

Generous gifting by former curlers -----during the past year Bob Irons, Charlie Stover and Mrs. Ralph Sheets have donated back to the Club a total of \$5000 in debentures purchased at the time we built our rink. One letter expresses their feeling so well, it is quoted in its entirety,

"As you know Mary and I moved about many times during our working years.

But Ardsley Park proved to be the last stop when we arrived there in 1962. We were curling on St. Andrew's ice then, but plans were finalizing for our own facility.

The acquisition of the Gould property by the Ardsley Country Club was all that was needed to bring everything into focus and construction began in 1966. The new facility was ready for use in New Years 1967 weekend.

The current success of the club continues to be for the same reasons that have characterized the past success; volunteers, competent, loyal, and intelligent volunteers.

Sufficient club funds have also been important for continuity and growth. Mary and I were happy to have been able to participate in underwriting an interest free long term debenture at the time the contract was to be let to build the facility.

We were really expressing our gratitude to the relatively little community which had become our last "new home".

We had learned, as families each year are discovering for themselves, that Ardsley Curling Club members have found a special niche of social acceptance, warmth, and companionship. It doesn't take long for a newcomer to become an old timer at Ardsley. We know!

We have enclosed the document we have held for the sum we advanced to the club. Its return means we feel we have already been "paid in full".
