The last losing skip from a draw (all draws) is to get the squirt bottle from the bartender (room temperature water) and fill in the holes. It takes 2 minutes per sheet and is ready in 5 minutes. If it is bumpy, take the scraper off the wall. A few minutes of effort will make the ice better for all.

CURL CANADA CORNER - HITTING THE BROOM

Probably the most common problem with many curlers is being significantly off the broom (e.g. more than 6 inches) particularly on wide shots (e.g. the 5 foot and out) and most often on take-outs.

Develop a routine

- o Enter the hack from behind, point your toe at the broom, square your shoulders to the broom, and drop down into the hack.
- o Now don't move anything <u>particularly</u> your hack foot (if you wiggle back and forth the chances are you are now pointed in a new direction).
- o <u>Don't rush your delivery cadence</u>: Rock forward (at the broom)); rock back (on a straight line to the broom); rock forward; foot in behind; push from the hack; extend; and release.
- o The extra weight for take-out comes from a combination of more arm swing, more leg drive and an earlier release point in the combination comfortable for you. Don't be too "quick" and get out of sync and off-line.

OTHER TRAVELERS

"The Fletchers met our alumni Marilyn and Hank Eager at the Royal Montreal Curling Club in November for their Mixed Bonspiel. Some of the more pleasant aspects of this event include the scenic drives through the Catskills and Adironacks, the stay in the cosmopolitan city of Montreal (the hotel is only 2 blocks from the rink) and a visit to a club dating back to 1807. John was a quiet gentleman and loved the comradery of curling. He served as Treasurer and his talents were of great value in our establishing our arrangement with the Country Club.
