In this event, the club with the greatest number of total stones is the bonspiel winner, and is awarded the Archie Bruce trophy to hold for the year. This trophy is a 42 pound curling stone atop a large wooden plinth, decorated with a wee statuette of a piper. It is very heavy and awkward to carry.

Cape Cod retained the Archie Bruce trophy with a tally of 41 stones versus Ardsley's 39. It was a Pyrrhic victory, however, as the Cape Codders had to haul the trophy back up the hill and carry it north to Falmouth, where it

awaits our 2024 bonspiel.

Life on an Ice Sheet -- Memo from the Ice Crew

Make sure you clean your shoes before you come into the house to play.

A rolling stone may gather no moss but a curling stone may gather some dirt. Clean the bottom frequently during a game; either with gloved hand or curling broom.

Brooms pick up dirt! Clean yours frequently during a game. Brushes should be provided.

This just in: Bits of dirt and lint like to hide under and around the stones that are at rest in their respective rock houses at the warm room end. Ferret these out before they freeze in. This is one aspect that gets neglected when the sheet is swept at the end of a game. Hand sweep the hacks themselves, and the corners where the stones rest.

And, of course! Avoid: hand prints, knee prints, scratches and gouges. Check your equipment.

Your active participation in maintaining the quality of the ice is another, greatly appreciated, aspect of club membership. The Ice will thank you and so will the Ice Crew. Good Curling.

IN MEMORIAM ANN MARIE "NANCY" CLANCY

Jun 22, 1948 - Jan 22, 2023

Nancy was a devoted curler. Arguably her greatest passion in life from her first introduction to the sport in the 1980s. Curling led Nancy to travel across the United States and often to curling rinks in other countries, including Canada, Scotland, Italy, France, Germany, Switzerland, and Iceland. Curling, and its associated social gatherings, were an outlet for Nancy's other loves in life, including dancing, friends, and generally bringing a high-energy jolt of fun to everyone around her.

Nancy was often first to greet new curlers as they came in the door, and welcomed many to join her on her bonspiel journeys. She ran the Ardsley Tuesday Ladies league from 1999 - 2013 and was active on the USWCA circuit.

She curled with first husband, Kevin Clancy, until his death in 1998 and met 2nd husband, John Dorff curling at Ardsley.



World University Games

Our own Danny Casper as part of his Team USA took a silver medal at the World University Games. Held in Lake Placid this year, the "WUGs" is the second largest sporting event to the Olympics. These "junior olympics" included over 2500 athletes from over 50 countries over 11 days of competition. To be eligible, athletes must be taking classes at a college and be between 17 and 25 years old. The U.S. is the only country to medal twice in curling, with the women earning bronze.





Team Casper made it through on the strength of winning two of three extra end games and a huge win over Team Canada to end up the three seed in the playoffs. After a gutty win against the Swiss, they found themselves in front of a packed house playing Great Britain for the gold. Alas, we fell short after just a couple key misses.

WUGs has been an engine for development upstate. Over \$550 million dollars was spent to refurbish and build out all the facilities in and around Lake Placid. Curling saw a \$7 million investment to completely redo the Saranac Lake Civic Center. Primarily used for hockey and summer events, the Civic Center is now a top tier curling facility, too. Saranac Lake Curling Club will definitely see an uptick in membership. Thank you for all of your support, viewing and cheering on ESPN+. They really felt it.

It looks easy, but it's not!




5U Nationals Bound



Message from the President -- Derek Kayser

Lately, I'm sure you've all been seeing emails with the subject: "A desperate call for volunteers." You may have even noticed all the extra corporate events, Learn-to-Curls, Curling and Cocktails evenings, and many other special events that bring extra income to the club. That's because of the work of Travis Spokes and his group of about 30 volunteers, who have been doing an incredible job this year. The revenue they are working to bring into the club is why we can cover our ever-rising rent and bills without raising your dues.

I like to think we have been transparent about our situation - rent is high, the search for alternative accommodations is difficult in the best of times, and our already high expenses are rising. The work that volunteers do at these events is the work that financially sustains us, but there is only so much work the core group of 30 folks who constantly show up can shoulder. At this point I would like to speak to the other 150 members: I know that life is busy, you get home from work and you're tired - the drive is annoying and there are other things that need to get done, but at the end of the day we are a community, and the curling club needs you. Club upkeep - especially in a world where our dues are kept low by keeping up this volume of special events - cannot be done by such a small percentage of our community. This is my appeal to us all, if we all volunteered at one event per year we would be in really great shape getting what has to be done, done.

This club has made significant strides in the past 5 years - from not knowing if we were going to have a facility at all, to reinvesting in our club by renovating, to increasing our membership to nearly 200, to hosting the premier 5-And-Under and Open Bonspiels on all of the east coast - all of this in such a short time has been such an accomplishment. This is all due to the hard work of our member volunteers. Think of all we could accomplish if the entirety of our community was volunteering.
