WILLIAM A. KIMBEL

Long time members of the Ardsley Curling Club were nostal-gicly saddened to learn that on December 19, 1980 our club's founder, William A. Kimbel, died in Murrell's Inlet, S.C. at the age of 92.

Inspired by his father-in-law, G. Herbert Windeler, for whom our Windeler competition is named, Bill Kimbel founded the Ardsley Curling Club in 1933 when St. Andrews invited us to curl on their new three sheets of ice. When we decided to build our own club house Bill, who had already moved South, generously donated the decor of our warm room in the form of panelling, tables, etc (all except the fire place - a gift of Libby Von Bermuth - and the individual chair gifts). Members will note that our warm room contains a plaque reading;

"This warm room is dedicated to the friendships found through curling in memory of G. Herbert Windeler who inspired the founding of the Ardsley Curling Club in 1933". Maud and Bill Kimbel.

A letter of condolence on behalf of the club has been sent to Maud Windeler by Mait Griggs, our only active curler who was a founding member.

The rink this year consisting of George Shirk 111, lead; John Chebetar, Second; Walt Baggett, Vice-skip; and Adam Chebetar, Skip, traveled to Norfolk, Conn. host club of this years Dykes. 
