BUILDING AND ICE



CAPE COD BONSPIEL

While most of us were swimming, golfing, sailing, or just loafing over the weekend of July 6-8, a few "never-say-die" Ardsley curlers were participating in either the last bonspiel of the '72-73 season or the first bonspiel of the '73-74 season.

Whichever you decide to call it, this bonspiel was held at the Cape Cod Curling Club in Falmouth, Mass., with a total of 16 rinks entered. Ardsley was represented by two rinks (which is better than we can often do in the wintertime). Ardsley #1 consisted of the Doonans and Rays (and later Bobbie Patterson substituting for Anita Doonan), while Ardsley #2 was made up of the Briggs and the Delanys.

As usual when Ardsley rinks "have a good time" it is difficult, if not impossible, to learn the final standings, but we have been advised that Ardsley #2 did somewhat better than Ardsley #1. We're not sure whether this means they had a better time or won more matches, but in any event we do understand that the bonspiel was a tremendous success and had a rather unusual finale.

FALL OPEN HOUSE

A TRIBUTE

The untimely death of Robert F. Warner on May 17, 1973, ended a career of great achievement, filled with imagination and creativity, but it left a great hole in the lives of a far ranging circle of friends, especially of the dwindling group of early Ardsley curlers.

Ardsley was just maturing as a power in Grand National curling in the 1940's. Its membership, restricted by the lack of its own ice, had only one advantage--at least 60% of the membership were present for its Tuesday night competitions.

Like curling clubs, everywhere and at all times, it attracted to its fellowship gentlemen and competitors, who were congenial companions on or off the ice. Ardsley had a windfall in the early 1940's when Albert Koehl, Harold Sothern and Robert Warner joined the club.

They were keen curlers, but they were also an inseparable trio of happy, irrepressible purveyors of songs, stories and good fellowship. They helped make Ardsley a sought out competitor, not only for curling skills, but also for the fun and esprit de corps that add so much to Bonspiels.

The "Happiness Boys", as Ed Fiske so perceptively named them, were known and applauded both at home and all around the circuit.

Those of use who knew and loved them then, and who now revere them as the happy companions of earlier years, are much the poorer for their passing. Each complemented the others, and each had his own special flavor. "Bob" was the maestro, the ringleader, who, despite world-side business interests and problems, always sought and added zest to every occasion. In any assessment of the Ardsley Curling Club's stature among its peers, the "Happiness Boys" and their genial maestro, "Bob" Warner, deserve a special accolade for, on and off the ice, they helped to establish and maintain its deservedly high reputation.

We raise our brooms in tribute to a valiant competitor and friend!

LADIES' CURLING OPEN HOUSE AND FUNSPIEL

PRACTICE AND TRAINING SESSIONS

MEN'S CURLING EVENTS

Particularly for the benefit of the newer members, the Curling Committee wants to explain the various <u>club competitions</u> and the selection of Skips and Rinks. In the <u>first half of the season</u>, November to mid-January, there are three competitions:

BLANTON - Weeknights, intraclub competition for all curlers. This event is a ten-team round robin.

WILDS - Weekends, interclub competition against St. Andrew's, N. Y. Caledonian and Mahopac teams. This competition is a sixteenteam round robin, with Ardsley entering five teams of senior curlers. These five rinks have co-skips who are considered to be the ten highest rated curlers in our club.

COLGAN - Weekends, intractub competition for junior curlers. This event will be a five-team round robin comprised of all Ardsley curlers who are not in the Wilds competition. Skips are selected by the Committee on the basis of ratings and consideration of giving experience to junior curlers who generally have had little experience as Skips.

RATING SYSTEM - At the end of each curling season, all Skips submit a rating for all curlers whom they feel qualified to rate. These submittals are averaged for each person and that average becomes his rating for the next season. These ratings are used by the Curling Committee in selection of Skips and in making up the teams. Although admittedly this rating system is imperfect, it does assist the Committee in trying to balance the teams so that each team is comprised of curlers with nearly equal experience and ability. New curlers have no rating and are arbitrarily assigned to teams. These ratings are only for use by the Committee and are not divulged to members outside the Committee.

We are pleased to announce that Burns Patterson is Chairman of the Curling Committee. Burns replaces Jim Christie who could not continue with this most important assignment. We're sure that Burns will have the full encouragement, assistance and cooperation of all curlers. Burns would be glad to answer any questions you may have concerning Men's Curling Events.

BLANTON SCHEDULE REVISED

All curlers should have received the revised Blanton schedule and rink compositions. If not, please contact your Skip! This change was prompted, unfortunately, by the reduced number of available men curlers. Without factoring in any new members, male curling strength now allows only ten rinks. Sufficient numbers are not available to run the traditional twelve rink competition, and to allow tolerance for those instances on which some rink members must be absent for a scheduled match.

Skips Jim Christie and Lee Heffner graciously withdrew, thus allowing their rinks to augment the strength of others.

Along similar lines, the COLGAN competition is manned by a bare minimum of curlers. Please bend every effort to meet each of your assigned curling times.

LADIES CURLING

Schedules and other materials have been mailed to all participants. The Sports Committee urges that the ladies read carefully all material. Additional information will be posted on the downstairs bulletin board.

The Bonspiel Chairman urges all those interested to sign up for the Three Brooms Competition, the first round of which will be held on Friday, December 7th, at St. Andrews. The Three Brooms competition is an interclub round robin in which we compete with rinks from the Westchester Wicks and Nutmeg. Senior Skips and their rinks compete in the mornings; Junior Skips and their rinks play in the afternoon.

MIXED CURLING

This competition started Saturday, November 10th, with the first of three series of matches constituting a scramble. Schedules have been sent to all who have signed up to participate in Mixed. COURTESY ON THE ICE

Two years ago, Dick Wells proffered some excellent thoughts on curling courtesy. We'd like to repeat them here.

The player making the shot and the skip calling the shot are entitled to the fullest opportunity to concentrate without any distraction from other players in the same game. This means specifically: (a) that if you are waiting your turn to-play-next, you should stand up--on the platform off the ice, back of your opponent and out of his vision. You should keep completely still until he has delivered his stone. Several times recently I have noticed while a player was about to deliver his stone his opposite number walking around on the ice behind and beside him, moving stones and otherwise creating a distraction; (b) If you are waiting your turn to sweep when the opponent is about to deliver his stone, you should stand as far to the side of the sheet as possible, well out of the line of vision of the player and his skip, and you should keep absolutely still while the stone is being delivered; and (c) If you are in the house area, either as skip or viceskip, when your opponents are about to deliver a stone, you should take a position behind and to the side of the opposite skip, you should hold your broom in a horizontal position and should keep completely still. Hemember please: only one player on each side (the skip or his vice) is entitled to be on the ice and in the house area at any one time.

- 2. Be ready to play when your turn comes. This means (unless your skip has to confer with you at the house end of the rink -which, incidentally, is justified only occasionally, and then is usually confined to thirds and skips) that you should go to the platform at the rear of the hack and wait there until your opponent has delivered his stone. Then you should prepare immediately to deliver your own stone. We have some members -- veterans at that -- who are never ready, who wait at the opposite hog line until their opponent has played, and then saunter slowly down to the hack, change their rubbers or perform some other business and generally take their own sweet time about getting ready to play. In this connection, may I say that it is my personal view, which others may not share, that the practice which has crept into the game in the past ten years whereby so many players feel obliged to move their opponent's stone out of the corner prior to delivery of their own stone is a great waste of time and may not actually be the courtesy intended. Many players prefer to pick their own stone out of the corner rather than have an opponent pick one out for them. If you must pick out your opponent's stone, wait until you have delivered your own stone.
- A suggestion for all skips, particularly the more experienced skips. We have a number of competitions designed to give less experienced skips the opportunity to learn this difficult art. spirit of these competitions is that experienced skips playing in other positions on rinks being managed by younger skips refrain during the actual play of an end from detailed coaching or other interference with the skip in charge of the rink. Regardless of his skill as a player or as a skip, the designated skip of your rink is entitled to your full support during the play of any particular game. means that you counsel him when asked, but you do: not inflict your own views on him while he is calling a shot for you or others, deciding about his own shot or playing his stone. In my experience, there is nothing more likely to detract from the ability of a skip to make his own shot than to be second-guessed by other members of his rink, particularly if these members happen to be players of greater experience. The time for coaching a junior skip is preferably before or after the game or between ends, but not while play is in progress.
- 4. I have been surprised to observe some players applauding a miss by their opponents. Brooms-up is for good shots, your teammates or opponents, but never, please, for misses.

We hope these suggestions will be helpful and will add to our enjoyment of the game.

ALL THE NEWS THAT'S FIT TO PRINT???

We plan to print the news, and all of it, if you, the officers, committee chairmen, and individual curlers, give us a hand. Each DUCK SOUP carries from 12 to 15 news items. We have received in writing an average of two items per issue. All other news has been gathered orally on Penn Central platforms, at the grocery store, and on the phone while Carol or Joe scrambles with pen and paper in sub-standard writing and concentrating conditions.

We need your help!!! Please drop us a note covering any item of information which you think might be of interest to the membership at large.

RESULTS OF MATCHES

Flease cooperate in making sure that the results of all matches are entered in the book in the Warm Room. It is customary that the No. 2 on the winning rink make the entry, but it is the skip's responsibility to see that it is done.

This is the means by which the curling chairmen can determine the standings in the various events.

WE ARE SPOILED

Because Larry Fichardson and the House Committee have kept our ice beautiful and immaculately clean, some of us have forgotten the need to keep our shoes and curling boots clean. Be sure that your shoes are free of all dust and grit before entering the building. Please do not use the same pair of shoes for both curling and street wear. One does not need special curling shoes or boots to curl, but one should clean and reserve the footwear one uses while playing especially for wear on the ice during the season.

CURLING GEAR AND CLOTHING

As in the past, Bill Maloney at the St. Andrews' Pro Shop will carry a complete line of curling paraphernalia. Items are available for sale between 8:30 and 6:00 on Monday through Friday. The phone number of St. Andrews' Club is (914) GR 8-3500.

The next issue of DUCK SOUP will catalogue Christmas gift suggestions for curlers available at Ardsley.

We probably all know of the unfortunate and unavoidable happenstances which plagued us during the past two weeks. The Board and Officers certainly appreciate the patience and understanding shown by all members, and wish to thank them for their forebearance.

WATCH YOUR SLIDE

Despite the proposed change in the sliding rule, as printed in the November issue of Curling News, the GNCC rule is unchanged - the curler must come to a complete stop before any part of the body or equipment reaches the nearest hog line, etc. Minutes of the fall meeting will confirm the GNCC position.

FUNICULAR

All curlers are undoubtedly aware of the fact that the funicular has been out of order for quite some time. The machinery

was not designed for operation in severe winter weather and especially in the type of snow, sleet, and freezing rain we have had recently.

The problem arises when snow and ice accumulate on the track, causing the car to ride up and over the automatic stop mechanism without shutting off the motor. When this happens, the car is pulled into the motor housing, causing damage to the car and possibly the motor as well.

The Country Club has asked that we not use the trolley should future ice and snow storms cause the same condition.

Women's Curling Club, skipped by Harriet Hahne. The Exmoor Highlanders(skip Jackie Warner) continued to hold their place of record in U.S. W.C.A. National Bonspiels by capturing the First Event runner-up Appleton Trophy; in 1973, they were runner-up in the Second Event.

Thanks also to the committee of drivers who spent long hours in gas lines, yet managed to deliver their rinks to the proper place at the proper time. We should also mention the hospitality committees who greeted our guests at the rink at 7:30 A.M. with continental breakfast, and waved them "Good Night" at 7 PM, after serving refreshments all day. Thanks also to the referees, umpires, hostesses, and bartenders. It was work, but in the best curling tradition we have many new and wonderful friends who will long remember the 26th U.S.W.C.A. Bonspiel in Westchester County.

On Saturday evening, March 16th, there will be the annual Gordon International reception and banquet at The Hilton Inn at which the Gordon Trophy will be awarded to the winning country. All Ardsley male curlers are invited and urged to attend to help entertain our Canadian friends at the reception and dinner which has traditionally been a highlight of each curling year. The cost will probably be around \$15.00.

Bill Nolan is chairman for the event with Ron Currie, Ed Doonan, Bob Hill, and Ed Sibert also representing Ardsley on the committee. Since Ardsley is responsible this year for the running of the event, it is hoped that all Ardsley curlers will pitch in and help as well as come watch some very fine international curling.

SECOND GREATER BOSTON INTERNATIONAL BONSPIEL

Ardsley was represented here by a rink composed of Chuck Galloway, skip, Burns Patterson, Bob Fisler, and Mait Griggs. There were thirty-two rinks entered and matches took place simultaneously at both Brae Burn and Winchester (three sheets at each).

Financial Report

Although our fiscal year does not end until July 31, 1974, the Directors are happy to report that it will not be necessary to have an assessment this year. Despite the enormous increase in our electrical bills enough savings were accomplished in other areas to keep total expenses within a manageable area.

Furthermore, the Directors voted to retain the present dues structure with one minor exception. Dues for a Junior Family II membership will be increased from \$100.00 to \$125.00 per year.

It was the feeling of the Board that a strenuous effort should be made to increase our income by attracting new members rather than by increasing the dues of those who are already members. Obviously, in an inflationary period such as we are now experiencing, our expenses will increase and we will require additional income to meet these demands. It is therefore hoped that all members will add their support to Jim Zonino's efforts to attract new members.

A Good Friend

To many curlers the name of Ted Childs is a familiar one. For not only has Ted been an ardent curler for many years with the Norfolk Curling Club but he has been deeply involved with the organization and administration of the Grand National Curling Club. He is, in fact, one of the very few Honorary Life Members of the G.N.C.C.

Ted Childs was also a strong supporter of the Ardsley Curling Club in our endeavors to build our present facility in 1966. In that year he came to our financial aid by purchasing a \$5,000.00 Ardsley Curling Club bond. This year he has again demonstrated his generosity and support by cancelling this same bond.

Ted suggested, at the time of this gift, that we use an amount of money equal to the previous interest payments on this bond for some purpose beneficial to curling. It was his suggestion that a medal, honoring one of our former members, should be established for men's competition.

A committee, chaired by Ed Sibert, considered the suggestion and felt that since we had no need for additional medals in men's competition it would be suitable to establish an award for mixed curling. This conclusion was reinforced by Ted and Elizabeth Childs' great interest in mixed curling. It was therefore recommended, and unanimously approved by the Board, that a trophy bearing Ted Childs' name be established and awarded to the winners of the first event in future Ardsley Mixed Bonspiels.

The entire club joins with the Board in expressing its thanks to Ted and Elizabeth Childs for their generous contribution.

The responses received by all four local clubs to the curling school proposal were so encouraging that we are proceeding with the necessary arrangements. At this point we hope to conduct the three day program in late November or early December.
