Austin's Rink included Plainfield's Jim Parsons & Ontario's Jon Klinsman at the front, and fellow Caledonian and Ardslev CC curler Adam Chebetar at Vice. The rest of the curlers present watched the Saturday night prime time match and agreed it was a good close match as they dined on specially prepared steak and potatoes with salad. The Caledonians went on to the fourth event. where they came home with beer.

There was plenty of "armchair curling talk" among fellow curlers during the Saturday draws including Walter Baggett,

who brought and Ardsley team of Kurt Pader, Jim Duke, and Heinz Gruettner. They finished Sunday morning as runners up in the B Event. They bested yet another team of Ardsley CC curlers skipped by Tim Klein, and including Jeff Casper, Matt Gallegos, and Nathan Van Auken along the way. ### The 53rd Men's Continental Bonspiel

Always an amazing bonspiel, the Continental prides itself on being the "World's greatest men's bonspiel."

Jeff Klein, Dave Wagenheim & myself, Jon Peter, traveled to Highland Park, IL to compete in the 53rd Men's Continental Bonspiel. This was my eighth appearance at the Continental and was the 'rookie' appearance for front-end curlers Jeff & Dave. After a slightly delayed flight to O'Hare Airport, the world's third busiest airport, we were picked up by team skip, Steve Neff. Steve is a long time Illinois curler from a legendary curling family. He has played in the Continental Bonspiel for over 10 years and currently curls out of the Wilmette Curling Club (a paper club that uses Exmoor C.C. ice house), after his former club, the North Shore Curling Club closed its doors to curling this past year. After a short visit to the local Bocce Club for lunch and a beer, we headed to Exmoor C.C. to check out the ice and the competition.

Our first game drew stiff competition against The Brown's, another legendary Illinois curling family. Skipped by Ken Brown (2nd generation) with Larry Brown (1st generation), who is one of the USA's greatest advocates for curling, playing vice. Larry had grandson, Ryan Brown (3rd generation) sweeping his stones and playing second, so they were in good shape on their home Exmoor ice. Luckily Russ Brown (2nd generation) was playing for a 'Scotland Tour' (more on this to come) team instead of his usual Continental 'The Brown's' team.

It was a good, close game. The ice was new to us and took a few ends for us to catch on to the 4' of curl in the last 8'. Jeff Klein curled great and led team Neff to a win, with the hammer rock in the eighth end being the decider for team Brown.

The 'USCA Scotland Tour' https://sites. google.com/site/scottour2012/home had four of its five teams represented in this years Continental. These teams are comprised of curlers or 'tourists' from across the US. The Scotland Tour is almost a month long commitment and I am sure there is some great curling and memories that have and will be made. In our next game we faced more tough competition, a Scotland Tour team viced by Russ Lemke, Cape Cod Curling Club, and a frequent supporter of Ardsley C.C. Led by skip Doug Dedolph, they curled excellent and were much deserving of the win, so we moved into the Second Event.

The Continental Bonspiel gets its' namesake from the number of Canadian teams that travel each year to attend this epic curling event. This year, 19 of the 41 teams were Canadian. There is a trophy at the end of the bonspiel for the Country that wins the most head to head games.

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### **Bloodies and Brooms Gets Shorty**

Klein and Wagenheim brought Shorty back from Chicago (see related "Continental article"). The event started at a very reasonable 11:00 AM on New Years Day, and the 32 participants were treated to first class food, raffle items (A big thank you to both Seth Altman for Ranger Tickets and the Wilks for many bottles of wine/liquor), and lots of good company.

Lunch, dinner, and specifically desserts were outstanding. The Dave Schrull rink ended up winning the first event. His team included Matt Scheiner, John Salmon, and Lynn Salmon.

The new wrinkle this year was the introduction of "The Shorty" tournament. Held on both sides of sheet B, the Shorty is an event where teams of two throw two stones each to the near side house from the hack. As long as they have one foot in the hack, and the other foot is parallel, the shooter can push the stone into the

house. Regular scoring rules apply. But one other wrinkle is that all stones must always be in play. Suffice it to say the whole Shorty Tournament was a riot. It was eventually won by Dave Schrull and Matt Scheiner, with Dave Wagenheim substituting for an injured Matt. They took home a cash prize and a fine bottle of Champagne.

What better way to ring in (softly please) the new year with a little curling and good company. Happy 2012!

#### The 53rd Men's Continental Bonspiel

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In our third game, we were up against a team from Leaside, Ontario, lead by skip Jim Montgomery. We were well adjusted to the ice at this point and curled very well, keeping the Leaside boys scrambling for the entire game.

On Saturday we entered in our fourth game in a do or die situation. The Continental has a four game guarantee and that was all our team was going to play this year. We faced a Chicago C.C. team skipped by David Geake. With a 3 point score in the first end, team Geake hung onto to the lead and gave us an early exit from the bonspiel.

The hospitality at the Exmoor Continental is great. All meals were served at the beautiful clubhouse and were worthy of many stars. The Continental is full of tradition, which is recognized during the formal banquet on Saturday night. Bonspiel coordinator, Chris Schallmo opened the evening, followed by Mike Griem, who honored many attendees for multiple years of attendance to the spiel. A total of 52 men have played in this bonspiel for 10 years or more. 37 of those

men were entered in this year's competition with the most impressive stat going to Dick Urevig of Chicago C.C. He has played in this bonspiel an impressive 40 years.

The next tradition was to honor this years Exmoor Hall of Fame inductee, Jim Smith, followed by the first public singing of John Denver's "Drunken Scotsman" by the Scot' Tour teams and led by Russ Armstrong. Russ was also the headline entertainer and between jokes managed to generate a lot of funds with an auction for Bears tickets, Cubs tickets, and a \$1000 CN Rail Pass.

There were also a number of Continental 'rookies' that were rewarded and a special thanks to a determined young group of guys curling for the first time in this bonspiel from the University of Tennessee.

The night's festivities continued as all curlers paraded back to the curling house to watch the semi-finals of the First Event and the 'Canadian Shorty' games playing on the other two sheets.

With some teams having to play three games on Sunday, the four Event finals were started on Sunday afternoon with traditional piping and ceremonial toast.

Even though the Ardsley curlers finished short of the jewelry, we ate well, we drank lots of free beer, we made new friends and we would like to commend the organizers of the Exmoor Continental Bonspiel.
