



# THE THINKING CURLER by Larry Green

Situation: It's the second to last end and your team is down by three and you have the hammer. Your opponent attempts to draw its first rock into the four foot but it slides to the back eight. What shot would you play next?

### Options

1. Take it out and stay. Tempting, but very defensive. It will leave your opposition with a

wide open hit.

2. Freeze. Tough but aggresive shot. Many competitive teams will try this shot

with their third's rocks.

3. Corner guard. Smart choice. It forces your opposition to make a shot which his

more precise than a wide open hit.

#### Discussion

In selecting any shot, you need to determine your objective. In this situation, a score of one or a blank end will leave you with little chance of winning the game in the final end. You need to score a deuce or more to have a good chance of playing an entra end for thw win. A problem which confronts many players is how to play aggressively when their team is behind. It requires offensive strategy. Offensive strategy should increase the pressure on your opposition by making their shot selection and execution more difficult. You need to take some calculated chances with your own shot selection to apply pressure on your opposition. In the scenario above, you could easily hit the rock and stick or worse case roll out. With either result your opposition's next shot is routine. The freeze is an extremely offiensive shot with little room for error. If you make it perfectly you've greatly complicated your oppositions next shot. The freeze is usually left for later in the end after higher percentage options have been exercized. The corner guard is a good mix between offensive strategy and the ease of executing the shot. Your opponent will likely attempt to peel the guard, however, this shot forces them to hit it more precisely to avoid leaving their rock out in front or driving the guard onto their own. Should they make either mistake you will have a greater chance of scoring your deuce or more.

Little did they know the "make sure you lose the right match" curse would strike following their first game win against Mississauga -- Philly lost their ice and the team was forced to choose between a 1:00 am or 6:00 am draw for their second match. In a surprise strategic move, the team opted for 6:00 am and soon found themselves dominating in the party half of the bonspiel. Highlights of the weekend also included front row seats for Topper Waters' eight ender against his brother Randy (imagine the talk around that Thanksgiving table!). Topper hung on through a late game rally by Randy to win and coast his way into the first event finals against our own new member, Ian McKinley (curling for his other curling club). Ian came home with finalist honors and Topper added another piece of hardware to his collection.

Moncton Men's Two teams ventured north the same weekend to play in the 72-team, 34th annual Monctonian in New Brunswick, home of the infamous "Moncton Rule" that changed the face of competitive curling. ## CHANGE IN DUES STRUCTURE EXPLAINED

A number of curlers have expressed confusion and concern over the change in the dues structure. An explanation of the rationale behind the changes was written and posted in the warmroom, but between the holidays and usual start of season "clutter" on our bulletin board, word might not have gotten out to everyone. So, the board asked that we reprint the explanation below.

The dues structure for this year should be considered transitional in nature as we move toward "total curler equality" in line with the change in our By-Laws last year when all curlers were made "active curlers" or Ardsley Curling Club.

There was a great disparity in dues levels last year (see charts). There were good reasons for each of the rates at the time they were adopted, but the dues structure had come to look like the dues structure of a men's curling club, with women's and mixed curling treated as "auxiliary" groups.

There were other issue which the Dues Committee had to take into account, such as:

- Daytime women's curling was cutting back from twice weekly to once, and some downward adjustment in dues was indicated.
- o Men sought to have their program "unbundled." Many men could curl either week night or weekends, but not both. The old dues structure charged only one (high) fee -- too high if one were to curl only once per week. We didn't wan to lose more men because of lack of free time to curl on both week nights and weekends. We also wanted to appeal to those we had already lost for these reasons.

o There were signs that the Competitive League, at only \$132, with other curling, was cannibalizing the regular men's women's or mixed programs.

Therefore we adopted, in principle, a "pay as you play" system, with the basic concept being that each additional league would be cheaper and cheaper.

However, the disparities in last year's schedule were so large that, although we started to level out the playing field, we still had to adopt a different schedule for men, women, and mixed, for this year.

Next year we will have a different (hopefully simpler) schedule as we will be able to eliminate even more disparities.

In conclusion, we have to recognize that each curler must bear his or her share of our costs. Our costs are not out of line, compared to other GNCC clubs. (According to a survey of the GNCC clubs, it costs on average \$20,000 per sheet to run a club. Our operating budget is \$58,000, \$2,000 below the GNCC average.) We need to get members, keep members and spread the burden over more members.

# RULE 10(2) CLARIFIED


At a recent meeting of the rules committee, a decision was rendered regarding the excessive use of Telekinesis during club matches. The committee has long overlooked its use during mixed by the vice skip on opposing teams, but recent inexplicable alterations in stones' paths during the Monday night open league and the Second Event finals of the New Year's Recovery Mini-bonspiel have made this action necessary. While there is no specific wording in the USCA Rules of Play specifically banning telekinesis, it is the opinion of the committee that Rule 10(2), which prohibits the touching of a stone by an opponent would preclude telekinesis (i.e., touching a stone with your mind). In addition, the committee also cited the recent clarification in international curling regarding the use of artificial communications devices between team members (clear-com headsets), as support for their action. Pending a ruling by a Higher Authority (Jerry Garcia?), the use of telekinesis will not be allowed and any stone so touched will be replaced in accordance with rule 10(2).


# Mini-'spiel results


## BETWEEN THE SHEETS...

## NEW CURLERS

## Please keep this page for reference

One of the key reasons why curling is such a great sport is the Etiquette that we follow. Since 40% of our club members have joined in the last two years, it is important that each member understands the Basic Etiquette for Curlers listed below:

- Be on time! All players should be ready to go on the ice at least 5 minutes prior to the start of the game. Failure to be on time may penalize your team.
- If you are unable to curl a specific game, find your own substitute and notify your Skip of the change.
- Please help keep the ice clean by wiping your shoes before going on the ice.
- Be ready to deliver your stone when your turn comes. Get into the hack immediately after the preceding player has delivered their stone.
- Stand quietly and motionless to the side of the sheet between the hog lines when an opposing player is in the hack or studying his shot.
- After sweeping the stone, go immediately to the sides. Do not return to the hacks by walking down the center of the ice.
- Remain on the ice during the course of play. You may leave the ice in case of necessities or an emergency.
- Please do not drag the broom on the ice when not sweeping a stone since particles from your broom may cause debris for the next shot.
- Be courteous to players on other sheets of ice and do not disrupt their games.
- Viewers should not disrupt the play of the game with excessive noise or by pounding on the glass.
- Sweepers are to leave the house as soon as they have swept the stone.
- Curling is a team sport. All members of the team should concentrate on the play of the game.
- Please take good care of the ice, stones and equipment.
- Please do not eat on the ice.
- Should you be practicing, replace the stones as they were when you started.
- Should you burn a rock, please acknowledge this to your fellow teammates immediately.
- Curling is a gentleperson's sport. Courteous behavior is expected at all times.

#### ARDSLEY COUNTRY CLUB GOLF AND HOUSE PRIVILEGES FOR CURLERS

From April through October all curlers in good standing may:

- 1. Use the country club clubhouse facility (dining rooms, bar, etc.) up to twice per month. There are no restaurant minimums from April to October.
- 2. Play golf on the country club course once per month, upon payment of greens and cart or caddy fees.

Curlers may use the clubhouse on any day of the week as long as it is open. The club is normally closed on Mondays. The normal dress code applies, and the staff would appreciate it if you would call ahead for dining reservations.

As for golf, curlers may play on any day of the week, except when the course is closed for maintenance (normally Mondays) or outings. Curlers do not have guest privileges for golf. No jeans (including designer jeans) or tank tops are allowed. Please call ahead to the pro shop 591-8403 to arrange a tee time. Introduce yourself as a curler and the staff will be happy to accommodate you.

These privileges pertain to all curlers at Ardsley, including St. Andrews, Caledonians, and Ardwicks. If you have paid your dues for the curling season which just ended, you can enjoy these privileges through October without additional dues. However, please note that these privileges do not extend to Associate members.
