#### **GNCC SCHEDULE OF EVENTS**

You may have noticed all the yellow books on the railing to your left as you enter the warm room. These are for you. The book contains a schedule of all the GNCC bonspiels for the 99/00 season, a record of the bonspiels played in the 98/99 season, a list of all the GNCC Curling Clubs and their officers, and finally, a description of the "Rules of Play". All members of the curling club in 98/99 should find one with their name on it. Unfortunately, there are not copies for members who have just joined the club.

#### BASIC ETIQUETTE FOR CURLERS

In order for all players to enjoy the game of curling, the following rules of etiquette should be observed.

- 1) Be on time! All players should be ready to go on the ice at least 5 minutes prior to the start of the game.
- 2) If you are unable to curl a specific game, notify your skip well in advance.
- 3) Please help keep the ice clean by wiping your shoes before going on the ice.
- 4) Be ready to deliver your stone when your turn comes. Get into the hack immediately after the preceding player has delivered his or her stone.
- 5) Stand quietly and motionless to the side of the sheet between the hog lines when an opposing player is in the hack preparing to deliver his or her stone.
- 6) After sweeping a stone, sweepers should immediately leave the area of the house and return to the sides of the sheet between the hog lines.
- 7) Be courteous to players on other sheets of ice and do not disrupt their games.
- 8) Should you "burn" a rock (touch a running stone), acknowledge this to your fellow teammates immediately. The rock should be stopped before it hits any other stone.
- 9) Viewers should not disrupt the play of the game with excessive noise or by pounding on the plate glass

#### **BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING**

At the meeting on October 28, 1999 the Board established the following official policy regarding substitutes. An Associate Member is allowed to curl in our intraclub bonspiels such as the Turkey Trot, The Headless Horseman, New Year's Eve, and Pull the Plug provided there is room for them. An Associate Member may curl <u>only once</u> as a substitute in regular league play.

There are no restrictions regarding Active Members substituting. It should be noted however that an effort should be made to find substitutes from the same league before going to other leagues.

Under the heading of New Business, Pete Murphy advised that a roster of members would be available by Thanksgiving. He also advised that the N.Y. Caledonians would hold their annual meeting at the club on Sunday, November 14<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 PM

## A BIT OF HISTORY

FIFTY YEARS AGO. It was so warm on December 27, 1949, that curling at St. Andrew's was cancelled. The temperature was 62 degrees. It appears that global warming, was a problem even then.

At a special meeting of the Ardsley Curling Club held on November 21, 1949, it was decided that: 1) The membership of the Ardsley Curling Club be limited to thirty-five. 2) The dues for the 1949/50 season are \$50:00 per person.

FORTY YEARS AGO. For the seventh time in eight years an Ardsley rink won, the district medal. Ardsley, skipped by Dick Wells with B. R. Wood, Art Kemp and Langdon Hockmeyer, repeated their success of the previous year.

A quote from the December 11, 1959 issue of Duck Soup reads, "Last weekend will go down in history as one of the worst performances ever given by Ardsley curlers in the Wilds competition. We were able to post only one victory and that was the result of a match between two Ardsley rinks". For those of you not familiar with the history of the Wilds, it was a competition played between the Ardsley C.C., Mahopac C.C., N.Y. Caledonian C.C. and St. Andrew's C.C. at the St. Andrew's Curling Club. In those days fourteen teams competed for the medal and games were played on both Saturday and Sunday.

#### HAVE BROOM, WILL TRAVEL

THE 33<sup>RD</sup> ROSS TARLTON. This 32 rink annual bonspiel was held November 11-14, 1999 at the Bay View Country Club in Toronto that has six sheets of ice. Sixteen teams from the GNCC competed against a like number of teams from the Ottawa Curling Association. The GNCC rink consisted of Bunkie Harmon (Treasurer of the GNCC), Tom Garber (1<sup>st</sup> V.P. of the GNCC, Utica C.C.), Bob Pelletier (2<sup>nd</sup> V.P. of the GNCC, Potomac C.C.) and Geoff Broadhurst (Director of the USCA). This rink had a record of 1 win, 1 tie and 2 losses.

Montgomery also made the trip to Toronto. Bob Will was rather reticent in talking about their results and would only say, "they enhanced international relations no end?"

The Ottawa Curling Association retained the Ross Tarlton Shield by defeating the GNCC by a score of 386 to 304.

In 2000 the games will be played in the USA either in the Albany-Schenectady area or at Lake Placid.

THE MONCTONIAN BONSPIEL. Two teams from Ardsley were among the 66 teams entered in the 40<sup>th</sup> annual Monctonian Bonspiel in Moncton, N.B. on November 18-20, 1999. The first team entered under the name of Paul Mort (a former Ardsley Curler now living on Cape Cod). This team was skipped by Walter Baggett, with Ed Godbold at vice, Paul Mort at two and Bob Hayes (another former Ardsley curler now living in Charleston, S.C.) at lead. This was the 15<sup>th</sup> time Walter and Paul had played in the bonspiel, the 14<sup>th</sup> time for Ed and the 10<sup>th</sup> time for Bob. The team won their first two games and then lost the third and fourth games. This put them in the finals of the Romeo Marine sponsored event (4<sup>th</sup> event out of 10 events) which unfortunately, they lost. However, as runners-up, they were each awarded with clock radios.

The other team from Ardsley consisted of (listed alphabetically) Chris Banino, Don Garside (from Toronto), Jim Gutekunst, Jerry McCarty and Steve Smith. A sixth member joined the team this year, Mark Edwards (also from Toronto). They won their 1<sup>st</sup> game, lost the 2<sup>nd</sup>, won the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> games and lost the 5<sup>th</sup>.

THE CALDER TROPHY, NUTMEG C.C. Walter Baggett skipped a rink consisting of Ed Godbold, Paul Mort and Kal Sundaram in Norfolk, CT the weekend of December 3-5<sup>th</sup>. All games are 10 ends. Our Ardsley curlers lost their first three games which put them in the "Beer Bash", the 4<sup>th</sup> event which they won on Sunday morning by defeating an Albany team 10-2.

THE PISCES. Nutmeg won the most recent Pisces event, a friendly held between Nutmeg and Cape Cod, returning the award to Nutmeg after two straight years of Cape Cod custody. Nutmeggers Carleton Cleveland, Lydia and Chuck Chinzi, Peter DeJong, Nancy Draper, Charlie Mack, Dick Montgomery, Jim O'Boyle, Chuck and Joanna Owens, Jill Owens, Trish Ryan and Jennifer Stannard all participated. Paul Mort and Archie Bruce were part of the Cape Cod team.

FOUNDERS OPEN, PLAINFIELD C.C. Jeff Hannon and Sally Mackenzie Hannon, together with two Plainfield curlers played in the Founders bonspiel the weekend of November 11-14. I guess they had a good time but they did not report any scores.

HARVEST FESTIVAL, PHILADELPHIA C.C. Three Nutmeggers plus substitutes from Philadelphia, playing as an Ardsley team, entered this bonspiel on the weekend of November 18-21. Jeff Hannon, Sally Mackenzie Hannon and Jill Owens marrowly missed a berth in the first event finals by winning the first three games and then losing the fourth.

Another foursome from Ardsley C.C., but playing as the Manhattan C.C., were Kay Sugahará (skipped but threw 2<sup>nd</sup> rocks), Jean Murphy, Pete Murphy (threw skips, \* rocks), and Kim Freeman. They won three games and lost two games.



#### ARDSLEY RECEIVES A 501 (c) (3) DESIGNATION

Thanks to the efforts of **Don McKay**, the curling club has finally received notice from the Internal Revenue Service that we have been designated a 501 (c) (3) organization as of December 16, 1999. The provisions of that designation state that "donors may deduct contributions to you (the club) as provided in section 170 of the code." Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to you or for your use (the club) are deductible for federal estate and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of the code.

Contribution deductions are allowable to donors only to the extent that their contributions

are gifts, with no consideration received.

The next step has already been taken. That is to apply to New York State for exemption from state and local taxes.

There are certain obligations on the part of the Ardsley Curling Club to qualify for this designation. Basically the club must develop and promote the Olympic sport of curling, must develop youth programs, junior programs and senior programs that lead to national and international competition.

The club has already received four donations from members, two in the form of "C" Bonds (compressor bonds) and two in cash.

However, the club closes for its seasonal overhaul on Monday, January 31<sup>st</sup> and will not reopen until Friday March 3<sup>rd</sup>.

THE HEADLESS HORSEMAN This is an intra-club Mixed bonspiel to be held the weekend of February 11 - 13. For curlers unfamiliar with the Headless Horseman perhaps a description is called for. It is simply a bonspiel played on our own ice with only our own members participating. By "own members", I mean anyone curling at Ardsley including New York Caledonians, Nutmeggers, and St. Andrew's members. (Is St. Andrew'sians a word?). It is a three or four event bonspiel with the winners and runners-up of the first two events receiving gold and silver medals and the others receiving prizes.

Winning teams stay in the event they just played in and the losers drop down to the next event. Every team is guaranteed at least three games. Eventually the teams that continue losing are eliminated and become spectators while the winners become finalists.

During the weekend there is a dinner served at the curling club, usually on Saturday night, to which all curlers are invited, even those not entered in The Headless Horseman. The dinner, of course, is usually preceded by a cocktail party.

It's a lot of fun and a great way for new curlers to savor the experience of bonspiel curling.



#### HOG LINE

Where did the term "Hog Line" originate? Your Editor has done a minimum amount of research on the matter but has discovered that Charles E. Funk, author of a book titled "Hog on Ice & Other Curious Expressions", devoted several pages to the expression "Hog on Ice". Mr. Funk states that if one looks in an unabridged dictionary, he will see that in the Scottish game of curling the word, "hog" is used to describe a curling stone under certain conditions. That is, when a player does not give his stone sufficient impetus to cause it to slide beyond a certain distance, that stone when it comes to rest is called a "hog". He does not provide an explanation but quotes from the Century Dictionary, published in 1889 as follows: "Origin obscure, by some identified with hog (i.e., swine); as 'laggard stones that manifest a pig-like indolence,' or, it might be thought, an allusion to the helplessness of a hog on ice.

Several pages later Mr. Funk comes to the conclusion that sometime during the early centuries of the game, rules were established that "hogs" must be removed from play if they did not reach a certain point on the ice - the Hog Line.

# ARDSLEY RECEIVES "EXEMPT ORGANIZATION CERTIFICATION" FROM NEW YORK STATE

Having already received our 501 (c) (3) designation from the Internal Revenue Service, which make gifts to the club tax deductible, the club has now been designated an "Exempt Organization" by the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance effective January 24, 2000. This means that the Ardsley Curling Club, Inc. is exempt from paying sales and use tax to suppliers and mechanics. Each seller must be supplied

with a special form that is good for three years unless otherwise terminated. All bills must be made out to the Ardsley Curling Club, Inc.

The exemption does not apply to affiliated or subordinate groups such as the Ardwicks, or solvential the New York Caledonians or St. Andrew's. Nor does it apply to officers, members or employees of the Ardsley Curling Club, Inc. Personal purchases made by these individuals are subject to the sales tax.

A total of 96 teams from 16 states and 46 curling clubs participated. The oldest curler was 90.4 years of age and the next oldest was 89.7 years of age. The average age of the oldest team was 78.7 while thew average age of the two youngest teams was 55.5. Minnesota had the greatest number of teams with 35 while Wisconsin was a close second with 30.

Ardsley was represented by skip Geoff Broadhurst, Bunky Harmon, Norm Laird and George Cowles. They lost the first two games against teams from Two Harbors CC and St. Pauls CC, both from MN. They then rallied to win their next four games against teams from Anchorage CC, Waupaca CC (WI), Arlington CC (WI) and Wauwatosa CC (WI) to take the 4<sup>th</sup> event (out of 8) in the Seniors Event.

While there they witnessed a rare event – a 1-0 game. There were 7 scoreless ends with the skip who won the toss intentionally blanking each end to keep the hammer. Unfortunately for him, he missed his last shot in the 8<sup>th</sup> end and lost the game 1-0.

Charlie Mack lead his Nutmeg rink of Chuck Owens, Karl Koss and Vance Ward to the quarter finals of the 3<sup>rd</sup> event winning two and loosing two on the way. Charlie comments that they saw the best in the new 8 sheet \$3,000,000. + Curl Mesabi facility and the not so good in the 7 sheet facility at the Hibbing CC facility. The article was about the use of the "extender" referred to as the "stick" at Ardsley and many other clubs. The **USCA** has endorsed the use of the stick for club and bonspiel play in any competition that does not lead to National Championships.

This is important to Ardsley because it can open curling to many people who may have considered it unsuitable for themselves because of back or leg problems. The use of the stick now permits people with those problems to participate in the sport. Our major problem has always been, and probably will continue to be, <u>membership.</u>

Think of all the potential members who have come to an Open House, watched, and perhaps even tried, to deliver a stone using the method demonstrated on the ice, and said "that's not for me with my problems".

So this summer, think back to your friends and acquaintances that have come to the club and gone home without signing up. Call them up and tell them there is a new technique that makes curling similar to "shuffleboard" and invite them back to try again next fall. Tell them you have a friend with two artificial knees who curls and if he can do it, so can they. If they don't believe you, I will even show them my scars!
