FUNDSPIEL

The last curling season of the seventies, the opening one of the eighties, began in earnest on the 29th of September. More than one hundred curlers left their brooms at home and descended upon Mait and Peggy Griggs' place for an iceless spiel and an eventful (and profitable) evening for the Ardsley Curling Club.

The Griggs' warm room at Ardsley Avenue West sported two bars (indoors, outdoors), several distinguished chefs and bartenders in the persons of Messrs. Doonan, Wells, Citarell, Hand and Haff plus a tent that turned the driveway into a pavilion and a little light music for the dancing crowd.

The whole idea (A most successful one, once again/ was to get a head start on the season which starts with the Open House on the weekend of October 27th and 28th, more later on that) was to raise money for the A.C.C. the enjoyable way.....with a party, a lottery and an auction (everyone's home brandy decanter to watercolorers to lamps to serving plates.).



At St. Andrews, Ardsley 2 (Brandt, Bollenbacher, Mort, Mitchell) took St. Andrews 5 (Stewart, S. Mojo, Pedlow, Allen). Congrats to the victors, the runner-ups, and the sixty curlers who took to the ice.

The big shooters will be out in force: Alan Symons of Scarboro who won last year, Sture Linden of Nutmeg who's been to the U.S. Grand National three times. We'll have 10 Canadian rinks and 12 Grand Nationals, and 8 local rinks including 2 brave quartets from Ardsley.

Extra -- Late News Flash!

All curlers, expecially mixers, are invited to watch the Ardsley 10th Annual Mixed Bonspield being held this weekend (Jan. 18, 19, 20) at the Club. Ceremonies begin with an Open House and warm welcome for visiting rinks on Thursday evening; play starts Friday morning. Bring some couples you know over on the weekend to watch how our couples mix it up.

Who's curling? Sixteen Grand National rinks and two from Canada are entered. In addition to the daytime curling on Friday, Saturday and Sunday (finals on Sunday afternoon), there will be dinners for the participants at the homes of four members on Friday and a Dinner Dance at the Ardsley Country Club on Saturday evening. If you'd like to join in, just sign up in the Warm Room. For Saturday, call Manager Mike Phillippo at the Country Club, only \$32 a couple -- that's a steal. If you attend the member's buffets on Friday, there'll be a small charge to help cover

expenses. So you can have two nights out and a lot of curling for very little money -- and with a lot of good curlers. Luch, by the way, will also be available on Friday and Saturday at the main clubhouse.

Who Did What In The Douglas?

Down the road apiece, the venerable Douglas Spiel was held at St. Andrews (while Peter and Jean Murphy, and Norm and Margaret Beaudrias, were running away with our own Headless Horseman Mixed Spiel) on the weekend of January 3-6. The Spiel was taken by the Schenectady Whiz Kid, Chick Hequembourg, and his Mohawk Valley gang. Chuck Owens of Nutmeg took the Second Events and (if your correspondents phone notes are correct) Plainfield's Mac MacClure captured the Third.

Ardsley was represented by three tough rinks -- and the luck of the draw had them all facing each other all too quickly. Here's how we fared:

Wells went 1 and 2, Brandt finished 2 and 2 and Sibert wound up 2 and 1. The matches were keen; we just had the misfortune to shoot out each other's lights.

W. Barton Eddison

Curling lost one of its greatest enthusiasts and the Ardsley Curling Club one of its finest curlers with the death, on New Year's Day, of Barton Eddison at the age of 91.

Barton had been one of the founders of our club back in 1932. He quickly became a superior exponent of the "Roaring Game" (he actually never roared at anyone, save when demanding heavier sweeping) and a seniour skip. He gained many notable victories as skip, including the Mitchell Medal at Utica in 1939 and the Douglas at St St. Andrews in 1944 and 1947. He was the only Ardsley curler to have taken the Douglas twice as skip. Within the Club, Barton won the Windeler several times (and, it must be admitted, on one occasion the Fur Lined).

Barton was president of the Club during its formative years in the Thirties, always a most generous and loyal member. He played a key role in the decision and financing which led to the construction of our present facilities in 1966.

He continued curling with us up until nearly the time when he decided, at eighty six, to sell his home in Ardsley Park and move to Connecticut. Curlers will remember him for the grace of his delivery even when he was well past eighty and the high quality of his play in spite of his impaired eyesight. Even when he could no longer see the broom, he'd sight by ear -- with instructions down the ice from his skip.

Barton was a lifelong resident of Irvington, an inventor, and without doubt first citizen of the community within his lifetime, with an unmatched record of leadership in civic, business and philanthropic affairs. He personified the best traditions of the sport that unites us all. His memory will remain ever warm in the circle of those of us who had the pleasure of curling with him.

Notes Contributed By An "Old Curler"

Several members have requested a reminder in Duck Soup of the amenities of the game which contribute so much to its unique character as a sport. With all modesty and in acceptance of the Bible's injunction as to *motes and beams", one "Old Curler" notes:

1. Curling, the most gentlemanly of sports, affords friendship

and sportsmanship, consideration for others at all times.

2. A curler does nothing, even unintentionally, to distract his opponent. In the case of your opposite number about to deliver a stone, you must take up a position behind him and out of his view, and remain still until he has finished his delivery. Sweepers, too, must stay as far to the sides of the ice as possible; crowding in can distract the curler a great deal. Skips must remain completely motionless, brooms held horizontally or fully out of sight.

3. Please. Applaude your own teammate's and your opponents' good shots. Never cheer (which is a jeer) an opponents' miss or bad luck. Brooms upheld high are the traditional silent cheer.

4. Never say anything to an opponent designed to affect his

play adversely. Gamesmanship is not the spirit or purpose.

5. Be ready to play when your turn comes. Don't be caught at the hog line chatting with the gang on the next sheet when you should be in the hack awaiting your skip's call.

6. Players who put on sliders should put them on quickly;

this kind of delay is frustrating to the others.

7. Three's. You are vice skip. You stand in the house, direct the sweeping on the skip's stones. It does not mean that you have anythin to say about what shot is to be played. Your should be entirely supportive of your skip; don't advise unless asked, don't mumble or offer unneeded asides. Unsolicited advice from the Vice can be the single most disturbing adverse influence on the Skip's morale and his ability to make the shot.

8. All players other than Skip and Vice must stay out of the house area until the end has been completed and score agreed upon.

9.Avoid like the plague any displeasure at your own or a teammates misses or misfortunes. Criticizing your own teammate deserves no further comment. Broom throwing (which has occurred) has no place in curling. Don't equate competitiveness with childish behavior on the ice.

10. Skips. Make up your mind promptly and call the shot. Those long walks down the ice, that deep reflection, those dramatic interludes are wastes of time; some people have even suggested the word "theatric". Keep the game moving.
