75 Years Ago.....

It was on December 6, 1932 that William A. Kimbel gathered several men together at the Ardsley Racquet and Swimming Club (former name of the Country Club) for a preliminary meeting. Two curlers from St. Andrews, Alexander Halliday and Franklin Coe, told those present about this peculiar sport, "outlining the origin of the game, it's unusually fine traditions and the rapid recent growth of the interest in the sport in this country". Although curling had taken place at St. Andrews on a pond for several years their new all-weather indoor rink "the finest in the country" had been built as recently as 1931.

A week later, Tuesday 13th, an organization meeting and dinner were held with 30 in attendance who decided to form the Ardsley Curling Club.

On January 13, 1933, the club was admitted to membership in the Grand National Curling Club of America.

40 Years Ago

When the Ardsley Country Club decided to abandon its clubhouse near Hudson House, and to purchase and occupy the Gould estate (its present location on top of the hill), the Curling Club entered into negotiations to build our curling rink that finally resulted in fruition of their dreams. On December 26, 1966, Barton Eddison threw the first stone on the new ice at the Ardsley Curling Club. Formal dedication of the building, however, was not held until January 28th 1967.

The club news letter appeared with the name "Duck Soup" for the first time dated December 27th, 1943....64 years ago!! Stu Peabody is responsible for the title.

Nutmeg Curling Club warms up to new home in Bridgeport

BRIDGEPORT - Every game of curling involves a modest wager.

At the end of a match, it is customary for the four members of the winning team - the team that has managed to slide their eight 42-pound rocks closest to a small ring inscribed at one end of a 146-foot sheet of ice - to celebrate the victory by buying a round of drinks for the team it defeated. The losing team picks up the tab for the next round.

"Curling is a very social sport. You really make good friends," said Nutmeg Curling Club President Jennifer Stannard of Stamford. A match between two curling clubs is called a "friendly," she added.

Last year, about 30 members of the curling club made a not-so-modest \$800,000 wager on the future popularity of their pastime

In 1998, the club had more than 200 members before it lost its home ice at Darien Country Club and began purchasing ice time at a facility in Ardsley, N.Y. After eight years of commuter curling, only a hard-core, close-knit group remained. Last year, with the help of a \$150,000 bequest from the late Anita Bartlett White, a longtime Nutmeg member, as well as loans and bonds purchased by local curlers and other curling clubs, the remaining Nutmeggers built a three-sheet curling facility at Wonderland of Ice in Bridgeport. Sheets are similar to lanes in a bowling alley.

But that wasn't the end of the wager. As soon as it was built, the facility became the property of the city of Bridgeport and was leased back to the club for about \$30,000 a year, not including the cost of the utilities needed to maintain the curling space at 39 degrees, the ice at 24 degrees, and the cozy clubhouse at a more hospitable temperature.

Stannard estimated that about 230 members paying annual dues of about \$600 would allow the club to pay off the loans needed to build the center and keep up with the lease and utilities. Last year, the club grew from 30 to 130 members. About 50 more prospective members have signed up this curling season, which began in October. Most of the new members paid a special first-year fee of about \$130. Second-year membership is \$450.

At this rate, the club could reach the desired 230 curlers in three years.

Stannard said that about 95 percent of the new members learned about curling during the last Winter Olympics.

"That's directly attributable in my mind to the U.S. Men's team winning a Bronze Medal at the Olympics in Turino," Stannard said. "There was so much coverage for the sport. People really became intrigued."

Novice curler Matt Bertonica of New Haven showed up at a recent Nutmeg open house and signed up for the club's Greenhorn league for beginners.

"I saw curling in the Olympics last year and thought it looked fun," Bertonica said.

Bertonica signed up when his college, Rochester Institute of Technology, offered an 11-week physical education class in curling last year. Now he's eager to improve the basic skills he learned at school.

Curling was a medal sport at the 1924 Olympics. After that, it was a demonstration sport when it was included at all, until it was reinstated in 1998. After strong television ratings during the 2002 Olympics, NBC gave it increased coverage at the 2006 Turino Winter Games. Since then, interest in the game has exploded in the United States, where participation has lagged compared with curling centers such as Canada and Denmark.

Chuck Owens of Stamford has been coming to Nutmeg Curling with his wife, Joanna, and their daughter, Jill, since the late 1960s. Owens said the ice is harder and flatter than hockey or figure skating ice, which allows the stone to travel quickly and easily from one side of the sheet to the other. Because curling emphasizes accuracy over strength, Owens said, men and women can compete at a similar level.

"It doesn't take strength to push the stone because the ice is so keen," Owens said. "It requires finesse, not strength."

The ice is so fast that its surface is intentionally marred or "pebbled." Each sheet is sprinkled with water to create small bubbles across the frozen surface, which look like small pebbles and mimic the roughly frozen Scottish lakes and ponds where it is believed the sport was invented in the 1500s.

There is nothing curlers can do to slow down a stone that is pushed too aggressively across the ice. But if it is thrown too softly and is traveling too slowly to reach the "house" or scoring area, the thrower's teammates can sweep the ice with brooms, wearing down the pebbles and speeding the path of the stone.

Curlers have to learn to push off from a starting block, called a "hack," with one leg and slide forward on the other while pushing and rotating a 42-pound granite rock. They also must learn to jog along the ice while vigorously sweeping at the pebbles.

Despite the obstacles, Donna Purkey, a nationally ranked senior player from Greenwich, said the game is

easy to play on a beginner level.

"You can understand it very quickly, and then you have to work on your skills," she said. "When you go out on the ice you will know what's required of you very quickly."

More advanced players learn to spin their wrist as they release the stone, causing it to curl inward or outward as it travels down the ice so it can get close to the "button," or center target. Experienced curlers can control the stone's trajectory and speed enough to knock opposing stones out of scoring position.

On a league night at Nutmeg Curling it's easy to understand why curling is called the "roaring game." As the stones travel down the ice, the granite scrapes against the rough ice and sounds like the roar of a crowd.

While two players stand at each end, taking turns sliding the stones, teammates run up and down the length of the slick ice - some even manage to run fairly gracefully. None fall. They sweep their brushes (which look like mops) across the path of the stone. Some players use a sweeping motion, while others press down as hard as possible, as if mopping a particularly persistent piece of crust off a kitchen floor. As the rocks roll toward the targets, the team captains yell out vague-sounding commands such as "Yup, yup, yup," "All the way," or, more obviously, "Sweep!"

As Stannard said, "It's easy to do on a very basic, friendly level. It's very difficult to master it on a league level."

Last year Stannard spent a month traveling throughout Scotland, curling and making new friends. She said that curlers from across the United States, many of who are unlikely to play at the Bridgeport facility, contributed to the building fund.

"Curlers are very supportive of one another," she said. "We get so much from the sport. It makes curlers all over the country want to make sure that something like a new club is a success." *Copyright* © 2007, Southern Connecticut Newspapers, Inc.
