FIRST BOOOSPIEL A SUCCESS

Ten rinks (including 11 first and second year curlers) swept in the new curling season at the inaugural Boospiel over the weekend of October 24th and 25th. Though early in the season and the first time many curlers were back on the ice after the long summer break, the curling was good and the action exciting throughout the two days. Everything got started with the first draw at 6:00 PM on Friday followed by a second draw at 8:15 PM. There were five draws on Saturday beginning at 10:00 AM and concluding with the finals shortly after 8:00 PM with the top six teams in this points event curling three Saturday matches.

After struggling in their Friday match and falling behind 5-0 after the first end in their second match, Ed Siebert, Diane Muldowney, Ed Andrews and Pam Siebert roared back to earn the second highest point score during the preliminary matches and then defeated the top point scorers Walter Baggett, Bunkie Harmon, Marion Cowles and George Cowles in the 1st event (The Boospiel) finals. Their win will be immortalized on the Boospiel Cup, which was created in the hopes that this event will become an annual tradition at Ardsley. In the second event, The Witch's Cauldron, Sandy Graham, Mark Bussy, Gail Cosman and Alex Levoci defeated Tom Doherty, Alison Bankes, Jim McGinnis and Joseph Alemani in a match that came down to skips' rocks and distracted the warm room from the disappointing game 6 loss by the Yankees. Peter DeJong, Jim O'Boyle, Ann MacMillan and David Feldstein won a hard fought match against Kay Sugahara, Norm Laird, Sandy Berkowitz and Tim Klein to take the third event Pumpkin Patch final.

A light supper was served Friday evening and a continental breakfast, lunch and buffet dinner were provided on Saturday.

Jane Cavanaugh's Witch and Sandy Berkowitz's Bunny took home the top costume prizes, while Chris and MaryLou Banino, Trish Ryan and Ron Gerard cooperated in designing the best decorated pumpkin, appropriately designated "Miss Boospiel 2003".

MaryLou followed this triumph with a win in the 50/50 "Guess the Candy Corn" contest.

BASIC ETIQUETTE FOR CURLERS

Each year we review some of the basic rules of etiquette for the benefit of both our new members and many of the old members as well.

- Be on time! All players should be ready to go on the ice at least 5 minutes prior to the start of the game. Failure to start on time may penalize your team.
- 2) If you are unable to curl a specific game, notify your skip as far in advance as possible. He or she may tell you to arrange for your own substitute or will do that himself. In either event the substitute should be someone of equal skill.
- 3) Please keep the ice clean by wiping your shoes before going on the ice.
- 4) Be ready to deliver your stone when your turn comes. Get into the hack immediately after the preceding player has delivered their stone.
- 5) Stand quietly and motionless to the side of the sheet between the hog lines when an opposing player is in the hack preparing to deliver his or her stone.
- 6) After sweeping a stone, sweepers should leave the house and go immediately to the sides of the sheet. Do not return to the other end by walking down the center of the ice. This delays the other team in setting up their shot.
- 7) Sweeping A change in the rules this year states that any one curler may sweep the stone after it crosses the T line in the far house. In prior years only the skip (or vice skip) could sweep a stone after it crossed the T line.
- 8) Do not cross the sheet when a curler is in the hack preparing to deliver a stone.
- 9) Do not distract in any manner a curler preparing to deliver a stone.
- 10) Curling is a team sport. All members of the team should concentrate on the game.
- 11) Please do not take food onto the ice. Only plastic glasses may be used on the ice.
- 12) If you "burn a rock" by touching a moving stone with any part of your body or equipment please tell your fellow teammates immediately. A burned stone should be removed from play before it hits any other stone already in play.

GUESTS

Guests are welcome in the Warm Room but their presence and activity should not interfere with play. Excess noise or movement behind the glass is distracting to the curlers. Pounding on the glass to acknowledge a good shot on one sheet can disrupt play on the other sheets. Young children should not be left unsupervised to roam around the warm room or basement.

TIME TO GO BONSPIELING

Now is the time to start thinking about when you can schedule time off, where you want to go and whom you want to go with.

The best place to start is the GNCC schedule of bonspiels. It can be found on the GNCC website, <u>www.gncc.org</u> or in the in the GNCC booklet "2003-2004 Schedule of Events" a copy of which can usually be found on the desk in the warm room. Copies of this are mailed to all members of record as of 12/31/02. New members since that date are not yet on the mailing list. You will find the bonspiels organized by type (men's, women's, mixed and junior) and the date.

Who you want to go with is a bit trickier. Do you want to go just to win, or do you want to take a weekend off, curl some and have a few beers with new friends from other clubs. Picking the right people and combining them with the right event can make for a perfect weekend.

If you are a fairly new curler and are not familiar with the bonspiel circuit, talk to experienced curlers. Someone in the club has most likely been to most of the scheduled bonspiels in prior years. The GNCC representatives at the club, Walter Baggett for Ardsley, Steve Smith for the New York Caledonians, and Chris Banino for St. Andrew's and the club secretaries receive bonspiel invitations and entry forms. These are customarily posted on the bulletin board as they are received. Most of the Grand National Curling Clubs are within easy traveling distance of Ardsley. If traveling greater distances is what you seek then there are bonspiels in Canada, the Midwest and even Europe. (As I write this Steve Smith is curling in Scotland)

After that all you have to do is pick your team and the bonspiel and send in the form. If you are a new curler, the best way to get to a bonspiel is to let it be known around the club that you are interested in attending. A more experienced curler making up a team will then know that you are available.

DONALD G. MC KAY

Don McKay died on January 7, 2004. Many of us will remember Don as a friend and a curler both at Ardsley and earlier at St. Andrew's. Many others will remember him as a pillar in the development of curling in the United States. He was president of the United States Curling Association in 1977 & 1978. He was honored as a PATRON of the Grand National Curling Club, one of only five so honored by the GNCC. He was a founder of the USCA Hall of Fame and Curling Museum in Chicago. He was also, at one time, the Treasurer of the World Curling Federation.

As an attorney Don's efforts will long be remembered for helping curling associations and many clubs, including Ardsley, obtain their 501 (C) (3) educational, charitable tax-exempt status.

He donated the McKay Medal to be awarded in the Francis Dykes Bonspiel and the Archie Bruce Stone to be played for by Ardsley and Cape Cod Curling Club.

Don is survived by his wife Nadja, two sons, Robbie and Eddie and many additional family members.

Ice House Gang vs. The Good Old Boys

NUTMEG UPSDATE

"I'm happy to now report that the expansion project at the Wonderland of Ice site is back on the fast track. Over the last several months the missing funding for the skating expansion came through. We have met with the Mayor of Bridgeport, several City officials and the WOI management to finalize the details of including the curling club in the project.

We have negotiated terms of our sublease with WOI and the Board has voted to sign the revised sublease. The lawyers are revising the revised sublease and expect it ready to be signed next week.

The Mayor will be holding a press conference as early as next week to announce the expansion project, including the curling club. There is now but a single hurdle for the new curling club to become a reality. Unfortunately the Mayor did not like the proposed phased construction approach we presented. He has a vision of a world class curling facility and doesn't want to open a facility that would be anything less. That means we need to raise the entire amount of money required to construct the finished club and we need to do it quickly. We thought we had until April to raise the money needed but just

found out the entire project is currently scheduled to go to the Bridgeport City Council for approval at the end of the month. The process requires funds for any project to be approved to be in place at the time of approval. Without getting into the details, we need to raise an additional \$160,000.00 by 1/31/04 or risk being left behind. The good news is that we received pledges last year totaling \$81,000.00. If these are fulfilled, we only need to raise an additional \$79,000,00.

I don't like to be melodramatic but I believe this could very well be the final chance we have for making our long awaited dream come true. I expect this will be the final call for donations to build our new club. For those of you who have made outstanding pledges, it is time to fulfill your pledge. And if you can do more that would be fantastic. Please contact Carleton Cleveland, Tim Fenton or Charlie Mack to let them know how you would like to fulfill your pledge. Contributing appreciated stock can be an especially tax-efficient way to make a charitable donation in this new tax year.

For those of you who have made past contributions, I thank you. But I must ask again for anything additional that you might be able to do. If you can make any additional contributions, please contact Cleve, Tom or Charlie. We will also create a unique pin to give to any individual who donates at least \$500.00. (pins will be sent to those who have donated at least \$500.00 in the past as well).

Please remember that we are also offering bonds at a 5% interest rate. These are dramatically better returns than current market rates. But most importantly, whether someone gives a donation or buys a bond, if the new club does not get built at Bridgeport, ALL MONEY WILL BE RETURNED. There is zero risk to your donation/bond if this project doesn't happen.

In summary, I know we still have a way to go but I am actually extremely confident we will raise the additional money needed to make this happen"

THE BONSPIEL TRAIL

Ray Kayser Memorial Bonspiel. This is a mixed event for curlers who have not had more than five years curling experience. This year it was held at the Potomac Curling Club the weekend of March 4th to the 7th. There were 32 teams entered: A team from Ardsley, skipped by Sandy Berkowitz with Dan Tufaro, Marylou Banino and David Feldstein were the runners-up in the Hastings, the 4th event. They lost to Broomstones in an extremely close game but eventually clawed their way back by winning two games on Saturday. In the finals of the 4th event against Albany they traded ends fairly regularly but ended up losing in the 8th end.

Not many Ardsley curlers will remember Addison Hastings who curled at our club from 1935 until 1972 when he died. He was an enthusiastic curler and was extremely interested and supportive of new curlers. He taught the game and installed the spirit of curling in everyone who came in contact with him. After his death the Ardsley Curling Club established a men's curling league called "The Hastings" in his honor. As the number of men curlers decreased the league

was terminated and the medal retired from play. In 2001 the Grand National Curling Club revived the medal, with the permission of the Ardsley Curling Club, and it is awarded in the 4th event of the Ray Kaiser bonspiel.

USWCA National Bonspiel—Curl Mesabi-Eveleth, MN. (This is the balance of the story that was omitted from the previous edition of Duck Soup). Diane Muldowney, Nancy Clancy, Pauline Davies and Loraine Waybaum (Broomstones) scored an 8 ender at the USCA bonspiel held February 12th-15th. They were awarded special pins and a trophy. This was the first time in over 30 years that any team has scored an 8 ender in this bonspiel. Their overall record was 1-3. They won the match with the 8 ender and two of the 3 losses came down to the last rock. The third loss was to Lori Mountfort's team. She is a two-time Olympian and two-time Silver Medalist at the worlds.

USCA Senior Men's A New York Caledonian rink consisting of George Austin, Pete Murphy, Trevor Davey and Brian Bammel participated in the 28th Annual USCA Senior Men's nationals in Chicago from February 19th to the 22nd. Their record was 3-2 in the 48 team open division losing in the semi-finals of the third event by an inch on a last rock draw to the button area.
