

For social contacts, if not for prizes, the spiel was a huge success. There were many requests for Ardsley rinks in the Chicago circuit at future bonspiels.



NORTH DAKOTA CLUB WINS CURLING TITLE

ARDSLEY-ON-HUDSON,N.Y., March 6 -- The Grafton, N.D., Curling Club rink, skipped by Arthur Tallackson Jr., completed the round-robin bonspiel undefeated in 11 matches today to win the 14th annual United States Men's Curling Association championship.

In the rink's final matches at the Ardsley Country Club and at the nearby St. Andrew's Golf Club, in Mount Hope, Grafton defeated

Ak-Sar-Ben C.C., of Omaha, skipped by Dennis Vogel, 11-2, and the Granite C.C., Norwalk, Calif., skipped by Wayne Asplund, 7-6.

The victory qualified Grafton for the first world championship bonspiel, for the Silver Broom, to be held March 17 to 21 at Utica, N.Y.

The members of Tallackson's winning rink were Trueman Thompson, lead; Raymond Holt, No.2, and Glenn Gilleshammer, No.3.

As Duck Soup goes to press, four rinks are tied for first place with a 4-1 record -- namely, Nolan, Sibert, Wells and Whitman.


St. Andrews International Mixed Bonspiel



EDDISON MEDAL, February 26 - March 1, 1970




Results of the Ardsley Bonspiel

A Letter to the Editor

Editor Duck Soup

Sir:

Reference is made to Duck Soup dated March 10th, wherein on page 3 under the heading "St. Andrews International Mixed Bonspiel" the following statement is made with respect to the victory of the Theises and the Whitmans in the second event at the recent St. "This is the first mixed bonspiel Andrews Mixed. competition won by the Ardsley Curling Club." only by a rather strained interpretation that one can say that this victory is the first won by the Ardsley Curling Club. In 1965 before our present rink was constructed and while our mixed curlers were playing at St. Andrews, the Dace Stevensons and the Siberts won this same competition; that is, the first consolation at the St. Andrews Mixed. In 1966, the Siberts and the Wellses won the Golden Shield, which is the second event at the Nutmeg Mixed Bonspiel. Both of these rinks were all-Ardsley in composition.

The Theis/Whitman win is a worthy enough accomplishment on its own without having to make claims that it is a "first". If it is a "first", it is only in the limited sense that it is the "first" since the Ardsley mixed curlers have been curling on their own ice.

I hope appropriate correction will be carried in the next issue of Duck Soup.
