Chris Banino, Vic Huebner, Paul Mort, Jean and Pete Murphy, Don Torre and Shoji Takiguchi all took the course and are looking forward to helping the rest of us with our curling technique in the coming weeks.

The Curl America program has been organized by the USCA and was developed with the help of Curl Canada and the Olympic Curling Program. Keith Munro from the Schnectady Curling Club and Faith Lundren and Grant Johnson from the Plainfield Curling Club were the instructors.

TURKEY TROT BONSPIEL: This is an intra-club affair in which all members are invited to participate regardless of their experience or lack thereof. INTERNATIONAL CURLING: (by Lillie Shortridge-Baggett). Last year Ardsley teams curled in the Canadian provinces of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec, and Ontario. Now how about some real international curling like Russia, France and Holland? Yes, teams from Ardsley were there.

In May, Carol and Jim Gutekunst took a trip to St. Petersburg, Russia, to curl in a summer bonspiel held in an ice arena next to the Bolshevik Cannon Factory. They joined friends from three other curling clubs, Burlington Curling Club of Ontario, Cape Cod Curling Club and the Swiss Turtle Curling Club from Switzerland, and formed a men's team and women's team both curling under the banner of the Swiss Turtle Curling club.

The highlight of the bonspiel came in curling against the Russian Olympic Team. Both of the Swiss Turtle teams were eliminated in the quarter finals with Carol's team scoring more points than Jim's

In late May Walter and I journeyed to Viry Chatillon, just south of Paris, to curl in a bonspiel. We curled with Steven Hines from England and Ben Wiegers of the Netherlands on a team called Margarita USA. We tied a team from Switzerland, lost to a German team, beat a French team and a team from Minnesota. We then were eliminated by a local team.

To round out the incorrectly named "off- season" in September, Jim Gutekunst and I were joined by Vic Huebner and Steve Smith for the Windmill Bonspiel in Utrecht, The Netherlands. We curled as the New York Caledonian Curling Club. We won our first three matches but then lost in the semi-finals to last year's champions, a Danish team, which moved us from third to seventh place ranking in the 40 teams from 12 countries.

Merle Huebner joined Vic on the trip, bringing along her curling gear in case a substitute might be necessary. The Caledonians didn't need her but she did substitute on a Belgian team for the entire bonspiel curling with two curlers from Belgium and one from Holland.

COUNTRY CLUB DINING PRIVILEGES: Now that the curling season has started all Active members of the Ardsley Curling Club ('this includes members of the Ardwicks, N.Y. Caledonian, and St. Andrew's curling clubs) are welcome to use the dining facilities of the Ardsley Country Club. The hours and days that meals are served may vary during the winter months so it would be advisable to call in advance to make sure that they are open and to make a reservation. (914 -591-8150). Dress in the Grill Room is casual (sweaters and shirts with collars) but jackets and ties are required in the Dining Room. Blue jeans are not permitted in the Club House. Members of the curling club are not subject to a minimum charge. To charge meals and beverages use the same account number you use at the curling club.



THE GRAND NATIONAL CURLING CLUB AND YOU: (by Walter Baggett, GNCC

Representative). As most curlers already know we are members of regional, national and international organizations. The dues you pay to the Ardsley Curling Club also make you a member of the Grand National Curling Clüb (GNCC) and the United States Curling Association (USCA). The GNCC, which was founded in 1867, is an organization of 37 curling clubs, all but one in the northeastern United States. Not all of these clubs have their own ice but nevertheless they have active members who curl at other clubs or on bonspiels. The newest club to join the GNCC, the Triangle Curling Club of Pittsboro, N.C, was established in 1995 and curls on skating ice.

One of the functions of the GNCC is to schedule interclub bonspiels. Paul Mort, a member of the Ardsley Curling Club, is responsible for putting together this schedule which is published in the GNCC Schedule of Events. A copy of this schedule was recently mailed to all members. It lists the men's, women's, mixed, open and youth bonspiels.

For new members, "bonspiel" is another of those mystical curling terms with no known origin. They are curling competitions. Most club members are aware of our club bonspiels such as the Headless Horseman and the Turkey Trot. We also host other bonspiels such as the Douglas International and Empire State bonspiels in which curlers from other GNCC clubs and Canada participate. Both new and old curlers should also know that there are plenty of opportunities to join a team and head out of town for a bonspiel. For most teams the biggest problem is getting enough people to go. If you have any interest at all, speak up when you are sitting around the table after a game. People will point out the club members to ask.

Of special interest to new curlers are the Dykes, Kayser and Women's Challenge bonspiels. These bonspiels are for curlers with five years or less experience. Of interest is the fact that Mieko Takiguchi, Alice Yeh, Lillie Shortridge-Baggett and Monica Dysart were the 2nd event runner-up in the Women's Challenge held at Nashua, N.H. in March of '96 and a team skipped by Ed Siebert won the fourth event at the Ray Kaiser Memorial Bonspiel held at Ardsley in March of '96.

From a practical standpoint, curlers should plan on leaving home Thursday afternoon or at the very latest on Friday morning to participate in an out of town bonspiel and getting back home sometime on Sunday. Besides the cost of transportation (most GNCC bonspiels are within a two to four hour drive) you should figure on a \$50.00 per head entry fee, two to three nights in a hotel and the cost of food and drinks. A banquet is usually included in the entry fee and inexpensive meals are often provided at the host club.

The number of games played at a bonspiel depends on your team's win and loss record. The minimum is usually three games even if you lose all games. If you win a few games, then you may play quite a few more. The hospitality is almost always super and you will make many new friends. Remember to take some spare club pins to trade with your opponents. The Ardsley pins can be purchased at the curling club. They are kept in the trophy cabinet to the left of the fireplace. Take the number of pins you desire and then sign the book kept with the pins.

THE SCOT TOUR: On Thursday, January 30, 1997 The Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland will visit the Ardsley Curling Club and play five games against our local curlers. The Scots will have been here in the States for about two weeks before they play here, having visited many other clubs in upstate New York and points west. This tour takes place every ten years and this visit will be the third time the matches have been played at Ardsley. Previously they were played at St. Andrews.

The scoring is cumulative - the total points scored by the Scots for the whole tour vs. the total points scored by the U.S. In 1992 the United States Curling Team visited Scotland where the U. S team won with a score of +63. Don McKay was a member of that team as were our old friends Ken Cooper, Pete Mitchell and Chuck Owens. The U. S. team will return to Scotland in 2002. U. S. women curlers have the same reciprocal arrangements and a U. S. team is currently touring Scotland.



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The Scots will be arriving in our area on Wednesday, January 29th and will spend that day in the city followed by a banquet hosted by the Royal Bank of Scotland. This was arranged with the help of John Barclay who curled at Ardsley about six or seven years ago. At that time John was the Manager of the New York office of the Royal Bank of Scotland. Although now retired and living in England John was pleased to help arrange the dinner.

While arrangements for the games at Ardsley are still in the formative stage, we do plan to serve lunch in the warm room and have two cocktail parties at member's homes in the neighborhood before a banquet at a local restaurant Thursday evening. There will be three games at Ardsley at 10:00 AM and two games at 2:00 PM. We will need help with transportation, food preparation, and the cocktail parties.

They curled under the banner of GNCC since Williams is the First Vice President, Bunky Harmon is the Treasurer and Paul Mort is the Schedule Chairman. Although this team won three out of their four matches, the Canadians won the overall competition. Due to the loss of ice at two of the clubs some of the games were reduced to four ends.

MONCTONIAN This 68 team bonspiel was held on November 14-16 in Moncton, New Brunswick. Curlers from Ardsley have traveled to this distant spot many times over the years. This year a team skipped by Ed Godbold, with Walter Baggett playing third, Paul Mort at second and Boh Hayes (a former member of Ardsley) at lead made the trip and, although reluctant to report on their record, said they made a lot on new friends. Also making the trip were Steve Smith, Jim Gutekunst, and Jerry McCarty. They were joined by a friend from Toronto who played lead. We will also probably need two cars to drive two Scottish teams to Plainfield on the morning of the 30th. Plainfield will return them here in the afternoon. Please call Bob Hill to volunteer (914-944-7009).

HISTORY OF THE SCOT TOUR The first recorded visit of Scottish curlers to the U.S. was in January 1938. Eight matches were played at The Country Club in Brookline, MA. with T.C.C. winning five. The stone count was T.C.C. 91 and Scots 72. In January 1949, a team of Scots competed again at T.C.C. against 12 rinks from 4 local clubs. The Scots won 7 games and outscored the local teams 110 to 79. Both of these matches were played by Scots primarily touring Canada. Their first exclusively U.S. tour came in 1955 when they began to compete for the Herries Maxwell trophy. In that year, teams from the Boston area played 8 games against the Scots and lost 7. The stone count was Scotland 52 and the U.S. 29.

In 1967 the Scots returned and played against 24 teams from the Boston area. Only 8 games counted as Trophy matches and the Scots won 7. The point margin was 82 to 59.

In 1977, when the Scots returned again to the colonies, they extended their tour to the midwest and the GNCC area outside Boston. During that tour, in which all stones counted for the Herries Maxwell Trophy, the Scots had 1216 points to the Americans 998.

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Meanwhile, the U.S. sent teams to Scotland in 1952, 1962 and 1972, all with indifferent results. In 1982 the U.S. team, with Bud Chandler and Bill Ensign as Co-captains, won the Trophy. In 1987 the Scots arrived here with high hopes of recapturing the Trophy but, when the final stones were counted, the U.S. had prevailed.

In 1992, the last time the trophy was played for, the U.S. visited Scotland and outscored the Scots 856 points to 793, thus retaining the trophy.

In January 1997 the Scots will return and once again attempt to regain control of the Herries Maxwell Trophy. Will they succeed? Stay tuned to find out.

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NO STONE LEFT UNTURNED. Many of you may have wondered about the activity on December 20th and 21st regarding the efforts some members of the club were expending on our curling stones. Last January, while he was at the Douglas International Bonspiel, Shorty Jenkins, the world's foremost ice and curling rock consultant, was asked whether he thought our stones were due for machine sharpening after about thirty years of use. Upon inspection, he opined that it would take another fifty years - per side! - before the stones would be worn down enough. He further advised that he had a manual method of grinding the stones which would produce fast, evenly matched stones.

Therefore, Kay Sugahara arranged for Shorty to start work on our stones on December 20th and by the evening of the 21st the task was completed. He was assisted by Chris Banino, Geoff Broadhurst, Ed Godbold, Vic Huebner, Paul Mort, Greg Sheridan, Steve Smith and Kay Sugahara. The large number of assistants was required to spin the rocks on emery cloth. If you think it's hard to spin rocks on ice, try it on sandpaper! Over \$500.00 worth of emery cloth was used.

With the precise weight of each stone determined this past summer by Geoff Broadhurst and Jessie Wang, Steve Smith was able to write a computer program to match the stones.

•The whole objective of this exercise was to make the stones faster and to match the pairs of stones. It is believed the speed has increased by 2 1/2 to 3 seconds. The stones now curl about 4 1/2 to 5 feet but will straighten out to 4 to 4 1/2 feet in about one month. It is hoped that no one will have difficulty playing a good game under the frostiest of conditions with these faster stones.



CLEAN YOUR BRUSHES: Ed Godbold has asked that the following article be included for everyone's information. Curlers disagree as to how often Brownie Brushes and other brushes with-cloth covered-heads should be-cleaned. The original Brownie heads (many of these are orange) hold onto dirt quite well. The new Brownie heads (many of these are blue) have a tighter weave and need cleaning more often. In both cases, the more often you clean, the easier it is to do. We now have 4 inch white brushes at the ends of our sheets which are good for cleaning these heads. Be sure to hold the brush over a waste basket while you are cleaning it.

The traditional brushes of horse hair or hog hair seem not to collect debris very often. However, it is useful to check at the beginning of a game to be sure no foreign material is in the hairs.

If anyone desires one of these brushes, Ed Godbold can supply one at cost or tell you where to buy one locally. He also has several replacement Brownie heads and the tool required to screw them on.


COMING EVENTS:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 1996-1997. Vic Huebner spoke at the annual Meeting of the club on March 22, 1997, and covered many of the important events that contributed to the success of the past season, not the last of which was the ability of Steve Smith and a crew of helpers to make ice twice within a matter of weeks due to a power outage in October. Gert Messing's and Ed Siebert's efforts to obtain the new handles for our curling stones, and Kay Sugahara's arrangements to have the running surface of our stones sanded, increased our enjoyment of curling this season.

A new lease was signed with the Ardsley Country Club which assures our use of the facility until 2004. The lease was initially drafted by **Kevin Clancy** and after he became ill **Don Mckay** acted as our legal counsel.

The instruction provided to new curlers this year has resulted in them becoming proficient curlers much faster.

The membership drive was also successful with our total active membership maintained at 148.

The following special events hosted by Ardsley this season were also mentioned by Vic: The USCA Women's Regional Playdowns, chaired by Sarah Murphy, The Douglas International Bonspiel, chaired by Gert and Tracy Messing, which made a profit of about \$2500.00 and the journal, spearheaded by Ed Siebert, which cleared about \$8,000.00. Other special events praised in his report included the Scot Tour, chaired by Bob and Jinny Hill and Paul Mort, the Headless Horseman, the Turkey Trot, The Christmas Party at St. Andrew's and the New Year's Eve party. The Fruit sale raised about \$2,500.00 thanks to the efforts of Heather Kenny and Carl Phares, and Jean MacIntosh for the use of her garage.

The efforts of Rich Andrechak, Jane Cavanaugh and Mike Donohue in promoting DUCK GEAR has resulted in attractive logos, sweaters and shirts which could raise funds for the club in the future. The publishing of the club newsletter by Bob Hill was also mentioned as a benefit to the club this past season..

Vic Huebner then went on to point out several significant challenges ahead of us. These include:

- 1. Reducing membership turnover. Last year we had 40 members leave. We replaced this many, but the turnover is costly due to the discounted dues for new members in the first year.
- 2. Attracting new members. We need to continue to gain new members and the best way to do this is through personal invitations.
- 3. We need to improve organization of committees and working groups in the area of Finances, Ice and Facilities. Several of the committees formed last fall worked very well and we need to expand on these.
- 4. We need to keep our ice cleaner. There is too much dirt brought in on our shoes. Shoes should be thoroughly cleaned before going on the ice. In fact, street shoes should not be worn on the ice! We need to take much of the maintenance load off Steve Smith's shoulders next year.
- 5. Resolving the warm room smoking question is an important issue and the feedback from all members is important.
- 6. Amending the By-Laws of the club for tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code needs to be completed.

HAVE BROOM, WILL TRAVEL: Members have been traveling far and wide the past few months and here are the details of their bonspieling - successful and not so successful.

GOLDEN HANDLE MIXED BONSPIEL: Played at Nutmeg Curling Club on March 20 - 23.
