This fall, before the start of the regular season, the club was host to a GNCC Level 2 Ice Clinic, organized by Sally Hannon and Steve Smith. We also held an Open House over the course of six days under the direction of the Membership Committee chairs Alice Yeh and Scott Silverman. The Opening Dinner and Pete Murphy's Curling Clinic followed the Open House.

Amidst all these goings-on, the club facilities were cleaned and set up for the new season. Thanks are in order for the many members who lent a hand to make these events a success.

One important reason for taking note of these activities is to emphasize that they are all the result of the efforts of club members. As you know, it is the membership itself that keeps the Ardsley Curling Club running. Club members make and tend the ice. Keep the facilities in good repair and run the leagues, bonspiels and other curling and social events at the club. This volunteer effort enables us to keep the club operating while maintaining dues at an affordable level - - and we can always use more help. Any members who have not been involved in one of the standing committees (Ice, House and Facilities, or Membership, for instance) or in the preparation for an in-house bonspiel or other club event are urged to do so this year. BASIC ETIQUETTE FOR CURLERS

In order for all players to enjoy the game of curling, the following rules of etiquette should be observed.

- 1) Be on time! All players should be ready to go on the ice at least five minutes prior to the start of the game.
- 2) If you are unable to curl in a specific game, notify your skip well in advance.
- 3) Please help keep the ice clean by wiping your shoes before going on the ice.
- 4) Be ready to deliver your stone when your turn comes. Get into the hack immediately after the preceding player has delivered his or her stone.
- 5) Stand quietly and motionless to the side of the sheet between the hog lines when an opposing player is in the hack preparing to deliver his or her stone.
- 6) After sweeping a stone, sweepers should immediately leave the area of the house and return to the sides of the sheet between the hog lines. Do not stand around in the house.
- Be courteous to players on other sheets of ice and do not disrupt their game.
- 8) Should you "burn" a running stone (touch a moving stone with any part of your body or equipment) immediately inform your teammates, stop the progress of the stone before it hits any other stone, and remove it from play.
- 9) Do not cross from one side of the sheet to the other when a player is in the hack preparing to deliver his stone,
- 10) Viewers should not disrupt the play of the game with excessive noise or by pounding on the plate glass.
- 11) More experienced curlers should offer advise and information to beginners. Remember that new curlers have enough problems learning to deliver a stone. Understanding what the skip is calling for and why that shot is called for, will lead to more enjoyment of the game.

12) Never criticize a teammate's or opponent's shot. Everyone is doing the best they can.

COMING ATTRACTIONS

<u>The Turkey Trot</u>. Will be played on Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 25th and 26th. This is an intra-club bonspiel for both men and women. New curlers are urged to participate in this event. **Jim Kindler** and a committee yet to be named will run the event.

Plainfield Friendly – This is an event that has lain dormant for many years but is now being resurrected. The first of two home and home matches is scheduled for Sunday, December 3rd at Ardsley while the second will be played at Plainfield sometime after the first of the year on a date yet to be selected. It is a mixed affair that will start in the morning, break for lunch, and then resume in the afternoon. Jim McGinnis and Margaret Bryant are running the affair and have already posted a sign-up sheet in the warm room. All curlers, experienced and inexperienced are urged to signup. The format, as currently planned, calls for four end games.

Scottish Women's Tour. They're back! Where does the time go? Every ten years a group of Scottish women curlers travel to this country to compete against U.S. teams throughout the northeast. They will be at the Ardsley Curling Club on Tuesday, January 9, 2001. The last time the Scots visited Ardsley was January 31, 1991. Jan Conner and Nadja McKay, two of our current curlers, played against the Scots in that match. Our records do not indicate what the final cumulative scores were but a 1991 issue of Duck Soup said the visitors returned to Scotland ahead by some 400 points. NUTMEG CURLING FACILITY REPORT

Last January, Nutmeg concluded negotiations for the purchase of a plot of land in Wilton, CT. on which to build a new curling club. Initial meetings with the town representatives from Planning and Zoning and the Environmental Commission were promising. We were given wetlands approval, a significant achievement in Wilton, with no significant modification of our plans. We were, however, denied a variance to build because of the excessive slope of the land, effectively ending our ability to build on this site.

Although the Connecticut curlers are unhappy at the outcome on this site we are not disheartened. A new search has already begun and possible sites are already turning up. If anything, this experience has strengthened our resolve to continue with our goal, to build a curling club in Fairfield County in the near future.

ASSOCIATE MEMBER STATUS

Associate Membership in the Ardsley Curling Club is available to any person who has formerly been an Active Member in the Ardsley Curling Club, the New York Caledonian Curling Club, the St. Andrew's Curling Club or the Nutmeg Curling Club. Being an Associate Member entitles that person to charge drinks at the bar while visiting the warm room, to receive Duck Soup, to take part in the club's various social activities and dinners, and when asked, to participate in some of our special events such as the Headless Horseman, the Turkey Trot and Pull the Plug. It does not, however, entitle a person to substitute in any of the regularly scheduled league events.

ARDSLEY HOSTS AN-ICE-CLINIC

Here's to good curling ice at Ardsley thanks to a Level 2 Ice Clinic held there. October 13th – 15th. Instructed by Shorty Jenkins, a world renowned Ice Technician who has supervised the making of ice for numerous Canadian National and World Championships, the clinic was three intensive days of hands-on learning and classroom instruction. The ice arena was flooded and painted white, the circles were scribed and painted, and all the appropriate lines were either painted or marked with the laying of acrylic string (looks better than the plastic tape of years past).

A company called Jet Ice was brought in to demonstrate painting techniques and the importance of using purified water to make curling ice. Shorty Jenkins and the Jet Ice representatives offered several tips on making quality curling ice at minimal costs. Shorty also lectured on trouble-shooting and maintaining curling stones as well as pebbling techniques.

A message he repeatedly drilled home to the participants, which should be shared by all, is that a curling club's biggest assets-are quality ice and curling stones. Treat them with respect and they'll reward you with great games. Abuse them and they'll rob you on your final shot in the 8th end of a game.

Clubs participating in this clinic included Plainfield, Nashua, Rochester, Norfolk, Nutmeg and Ardsley. Steve Smith, Guy Raymond and Shoji Takiguchi represented Ardsley. Nutmeg participants were Sally Hannon, Peter DeJong and Trish Ryan.

Hats off to Trish Ryan who coordinated the entire event and Steve Smith who prepped the ice arena for the clinic.

THE BONSPIEL TRAIL

Margarita bonspiel. Kim Freeman, Steve Smith, and Lillie and Walter Baggett traveled to Minneapolis, Minnesota on the weekend of October 19-22 to attend the first Margarita Bonspiel held on this side of the ocean at the St. Paul Curling Club. The Margarita Curling Club is made up of 175 members, at last count, from 22 countries with established clubs in eleven countries. Our four members made up Ardsley's Margarita contingent.

The Ardsley group lost their first game to a group of Canadian ladies from Lachine. They won their first game in the second event against an Italian team and then the second game against a mix of Canadian and St. Paul curlers. In the semi-finals of the second event Ardsley lost to a father/son/uncle group from Mapleton and St. Paul.

Next year the bonspiel will be held in Hamburg, Germany. Walter reports there is a possibility the event could be held at Ardsley in 2003.

Cape Cod Summer Bonspiels.

The Mixed Bonspiel was played on July 16, 2000. Ardsley was represented by Geoff and Pippa Broadhurst with Jim and Rosemary Kindler. They made it to the fourth event scramble on Sunday before being eliminated.

Trish Ryan, Peter DeJong, Jennifer Stannard and Jim O'Boyle represented Nutmeg. They went 3-0 in their initial draw to make the finals of the second event. Coming back from a 0-6 deficit after two ends, they tied it in the eighth end only to lose to a Broomstone rink on the last rock in the ninth end.

The Men's Bonspiel was played on July 23, 2000. Geoff Broadhurst, Bunky Harmon, Isa Barghout and Bob Hayes represented Ardsley and had a great time while treating their opponents kindly.

The Women's Bonspiel was played on July 19, 2000. Trish Ryan, Tracy Lawless, Jennifer Stannard and Lori Mountford from Madison, WI, represented Nutmeg. Trish reports that they "finished out of the jewelry".

Jill Owens, playing with a Scots Tour Reunions team, was a finalist in the second event.

A team called Chiminutpa for (Chi)cago, (Mi)chigan, (Nut)meg and Philadelphia (pa) won the third event. **Donna Purkey** played second on that team.

The Përth, Scotland, Reunion of the Wengen Curling Club. Walter Baggett flew to Scotland on September 5th to participate in this bonspiel. The Wengen Curling Club is located in Wengen in the Burnese Oberland of Switzerland. It was founded in 1915 and its membership is predominately made up of Scots and Englishmen. The teams Walter was playing with had a 2-2 overall record.

The Pisces. For the 16th time the Nutmeg curlers and the Cape Cod curlers met, this time at Cape Cod, but in prior years it was sometimes played in Darien. Three teams of Nutmeggers consisting of Sally Bolster, Cleve Cleveland, Peter DeJong, Tim Fenton, Jan and Dick Montgomery, Mary Ann Moore, Jim O'Boyle, Jill Owens, Chuck and Joanne Owens, Donna Purkey, Trish Ryan and Jennifer Stannard, met an equal number of Cape Codders and came away victorious by a total score of 46-34.

Among those curling for Cape Cod were former Ardsley curlers Paul Mort and Archie Bruce.

After dinner the host clubs will provide live entertainment choreographed by **Jennifer Stannard** (she is still looking for volunteers, especially men). THE ROSS TARLETON. This bonspiel was played on November 9th and 10th at the Albany and Schnectady Curling Clubs. The bonspiel pits 16 Canadian teams from the Ottawa Curling Association against a like number of teams from the Grand National Curling Club with the winning side being determined by the total stone count. Each team played four games during the two days.

Ardsley, for the first time in many years, entered a team in the bonspiel. It was skipped by Walter Baggett with Norm Laird, Pete McCuen and Bruce Huffine. Pete reports that they got off to a slow start due, in part at least, to Walter's having to miss the first match during which they were skipped by an Albany substitute. After that things steadily improved and closed out with a 2 stone win over a strong Toronto team. Pete was reluctant to tell us what happened with the second and third games but did admit that their contribution to the total GNCC score was on the negative side.

Nutmeg, a long time participant in the Ross Tarleton, was represented by the team of **Bob Will, Dick Montgomery, Karl Koss** and **Rene Menzel.** While there effort was reported as being about a draw overall, they closed out with a 9 rock gain for the U. S.A. in their last match

Bunky Harmon skipped the GNCC team with Tom Garber (1st VP) Paul Mort (Schedule Chairman) and Bob Pelletier (2nd VP). Their record was 1-3 with a net contribution of -5 to the overall score.

The big news was that the U.S. won: GNCC 404 and the OCA 367, the first win for the U.S. since 1994.

THE ACHILLES BONSPIEL was held at the Schenectady Curling Club on November 16th to the 19th. (Also known as the 21st Annual Men's Invitational Bonspiel). A local team skipped by George Austin with Bob Welch, Jeff Paul and Peter Austin came away with the coveted Achilles medal as the 1st event winner. Along the route to victory they defeated Montreal West, Plainfield, Canadian Club of Boston and Broomstones in a thrilling final, by a score of 4-3, Saturday night before a large crowd.

<u>THE CALDER TROPHY.</u> The Norfolk Curling Club hosted the 44th annual Calder Trophy Bonspiel the weekend of November 30th to December 3rd. Three teams from Ardsley were among the 14 entered.

A New York Caledonian rink skipped by **Grant Zolkavich** with **George Austin**, **Bob Welch** and **Peter Austin** won the third event, The President's Cup, after losing their first game to Broomstones (by an inch on the last rock) and a tough second game to Norfolk I. They then proceeded to win their next three games against Potomac, Plainfield and Albany.

Walter Baggett's team of Ed Godbold, Paul Mort and Norfolk curler Hartley Mead defeated Albany, Potomac and Broomstones. This set them up in the finals of the first event against another Broomstones team skipped by Tim Ho. Unfortunately the Baggett team seemed to lose the magic overnight and succumbed to the youngsters from Boston.

Scottish teams played against teams from Plainfield, Chesapeake/Potomac, and Philadelphia. The game between Scotland and Plainfield was close but was finally taken by the Scots by a score of 7-5. The other two games were never in doubt. Scotland defeated the Chesapeake/Potomac team 17-2 and the Philadelphia team 10-3. The cumulative score now stood at Scotland 184 and the U.S. 106, a difference of 78 points.

The afternoon games pitted three Scottish teams against two Ardsley teams and one Nutmeg team. These games were all close. Nancy Clancy's team of Alison Bankes, Katy Clough and Jennifer Stannard lost to Scotland 7-4. Anne Wiggins' foursome of Diane Muldowney, Joy Noble and Trish Ryan were outscored by just one point, 9-8. ______ Jean Murphy was the heroine of the day! She and her teammates, Lydia Chinzi, Liz Murphy and Mieko Takiguchi won their game by defeating Scotland 9-3.

Now, with the curling finished, Scotland had accumulated 203 points against the U.S. total of 127 points, a spread of 76 points.

Dinner Tuesday evening (again organized by Alice Yeh and Mary Jean Keenan) was served in the warm room and followed by a Jennifer Stannard Production consisting of Ardsley and Nutmeg ladies, colorfully costumed and singing humorous curling songs sung to old favorite tunes. Their grand finale had a group of male curlers sweeping gracefully and dancing "not so gracefully" while attired in shorts, blinking bow ties and white top hats, all the while trying to keep time to the song "One Singular Sensation". Fortunately, no one was physically injured (their pride may have been hurt, however) and the dancers were able to exit quickly and turn the entertainment over to the Scottish ladies who obviously were much better prepared than the men.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS WOULD LIKE YOUR THOUGHTS ON THE FOLLOWING PROPOSALS

First, the Board is considering a change in the custom of winners' buying drinks and losing teams' buying back at the conclusion of every game. While this is the practice at many curling clubs, it is not followed everywhere. Changing the practice at Ardsley would relieve members of what can be significant and unwanted expense, particularly for those who do not drink alcoholic beverages. The custom of socializing for a time after games is an important part of curling, which we would expect to continue as before. Under the proposal, however, members would simply buy their own drinks. To effect a change, the Board would adopt and publish a resolution stating, in substance, that buying and buying back drinks should no longer be regarded as either a social obligation or an expected courtesy after games at the Ardsley Curling Club.

Also under consideration is the formation of a new curling league on Thursday evenings. The league would, hopefully, attract members of all skill levels, but would be focused on the needs of less-experienced curlers. For example, newer members would get a chance to play different positions on teams, including skip. Kayser or Dykes teams might use the league to get some practice time together, and the league might serve as an opportunity to provide instruction for those who want it. Participants could enter individually or as a team. Teams could be mixed, all male or all female. To institute the new league and still hold some Men's League games on Thursday nights, we would schedule games at both 7:00 and 9:00 PM on Thursdays (the 8:00 PM Men's Wednesday night games would be unaffected).

SURVEY RESULTS

Only 33 members responded to the survey mailed out by **Jim Kindler.** Among the topics covered were:

<u>Clubhouse facilities:</u> 7 members found the condition satisfactory while 12 found them in need of improvement. Several people said the downstairs changing area needs improvement, such as a new carpet and the toilet areas need work. A new stove is definitely required said many and the Board has agreed to purchase a new stove before next season. Several people said the back of the bar looks "unhealthy". A new warm room ceiling would also be an improvement.

<u>Curling Instruction</u>: 4-satisfactory; 6-need improvement. A comment was that the program needs more organized training.

Ice Conditions: 20-satisfactory; 1-needs improvement

<u>League Curling</u>: 16-satisfactory; 2-needs improvement. Some comments: need new substitute rules to prevent "loading" of front ends, all curlers should be scheduled an equal number of times to curl (better curlers are scheduled to curl more often than others)

<u>Dues and other charges</u>: Drink prices are too high. (the prices are set by the Ardsley Country Club and are the same as the prices charged at the country club – the curling club has no control over beverage prices).

<u>In-house bonspiels:</u> Generally favorable responses but more member participation is required.

Recruitment of new members: It was suggested that recruitment efforts should be expanded and a recruitment committee should be formed.
