

Ice House Gang Honors Jesse Wang with Award

It is with much sadness to report that Jesse Wang passed away on October 14, 2009. Jesse got a new heart valve early last April, but health complications persisted all summer. He was about to celebrate his 84th birthday. The members of Ardsley Curling Club sent their condolences to his wife Mitzie and their daughters, Kit and Valerie.

Jesse loved curling with the Ardsley Ice House Gang (senior men) Friday mornings and enjoyed the fellowship at lunch afterwards at the Ardsley Country Club. Jesse loved to fix things at the curling club, especially the warm room chairs which became unglued after 40 years. He quietly did this and that and was the best example of an Ardsley Curling Club volunteer. To honor his volunteerism, his Ice House Gang teammates have established the Jesse Wang Award to be presented at the Closing Dinner. The recipient will be a club member who has volunteered substantially during the season. The operation of Ardsley Curling Club relies on volunteers as we have no paid employees. The Jesse Wang Award will honor a select volunteer annually.

Jesse lived a very interesting life. Following is an excerpt from his memorial:

Col. Jesse Wang, U.S. Army, retired, died on October 14, 2009 at White Plains Hospital. He was born on October 18, 1926 to K.H. and Louise Wang in Horseheads, NY. In 1933, the family moved to Shanghai, China, where Jesse attended school, except for two years spent with his paternal grandparents in Canton. In 1946, he joined the U.S. Army in Shanghai and returned to the U.S. He received his commission in 1950. He attended the Command and General Staff College and was a member of the U.S. Army War College class of 1971. He served in Korea and Viet Nam, and did tours of duty at Ft, Bragg, NC and at the State Department. He retired from the Office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in 1978. For his service, he was awarded the Bronze Star, Legion of



Nam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, and many others.

In 1978, he took a position as Message Switching Manager with ITT Worldcom in New York, and retired in 1988.

He received a BS in Military Arts & Science from the University of Maryland in 1962, a Master in Military Arts & Science from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College in 1965, and an MPA in Technical Management from American University in 1967.

He was an active member of Scarsdale Congregational Church for the past 31 years, an enthusiastic participant at the Ardsley Curling Club Ice House Gang, and a student and instructor at the Watanabe Judo Dojo where he attained a 5th dan black belt, and was a national level referee and licensed Class A teacher.

He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Meda Marie (Mitzie), daughter Kathleen (Kit), her spouse Sue Tennant, and their son Jesse Lewis; daughter Valerie, her husband Karl Krause, and their daughter Brigid; and a sister, Lily Stevenson and her family.

Col. Wang will be buried in Arlington National Cemetary on December 28, 2009 at 9 0'clock in the morning.

In 1985, five fearless Ardsley curlers named Paul Mort, Ed Godbold, Wayne Stuart, John McCormack, and your faithful scribe, Walt Baggett, set out by car and then plane from Boston, though St. John, New Brunswick and Halifax, Nova Scotia for the annual Monctonian Bonspiel in Moncton, New Brunswick. This year's Monctonian was special because it was celebrating its 50th year, and 25 years later Ardsley is still well represented. Since that first trip any number of curling luminaries including Art, Mojo, Geoff Broadhurst, Bob Hayes, Vince Brice, Jerry McCarty, Jim Gutekunst, Chris Banino, Bruce Huffine and others have participated. This year the latter four along with Steve Smith made up their own team, and retired Ardsley curler Paul Mort has his own team from Cape Cod. This year I curled with Ray Beinart, Grant Hilliard, a good friend from Halifax's Mayflower curling club, and Alistair Syme, president of the Beaver Curling Club.

Moncton, host of last year's men's curling world championship, is ideally suited for a low key, social bonspiel. Moncton has three five-sheet curling clubs: The Beaver, The Beausejour, and the Moncton Curlers Association (MCA, founded 1881). All are within less than a mile of downtown Moncton. The bonspiel has gone from a high of 80 teams to this year's 56 teams. The high points of this year's event for me was being seated at the head table as the current longest serving participant from the U.S. and winning our first game against Chuck Kingston from Fredericton's Capital City Winter Club. The low point was in that same game when Ray broke his ankle. Fortunately, Canada's healthcare system took good care of him and he was able to fly home as planned. He seems to be on the mend.

The Monctonian is indeed known for its hospitality. Beside the opening roasted side of beef, weighing in at 360 pounds this year, the banquet included a lobster course. The hospitality suites in Moncton's many fine hotels often include bands made up of gifted participant musicians. There is always great conversation well lubricated with drink between the many matches. The clubs are well arranged and the ice is good to excellent with each club being slightly different.

We all look forward to many more happy years of Monctonians before we join those who have gone on before us to that great bonspiel in the sky.
