specialize in this type of work and they were contacted. After several months during which we corresponded and furnished detail information including operating requirements and topography, we received Dwan's proposal for some \$29,000 for equipment plus an estimate of \$11,000 for installation. Clearly this was not the type of facility we required. Further correspondence with the manufacturer failed to generate any interest in a smaller project here on the East Coast.

"After considerable missionary work Paul Barrett was able to convince a contractor in Brooklyn to help us design and build the cart and hoist mechanism. The contractor previously had built a funicular for his own golf club. Clearly he had undertaken that project as a personal favor and initially he evidenced no interest in building a second funicular. After he agreed to assist us we found many minor and major difficulties ranging from the presence of rock, to required changes in alignment, to delays in obtaining designs and equipment and the weather. At times I wondered if someone up there were trying to tell us something.

"In any event the hoist equipment has been promised by Robbins and Myers, the manufacturer, for delivery by January 26, 1968. A recent letter confirmed delivery in late January which suggests early February may be more realistic. The contractor has assured us continually that his work on the cart will be completed within two weeks of delivery of the hoist mechanism. He has evidenced no interest in proceeding with his work on the cart before the hoist is delivered and he has complete information on its construction and operating characteristics."

"Children (12 years of age and under) are not to be left in the Warm Room unless supervised by an adult."

"Children are not to go upon the ice or play with the stones."
