This men's tournament is known for its hospitality and the camaraderie of the players. <u>Many social events</u> are organized throughout the week of competition. There is a minimum of 6 games and a maximum of 9 games per participating team. The event champion teams win trophies, commemorative badges or pins.

Every year the QIB welcomes teams from across Canada, the United States and Europe. The 2009 Bonspiel is scheduled between Jan 25th and end Jan 30th coinciding with the start of the famous Quebec Winter Carnival. The Carnival is from Jan 30th and ends Feb 15th. You may want to plan a stay over and attend the early festivities for the Carnival while taking advantage of the "grandfathered" reduced room rate offered for the bonspiel.

Planning for next year's event is underway and with the addition of new members a second team entry is planned. Any club member interested in attending next year is encouraged

Governor's Bowl 2008 A Remembrance by Walter Baggett

Looking at the curling medals hanging in the hallway, I see that I have a Fort Orange Bowl from 1987 in the old style with the State Government Mall on it, two third event, Fort Orange runners-up from 2001 and 2003, two Hietala runners-up from 2002 and 2004 and a Governor's bowl runners-up from 1999. Straining my memory I also remembered that in the kitchen, on the shelf next to glass tumblers from Norfolk's 50th anniversary and from Wengen, Switzerland and a Norfolk Mixed snowball candle is a glass with the Albany Curling Club logo etched on it. That would be from the Capital consolation event. I remember getting it with the late Kal Sunduram. He was as happy about winning that glass as any medal.

And so, after twenty years or so of curling at the Governor's bowl, how goes it? Very well as it turns out. After many years with Bunky Harmon, and Isa Bargout and a number of leads, most recently George Cowles, they were less and less willing to come and I was hoping to get some of Ardsley's younger curlers off to another great curling party, such as we did in December 2007 at the Calder in Norfolk when with Tim Klein, David Wagenheim and Ray Bejnart we were runners up in the second event. I have six of those medal; five runners-up and one winner. You can see I have a problem keeping up my concentration once I get a medal in hand.

In any case, only Tim signed up and, try as I might I could not get anyone else, old or young. Fortunately, as a long time (suffering) participant, Albany was willing to give me two substitutes. And primed and ready they were, having been on the third local team in the playdowns to get into the bonspiel when only two teams got in. At lead I had Ed Springstead, a retired high school coach who won the event in 1997. At second I had Ken Rice, a young (at 63 anybody under 70) and enthusiastic curler. And away we went.

Our first match was at 11:00 AM on Friday, the last of the first draws. Our opposition was a Broomstones team skipped by Jerry Blanchette. It was a wild and crazy game. We took four in the first end, then gave up a four and a five took, another two, so that by the fifth end we were down five points. Not to worry. We scored two more in the sixth, stole one in the seventh and were only two down coming home without the hammer. The house was its usual mess of stone, but Jerry had one right on the button. With my last stone I just pushed that out of the way enough, so we were lying two. Not wanting to go to an extra end, Jerry tried to take my lying rock out. Unfortunately, he was tight on the broom and raised into the eight foot one of our stones from the front of the house, so we won by one point. Enough of that nonsense. Jerry went on to loose another game and then take the next three and win the third event.

As for us, we enjoyed the banquet, slept in late and played a team from Valleyfield, Quebec at 10:00 AM the next morning. That game was more controlled. We took three in the first, stole one in the second and then gave up three in the third. After that we never looked back, giving up only one more point and leading 4 - 8 in the final end where we ran them out of rocks with one takeout after another.

With only sixteen teams the second win brought us to the semi-final of the first event. Since there is a consolation event, this meant we were guaranteed to be playing on Sunday. The issue was whether we came home with medal or another Albany tumbler. The opposition, Ron Beldon from Lennoxville, Quebec, was another issue. Ron is a true curling gentleman. Both he and his vice skip, John Pille, are

past presidents of "The Branch" as the Curling Quebec was then called a Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club. I curl in the Monctonian Bonspiel with Ron's older brother, the infamous Ca\$h Beldon, who celebrated forty years of curling in that event by having his own pin struck and given to every participant.

The match itself was no friendly affair. One, one, one, it went back and forth. Finally, we had a chance to take five in the seventh by take out a stone through a port. The runner crashed and we gave up one. Being one down, coming home in the eighth, with the hammer, we scored two to win the game 4 - 5. Because of delays in the draw we finished at close to midnight. We were glad to be able to sleep late. Ron and his team got up early and beat a Valleyfield team, winning the consolation event, the Capital.

Our opponents in the finals were the Albany #1 team, whom Ed and Ken had lost to in the playdowns. Perhaps revenge is a great motivator, but I doubt it. Irreguardless, we were in control, or close to it, the entire game. We scored one in the first end and two in the second end before giving up one in the third end. After a few more steals, they finally scored one in the sixth end. With the hammer, we took two in the seventh end to give us a 2 - 7 lead in the eighth. Never looking back, we again ran our opponents out of rocks to win in a decisive fashion. By that time the home team advantage had been worn away. We knew the ice and could hit, draw or guards.

After twenty years of trying, finally winning the Governor's at the Albany Curling Club was a dream come true. I think of all the people who struggled with me over those years, particularly Kal Sundaram and Bruce May, who never lived to see the final victory. The opponents have changed as well. Bunky Harmon tells me we beat Wes Millington when he was president of the Grand National Curling Club. I can only remember loosing to Wes and Ed Brandt, a former Ardsley curler and New York State champion who had retired Lake Placid. That is probably where the 1987 Fort Orange Bowl pin came from. And, of course, there are the so many people at the Albany club who have made the event, win or loose, fun. The food and hospitality are as fine as any in the world – this spoken by a person who has curl everywhere from Brisbane, Australia to Wengen Switzerland, not to mention Newfoundland, Alberta, and Minnesota. It is a wonderful game and, while winning is great, being there is the best.
