MEN'S SUMMERSPIEL, CAPE COD CURLING CLUB, JULY 16TH-19TH: A team skipped by Walter Baggett, with Paul Mort, Bill Winkler (a former curler) and Chris Banino represented Ardsley. Don McKay, curling as a member of the "U.S. Men's" team, with Dave Dewies and Bob Octaviano of Cape Cod and Vern Griffin, won the third event.

VIRY CUP INTERNATIONAL BONSPIEL, VIRY-CHATILLON, FRANCE: Walter and Lillie Baggett entered this international bonspiel again this year with Walter skipping and Lillie playing lead. They were joined by Stephen Hinds from London at third and Peter Welch from England at second. They won their first game against a French team 11 to 7 and then defeated a team from Geneva, Switzerland 8 to 6 in their second game. They won their third game against another undefeated team, the Swiss Turtle women's team on which Carol Gutekunst played second, by a score of 10 to 8, which put them in third place overall in the competition of twenty teams. In the next game, against the second place team from Strasbourg, Walter's group lost by a score of 7 to 5. On Sunday, the final day of the bonspiel, Walter's team defeated a team from Adelboden, Switzerland by a score of 11 to 7, thereby finishing third in the bonspiel and winning the Coupe de la Ville de Viry, a trophy that now sits on the Baggett's mantle.

Carol and Jim Gutekunst also participated in the same bonspiel, Carol with the Swiss Turtle international women's team and Jim with the Swiss Turtle international men's team. Lillian and Julian Harwood, members of the Cape Cod Curling Club, also curled with the Swiss Turtles. The other two members of each team came from Canada and Switzerland. The Swiss Turtle women's team, the only all women's team in the bonspiel, came in 4th place. Carol said that the high point of the bonspiel was when her team beat the men's team from Baden Hills in Germany which won the bonspiel in 1996 and also won the 4th event in last year's Douglas International Bonspiel here at Ardsley.

At the bonspiel banquet on Friday evening, Walter and Lillie were initiated into the Margarita Curling Club with the official opening of a U.S. branch, with Lillie as its first President. Vic also sees the accountabilities of Skips to include the following:

- 1) Be sure all team members get equal ice time.
- 2) Maintain Curling Rules, Etiquette and Sportsmanship.
- 3) Help curlers improve through constructive comment.
- 4) Lead the rink through good strategy and shot making.
- 5) Make the game enjoyable.

The Board has agreed to investigate and install a monitoring system to alert key people if the electric power to the compressor fails or is interrupted. This system is expected to be installed this fall. While the Board was discussing this matter at the Ardsley Country Club, the power failed and the rest of the meeting was conducted by candlelight.

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GNCC Jr. CHAMPIONSHIPS USCA PLAYDOWNS. The most important news comes from our Junior curlers who on the last weekend of November, at the Utica CC, defeated three other GNCC teams to win the right to represent the GNCC in the USCA Junior National Men's Championship at the Kettle Moraine CC in Hartland, Wisconsin February 1-7, 1998. The team, consisting of Dave Falco, Skip, John Soares, Vice Skip, Tim Wilson, Second, and Rob McKay, Lead, and Dan Brennan, Alternate, and coached by Jennifer Laurie, won all four games they played with impressive scores. The other teams entered in the playdowns were Utica and two teams from Broomstones. During the course of the playdowns, Rob McKay played the lead position in three games and Dan Brennan played lead in one game. All four members are college students and are 19 and 20 years of age. They also plan to curl in the Douglas International at Ardsley February 26th to March 1st.

ROSS TARLTON BONSPIEL. On the weekend of November 6-8, three Ardsley curlers joined Sam Williams, the new GNCC President, and curled under the GNCC banner. The Ross Tarlton was played at the Toronto Cricket CC between 16 teams representing the Ontario Curling Association and 16 teams representing the GNCC. Curling with Sam Williams were Geoff Broadhurst, Bunky Harmon and Paul Mort. This team won three of their four games but, despite this impressive record, the teams representing the "OCA" outscored the GNCC by some 500 to 450 points.

THE 38th ANNUAL MONCTONIAN BONSPIEL was held at Moncton, New Brunswick, Canada over the weekend of November 12-15. There were 72 teams entered in this event and 3 of them-were from-the-United-States:-Of-those-three, two-were-from-Ardsley.-Ed-Godbold-skipped-one team assisted by Walter Baggett, Paul Mort and Bob Hayes (a former member of Ardsley now living in Charlotte, South Carolina). This team made it to the quarter finals and in Paul's words "made a lot of friends".

The other Ardsley team consisted of Jerry McCarty, Steve Smith, Jim Gutekunst and Chris Banino. They were joined in Moncton by two additional members, Kevin Murray from Quebec City, who skipped the rink, and Dan Garside from Toronto. In Jerry's words, this was a team with true NAFTA qualities. Once there they purchased a considerable amount of Canadian currency, which happened to be on sale, and proceeded to invest in the Moncton economy.

Over the four days, they managed to play six games, winning three, and being eliminated

WINDMILL CUP BONSPIEL. A few months ago, on September 26-28 to be exact, Steve Smith and Lillie Baggett played in this bonspiel in the town of Zoetemeer, The Netherlands. Last year they were accompanied by Jim Gutekunst and Vic Huebner but unfortunately that pair was not able to join them this year. In their absence, they drafted Stephen Hines from England and Johan Boelee, who curled at Ardsley last year but is now back in The Netherlands. The group curled as Margarita USA (you may recall from the last issue of Duck Soup that Lillie is the President of Margarita USA CC) and although they only finished in the bottom of the top half, which Lillie assures me is "not too bad", they still proceeded with the tradition of throwing a Margarita party. The party started in Steve's room and then moved to the hotel elevator where everyone had their ups and downs. One of the teams they curled against was from the Republic of Belarus whom they invited to the Douglas International. Lillie would like to hear from any Ardsley curler interested in curling in this 'spiel in September 1998:

BONSPIELS FOR EVERYONE. If you are a new curler, or have curled for a number of years, and have never been on an out-of-town bonspiel but would like to go on one, the question arises, "how do I do it"? There are several ways. If you have curled for five years or less you are eligible for the Dykes (for men), the Kayser (for mixed) or the Women's Challenge. Get together with some of your friends in this category and make up your own team. Walter Baggett is our club's representative to the GNCC and can help you get an invitation and an entry form. If you can not make up a team, just spread the word around that you would like to go to a bonspiel and eventually someone in the process of making up a team will get back to you. And finally, the Ardsley Curling Club used to post a schedule of out of town bonspiels on the bulletin board where people could sign up as singles or as a team. This practice has fallen into disuse in recent years but hopefully, if enough members ask about it, it will be resumed this year.

LAME DUCK DELIVERY STICKS. You may have noticed some strange looking sticks hanging with the brooms out on the ice. These are a new addition to Ardsley this year and are for the use of those who have knees that no longer bend or backs that simply protest too

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much when the stone is delivered in any of the conventional styles of delivery practiced at:

Ardsley. The original idea was conceived by a curler somewhere to the North but Paul Mort,

Carl Phares and others are working on a special version for use at Ardsley. A few weeks ago

two Senior curlers skipped teams in a match sharing the same stick with quite satisfactory results.

PENDING MATTERS AT ARDSLEY.

- 1) The Board of Directors has approved the installation of a monitoring system in the control room that will automatically telephone several members of the club if the compressor ceases to operate for any reason, including power loss:
- 2) A committee of Pam Siebert, Jean Murphy, Kay Sugahara, Vic Huebner and Geoff Broadhurst is preparing plans for the renovation of the basement area to include a new and enlarged kitchen and new and bigger men's and women's dressing rooms and bathrooms.
- 3) Shortly after the first of the year a sign-up sheet will be posted somewhere in the warm room regarding the possibility of junior curling (young children, not the age of the ones going to the National Championships). Evidentally enough interest has been expressed by members of the club and their friends to warrant a survey being made. If enough people sign up, the club is prepared to run an experimental program on Saturday afternoons for a period of six to eight weeks.



THE "GRAND MATCH". * * You have probably casually noticed the interesting painting which hangs on the east wall of the warm room near the door leading to the ice. This work of art was presented to the Ardsley Curling Club by H. Lawrence Achilles for whom the first event of



the Schnectady Men's Invitational Bonspiel was named. Larry Achilles was a generous benefactor of the Ardsley Curling Club as well as the Schnectady and Nutmeg Curling Clubs. He originally was a member of Schnectady and was substantially involved in the building of their current rink. After retirement, he moved to Darien, CT. and curled for a number of years as a member of Ardsley. When the Nutmeg facility was built in Darien, he joined that club and helped in their program. When we built the Ardsley facility in 1966, he was a significant supporter of our project and was elected an Honorary Member in 1967.

The original painting was done in 1853. It depicts the Grand Match of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club. This event was held in Scotland between the highlanders and the lowlanders whenever the ice was of sufficient thickness to hold the thousands of curlers and spectators who gathered for the event. A close look at the painting will reveal minute detail in the faces of many of the participants and spectators. These are actual miniature portraits of people who attended and were included as the result of presentations to the painter by each individual.

** This information came from the January 11, 1973 issue of Duck Soup. At that time the original painting was displayed at a curling club in Paris, France. Also, the author notes, that because of weather conditions no Grand Match had been held in the past 12 years.

MEMO FROM THE ICE COMMITTEE. (This was received at the very last minute and has been condensed to squeeze it in.) Having recently been voted the best curling facility in Westchester County by several reputable curling journals published in southern New York, the ice committee would like to remind the members of a few do's and dont's necessary to retain our high quality.

- 1) Please curl with clean shoes. The committee has noticed some mud streaks on the ice which seem to have come from sneaker treads. If you don't keep a pair of curling shoes at the club, please make sure you clean your street shoes carefully before going on the ice!
- 2) Please use sliders and grippers. Not only will this make your curling experience safer, it will also keep the ice clean. Duct tape is an effective training tool. However, if used over a prolonged period, the glue seeps from the tape's edges, picks up dirt, and deposits a dirt/glue mix on the ice.
- 3) Sweep the ice after each match. During the course of play, brush hairs, lint, etc. is deposited on the ice. If left for a period of time, it adheres to the ice surface. Not only are they unsightly, but they seem to emerge at the most inopportune times.
- 4) Respect the facilities. The ice committee has procured various tools and equipment stored on the ice for use on the playing surface only. Please feel free to use them to clean the ice should the need arise. Please do not use them for general cleaning.

We are proud of the condition of the ice this year, but also understand that forces beyond our control alter the curling environment. If you should encounter one of these extra terrestrial events, please feel free to speak with one of the committee. Input can only expand their understanding of playing conditions. The committee members are Steve Smith (chief honcho), Gert Messing, Chris Banino, Bill Borowitz and Bob Welch.

Geoff Broadhurst skipped our #1 team to a tie with Nutmeg #1, 6-6. Curling with Geoff were Isa Barghout, Carl Honzak, John Keenan, Bill Borowitz and Bill Versfelt. Ed Godbold, skipping Ardsley #2, lost his match to Nutmeg by a score of 9-2. We must remember, however, that in the December match Ed won by a score of 13-1. with Gerry Scherocman, Ed Siebert and Scott Silverman. The New York Caledonian Medal was won by Gert Messing's St. Andrew's rink of Bruce Green, Kevin Lockhart and Bob Welch. The runner-up was the GNCC champion Junior team skipped by Dave Falco with Jon Soares, Tim Watson and Chris Banino substituting for Ed McKay. The third event, The Ardsley Medal, was won by the Margarita CC skipped by Markus Fischer with Doug Buchanan filling in at lead. They beat George Austin's N.Y. Caledonian team of Pete Murphy, Mike Murphy and Jim Ajello.

The fourth event, The Williamson Medal, was won by **Jim Gutekunst's** N.Y. Caledonia II team of **Vic Huebner**, **Ray LaBrosse** and **Peter Gutekunst**. They defeated the Cape Cod II team.

Geoff Broadhurst's Ardsley I team with Bunky Harmon, Paul Mort and Bill Borowitz made it to the finals of the Mahopac Medal, the fifth event, where they were eliminated by Howie Zwiefel's Plainfield CC team.

Only the people who were in charge of the various enterprises are noted here, but all who worked are entitled to a vote of thanks from the club. Ed Siebert and Pete Murphy put the Journal together. Carl Phares, as we have come to expect, prepared the breakfasts. Isabelle Mort arranged for the lunches on Friday and Saturday while Paul Mort obtained all the medals. Dinner on Friday night was arranged by Alison Bankes and Nadja McKay, while the Saturday night dinner was the domain of Merle Huebner and Mitzie Wang. Arthur Mojo was the head referee and Steve Smith, Gert Messing and Chris Banino kept the ice in great condition. The final lunch on Sunday was arranged by Jeannette Wang, and the hor d'oeuvres for the whole weekend were Kathy Sundaram's department.

The first Douglas International Bonspiel was played in 1988. This was a combination of the Douglas Bonspiel, which was being played for the 53rd time, and the New York International Bonspiel which was being played for the 13th time. TWO BROOMS. On January 12th the Ardwicks played the second round of this competition at the Nutmeg CC, the first round having been played at Ardsley on December 5th, 1977. At the end of the first round, Nutmeg led the Ardwicks by a score of 31-18. This time around Nutmeg came away with 19 points to Ardwicks 14 points giving Nutmeg the overall win of 50 points to 32 points. Pippa Broadhurst skipped a rink of Elaine Scherocman, Meiko Takaguchi and Rosemary Kindler to a tie against Nutmeg's Joy Noble. Jean Murphy with Pam Siebert, Gail LaBrosse and Norah Clarke lost to Jill Owens rink, and Ann MacMillan with Laureen Paul, Patti Burns and Laurie Frees defeated Andrea Peterson's Nutmeg rink.

ARDSLEY CURLING CLUB HISTORY. In 1973 Joe Ringland, an Ardsley Curler, took it upon himself to write the history of the Ardsley Curling Club from its inception in 1932 to the end of the 1971/72 curling season. Fortunately for Joe, some of the members, and I guess Joe himself, never threw anything away and so he had a store of newsletters, treasurers reports, miscellaneous correspondence, etc. from which to gather all the information he needed. I have been trying to put together the information from 1973 to date so as to bring the history up to date. Unfortunately, the files at the club do not have any information beyond the end of the 74/75 curling season. Geoff Broadhurst had most issues of Duck Soup and House Calls beginning with the 90/91 season up through the 96/97 season and I have all the issues for the 96/97 and 97/98 seasons. WHO HAS BEEN CURLING AT ARDSLEY THE LONGEST? A careful review of membership rosters indicates that Lee Heffner has been curling as a member of the Ardsley Curling Club since the fall of 1964. He was followed in 1966 by Bob Hill and in 1967 by Tony Ficalora, Bill Havens, Mary Jean and John Keenan, Jean MacIntosh and Burns Patterson.

THE ARDSLEY OLYMPICS were held at the club on two successive Sundays, February 15th and 22nd. Thirty-nine curlers from Ardsley, twenty-nine curlers from Nutmeg and two unaffiliated curlers (70 in all) made up the twelve teams that competed in the bonspiel.

The Olympics consisted of two six-end games and two four-end games for each team, as well as competitions for Best Front End, Best Vices and Skips and Best Sweeping. Winners were determined by total points, including substantial bonus points for the winners and runners-up in each event.

Team Iceland, skipped by Scott Silverman, with Alice Yeh and two Nutmeg curlers, Thane and Carol Pressman, won the Gold Medal. The team amassed a large point total the first day that carried them to a first place finish despite strong showings by four or five other teams on the second Sunday of the bonspiel.

Team Australia skipped by Bob Welch with Carrie Welch, Geoff Broadhurst, Dale Strand (from Nutmeg), Robin Gestring and Bob Hill won the Silver Medal.

The Bronze Medal went to team Norway skipped by Diane Muldowney with Karl Koss, Dean Ford, Ann Gauruder (all from Nutmeg) and Brian O'Neill and Carl Phares.

The highlights of the special competitions were **Carl Phares'** winning shot in the Best Front End competition and **Trevor Davey's** "hit and roll" shot to the button, only inches from perfection.

The Best Sweeping competition, Ardsley's answer to Ice Dancing, was judged, as the rules required, on the "effectiveness, coordination, innovation, grace and artistic flair" shown by sweepers. Accompanied by the music of Dr. John and others, the competitors swept with the spirit the occasion called for. Teams Norway, Australia and Germany put so much "omph" into their sweeping that the judges, unable to decide which team was best, called it a three-way tie.

The committee thanks all who helped with the planing, the ice, the food, the decorations, the judging and the clean-up. In addition, thanks to everyone who curled in the bonspiel, from the highly skilled to the commendably eager. It was a good party!!!

And especially the club should thank Rosemary and Jim Kindler, and Gail and Ray LaBrosse who planned this event and labored to see that it worked from beginning to end.

THE RECIPE CORNER. Lillie Baggett asked that this recipe of Merle Huebner's for butterflied lamb be published, so here it is. The marinade is made as follows: 2 cloves of garlic crushed in 2/3 cup of oil, 4 tablespoons lemon juice or 1/4 cup of wine vinegar, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 2 teaspoons prepared Dijon mustard, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon oregano, 1/2 teaspoon basil, dash freshly ground pepper, 1 crushed bay leaf, crushed mint leaves. Mix ingredients for marinade. Place 1 leg of lamb, boned, flattened, with most of fat removed, in a broiler pan, add most of the marinade and let stand a few hours. Broil over hot coals 45 minutes to an hour,

basting with left over marinade. Meat should be charred outside and pink inside.
