TO THE MEMBERS OF ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB:

The 1968 Icless Bonspiel will be held in Cooperstown, New York on September 26-29, 1968.

For the benefit of our newer members, this is an annual fall gathering of curlers of the Grand National and also involves a meeting of the Grand National. All members of all Grand National clubs are invited to spend a social weekend.

We have the following communication from Joseph Lisuzzo, Chairman of the Icless and a member of Albany Curling Club:

"The Iceless Bonspiel this year will be held at the Otesaga Hotel in Cooperstown, New York on September 26 thru 29, 1968. Each Curling Club should make every effort to have his club represented at the Iceless Bonspiel, preferably by your club's official representative to the Grand National. In addition I would like to urge as many members of each Club to attend with their wives as this is a wonderful week-end for both men and women.

In addition to the many attractions in Cooperstown, the hotel will provide free boat trips, free bus trips around Cooperstown, a talk by a representative of the Historical Association and a bridge tournament for the ladies.

The Otesaga, being an American Plan convention hotel, operates on the principle that the rates quoted include a night's lodging, breakfast, lunch and dinner, plus the full use of the hotel facilities. The resort is founded on the principle of outstanding cuisine that is enhanced with dinner music in the Dining Room.

For the golfers the hotel has one of the finest 18 hole championship golf courses in the Northeast. A special group greensfee of \$5.00 has been established, For the non-golfers a heated swimming pool and a sun lounge are for your pleasure, as well as lake swimming, sailing, water-skiing, tennis and all other recreational facilities. The official meeting of the Grand National will be held at 4:00 p.m. on Friday. On Saturday, golfers will compete for the Ardsley Bowl, and of course there will be open golf as well. Also on Saturday we will have the traditional Bell Quoit competition as well as Bowling on the Green. There will be a cocktail party on Saturday evening, followed by dinner and dancing.

Those of you who have stayed at the Otesaga are aware that the food is superb, the golf course is challenging and in late September the weather is usually ideal. You also know that wherever a group of Curlers gather, there is bound to be fun and fellowship. Grand National President Gren Rand joins me in urging the President of each Grand National Curling Club to get the word around to his club members so that reservations will be in by Sept. 10th.

Hope to see you there for fun and games."

New members will be interested to know that Ardsley Curling Club presented the Ardsley Bowl in 1950 for a team competition in golf to be held at the time of the Icless and it has been competed for regularly except for 1961: Ardsley won the first four competitions and three since then.

The Bell Quoit competition is for a medal presented by David Bell, then president of the Grand National in 1868. The medal is the oldest trophy in the Grand National and the competition is said to be the oldest continuous sports competitive event in the United States.

A small supply of brochures on the Otesaga Hotel have been left at the front desk at the country club.

Cooperstown is the home of the Baseball Hall of Fame.



Of particular note is the ROSS TARLETON SHIELD. It is a CANADA-USA competition that is conducted much the same as the GORDON INTER-NATIONAL MEDAL. It's just a month away in UTICA.

Last year the Ross Tarleton Shield began in Toronto at the Board of Trade Curling Club. G.N.C.C. won. Utica is hosting the first competition in the U.S. and would of course like it to be equal to or better than the excellent first in Toronto. Entry blanks are available, so if you want to win the first bonspiel of the season get a team together. The fellowship at Utica alone is worth the entry fee if one is to judge by the magnificent mixed centennial bonspiel they had last year.

November 27, 1968

By this time most of the Ardsley Curlers will have thrown at least some stones and the season is well under way. The first weekend of mixed matches is over, the ladies are curling and the men have had two weeks on the ice.

Lester Grasskampf phoned the other evening about the curling items on sale at the country club desk. There are Ardsley Curling Club ties at \$2.50 and a new item - Zippo lighters with the club emblem on the side for \$5.00. Might be a nice idea for Christmas. Grassy has the emblems for blazers -- they are only available to members - if you need one, phone Grassy.

Also available at the desk are both men's and ladies' pins. DYKES BONSPIEL

On January 24-26 the Dykes Bonspiel (three events) will be held at Ardsley. This event is designed especially for inexperienced curlers. The rules exclude from eligibility those with more than five years of curling experience and those who have played at skip or number three in any Grand National competition.

One rink has already submitted an application to represent Ardsley. Any other rinks desiring to compete for the Ardsley representation, or perhaps for the second Ardsley rink if there is one, should promptly notify Bob Samuel, Chairman of the Curling Committee. Playdowns will be arranged as necessary.

REPORT OF THE GREENS COMMITTEE

With the help of the new aerating and thatching equipment, all your greens were aerated, thatched, top dressed and overseeded last fall. They were also sprayed before the cold winter weather set in to protect them against winter kill.

All tees were top-dressed and overseeded last fall, and the fairways fertilized.

A new maple tree will planted at the third green to replace the Elm tree that had to be removed last year. We have started work on the drainage in front of the Ladies' tee on the 5th hole and hope to have this troublesome swampy area eliminated before long.

New sand has been put in the traps on the 7th and 8th holes, and drainage pipes around the 8th green. We plan to put new sand in all the other traps, too.

The area behind the 9th green has been drained and also the area to the left of the green. All the dead and decaying Willow trees in back of this green were removed and replaced with young Willows, which will soon grow to be a beautiful background for this hole. A new road has been built going into the garage from Cricket Lane.

A picturesque new Men's Professional tee was built for the 10th hole, which some of the Pros have said made this an interesting hole. Drainage has been put around the Ladies' tee to prevent water from collecting in that area. One of the projects for this year will be to drain the damp area on the other side of the brook.

New drains have been installed in front of the 13th green and on the left of the fairway. Also the area in front of the 11th green has been drained by putting in new drainage pipes. There are still some drainage problems to be solved, but many have already been corrected.

Plans for this year also include clearing more of the rough area along the sides of the fairways of the three new holes, which will reduce the number of lost balls and unplayable lies! (Continued on Page 2)

HOUSE COMMITTEE PROGRESS REPORT

The Main House Kitchen was closed after Christmas for a complete renovation and replacement of cooking, refrigeration, serving, and freezing facilities. The creation of the improvement plan was developed and supervised by Fred Taylor and Paul Barrett. Easter Sunday weekend marked the opening and use of Ardsley's brand new kitchen with 300 reservations for Sunday dinner.
