FALL COCKTAIL PARTY

On Saturday, September 30, 1989, we will get the season started with a cocktail party on the terrace of the Ardsley Country Club from 4:00 PM to 7:00 PM. This party will replace the Fundspiel held in recent years in the curling club. The problems involved in decorating the large curling area, obtaining and setting up tables, organizing the silent auction, and getting the whole club cleaned up that early in the season had become so burdensome in past years that the Board decided to try a new approach to kicking off the new year.

The Country Club bar will be open and everyone will be able to sign for their drinks. There will not be an admission charge. Any member interested in staying on for dinner after the cocktail party should call the Country Club and make reservations in advance. Please remember that the Country Club requires men to wear jackets and ties.

FUNDRAISING RAFFLE

The curling club had always counted on the Fundspiel as a way to raise money and thus avoid the necessity of raising dues or assessing members for the necessary funds to balance our budget. Last year we raised \$3,065.00 at the fundspiel through the silent auction, the sale of drinks and chances and the dinner fee. This year those sources will not be available to us and consequently the board has decided to hold a raffle with the ticket sales starting the night of the cocktail party and ending on New Year's Eve, or earlier if all tickets are sold prior to that date.

Two hundred tickets will be sold at a price of \$50.00 per ticket raising a total of \$10,000.00. One half of this amount will be presented to the lucky winners as follows: 1st prize --- \$2500.00 (one); 2nd prize --- \$1000.00 (two); 3rd prize --- \$ 100.00 (five).

If all tickets are not sold then the prizes will be equal to 1/2 of the gross sales and will be awarded on a prorated basis.

The winners will not have to be present on New Year's Eve to collect their booty.



ARDWICKS WIN 2ND EVENT AT USWCA NATIONAL BONSPIEL

An Ardwick team ventured into the 32 rink USWCA National Bonspiel held in Schnectady in February. The Bonspiel Forates between the Eastern, Central Wisconsin and Western areas of the country. This year 10 states were represented.

The Ardwicks, skipped by Shirley Bruce, with Borbie Pasterson at three, Marcella Hanlon at two and Molly Babcock playing lead, played five 10 end games and one 11 end game, losing only one, and that by just one point, on their way to winning the Indian Hill Trophy. They defeated teams from Omaha, Neb.; Glendoe, Hi; Albany, NY.; Skokie, IL.; and in the finals, St. Paul, Minn.

Their only loss was to a team from Green Bay, Wis., and, as mentioned previously, that was just by one point.

ST. ARDSLEY BONSPIEL

Eighteen rinks, including thirteen out of town entries, participated in the 6th annual St. Ardsley Mixed Bonspieleduring the weekend of February 16-18. By Sunday afternoon the field had narrowed down to six rinks participating for three medals.

The Childs Medal, awarded to the winner in the 1st event, was won by Nutmeg 2, skipped by Ed Morley with Kathy Wagner at vice,

and Gus and Susan Fowler playing the front end. Highland Park, out of Toronto, skipped by Kim Freeman with Ken Ottenbreit at three, and Dan and Carol Diamond at front end, were the runners-up and won the silver medal. The game was tied at the end of the eighth end but Highland Park broke it open with four points in the ninth.

The Fiske-Barnes Medal, awarded to the winner of the second event, was won by the Ardsley 2 rink skipped by Herndon Fletcher with Marilyn Nichols at three, David Nichols at two, and Bette Fletcher at lead. The St. Andrews Silver Tankard, awarded to the runner-up in the second event, was won by the Rochester entry skipped by Pauline Saunders with Ken Wood at three, Carol Wood at two and Vernon Saunders at lead.

The Ardsley Mixed Medal, awarded to the winner of the third event, was won by Cape Cod 1 originally skipped by former Ardsley curler Harry Oswin with Fran Oswin playing vice, while Julian and Lillian Harwood played the front end. By the time they got to the finals, Harry and Julian had exchanged positions. Runner-up, and the winner of the silver medal, was Don McKay's St. Andrews 2 rink. Nadja McKay played three while Don and Cindy Boss were the front end.
