

TURKEY TROT BONSPIEL



CURLING RULES

Be on time. All players should be ready to go on the ice at least 5 minutes prior to the scheduled start of their game. Being late could penalize your team. Help preserve the ice by making sure your shoes are clean before going on the ice and not kneeling or sitting on the ice for extended periods of time. (Your body heat can cause indentations in the ice that will effect the trajectory of the stones. It is not easy to fix this problem once they are in the ice.)

Be ready to deliver your stone when your turn comes. Get into the hack as soon as the preceding player has delivered the stone.

While the opposing player is playing or studying their shot, stand quietly by the side of the sheet, between the hog lines.

After sweeping a stone, go to the side of the sheet. Don't return to the hacks by walking down the center of the ice.

Remain on the ice during the course of play, leaving only in case of necessities or emergencies.

Be aware of players on the other sheets of ice and try not to disrupt their games.

Please do not drag the broom on the ice when not sweeping a stone as particles from your broom may leave debris in the path of the next shot.

Viewers in the warm room should not disrupt the play of the game with excessive noise or by pounding on the glass.

Sweepers should leave the house as soon as they have swept the stone.

Curling is a team sport; all members should concentrate on the play of the game.

Please take good care of the ice, stones and other equipment.

Please do not eat on the ice.

After practicing, return the stones to their original position at the side of the hack.

Should you burn (touch in any manner) a stone, you should acknowledge this to your teammates immediately and stop the stone.

Curling is a gentleperson's sport; courteous behavior is expected at all times.



THE TWO BROOMS

The Two Brooms is a friendly competition between Nutmeg and Ardsley Curling Clubs, with each hosting either the evening or day event. There are three teams from each club competing. This year Jean Murphy, Nadja McKay, and Marion Cowles skipped for Ardsley at Nutmeg on 7 December 1995, with Nadja's team winning. Nancy Clancy, Jean MacIntosh, and Mary Jean Keenan skipped for Arsdley at Ardsley on 11 January 1996. Both Jean and Mary Jean's teams won. This competition began in 1971 among the Ardsley Ladies Curling Club, Nutmeg Women Curlers, and the Westchester Wicks under the name of Ard-Nut-Wick. It was renamed Three Brooms in 1972. Revisions of the rules were made in the 1978-79 season, in 1986, and the last time in 1989 after Ardsley Ladies Curling Club and the Westchester Wicks merged as one club under the name Ardwicks. At this time the evening curlers were brought into The Three Booms. The name was changed to the Two Brooms in 1992 to represent the two club competition now.
