

Curling Resumes this Fall

Based on current conditions, Ardsley Curling Club anticipates that we will return to "curling as normal" in the upcoming season. This means we will again use all three sheets, permit two sweepers, allow full access to the warm room and downstairs changing area, have a bar, broomstack, etc. The club will continue to provide hand sanitizer, and strongly discourage people from curling when sick.

To help minimize the possibility of COVID infection, the club strongly encourages all members who are eligible to be fully vaccinated by the start of the curling season. The board is considering whether to require vaccinations for all entering the building.



At the moment, anyone who is not fully vaccinated is asked to wear a mask at all times when in the building.

Covid continues to be a potential threat. Rest assured, that the ACC Covid Committee will continue to monitor the situation and will advise the Board in the event that modifications may be needed to keep our members safe.





How should we pay for curling?

We have a new lease, and we're all looking forward to a great new season and many more years of curling. What does that mean for the budget? Curling is going to cost more, plain and simple. The annual rent (and taxes) are now approximately \$50,000 higher per year than before. This was inevitable, we live in an expensive real estate market. We benefited from well below market rates that kept our rent super-low for years.

Where are we going to get this extra money?

What about reducing costs? The sad fact is that we don't have anything close to \$50,000 that can be cut. For example, our next biggest recurring annual expenses after rent are roughly: electric \$28,000, propane \$22,000 and cleaning service \$20,000. The next few highest costs are: GNCC/USCA dues, NY state sales tax, and insurance (totalling \$25,000). There is little wiggle room for savings here.

We need to increase income, which must include some combination of the following:

- increase corporate sponsorships we now have 3. Getting 14 more gold medal sponsors would close the gap. This is time critical so logos can go down before the ice freezes. Do you know a local business with an advertising budget? Call them!
- bring in more members adding, and keeping, 70 more full price regular members would also close the gap. The first week of October will have multiple open houses. Spread the word!
- increse revenues from corporate events, curling samplers, etc. This won't close the gap, but will help. It requires many more volunteers.
 You can be one of them!
- do you have another idea the board welcomes your input!

\$\$\$ The bottom line \$\$\$

If we don't fully raise \$50,000 new dollars every year with the methods above, the only alternative is to raise dues to cover the shortfall. If we do nothing at all, each of us will have to pay about \$250 more per year or the club will not be able to pay its bills.
