Ladies House Chairman Report

1984 - 1985

Clean-up day was held on October 24, 1984 with about six ladies assisting. We polished the bar rail, cleaned the bar area, hung curtains, dusted chairs, tables, counters and did general tidying up. Also polished all the silver trophies in the case, etc.

The remainder of the year the chairman must stock the upstairs cupboard with supplies, keep paper products, soap supplies, first aid supplies, etc., in stock downstairs. (Lists follow).

Intra-club events (Open House, Pull-the-Plug, Friendlies, etc.) use the Club supplies but feel that Inter-club events (The N.Y. International Men's Bonspiel, etc.) should purchase their own paper goods, etc. and the chairman of the event should be so notified.

With the approval of the Club President, I purchased a new carpet for the men's bathroom and dressing room from Pergament on Tarrytown Road. This was delivered from my house to the Club by Wayne Stewart (Men's House Chairman) and some Sr. Boy Scouts. Wayne, Elizabeth Hill and I then cut and laid the carpeting.

I then purchased wallpaper to coordinate from Pergament and Elizabeth and I hung it in the bathroom area. Understand the men will soon papint the trim in blue to match. There is additional carpet and wallpaper stored downstairs.

January and February are the Club's busiest months and supplies disappear at a fantastic rate and must be replaced frequently. I tried to buy mostly generic products which cost so much less in order to save the Club money. I often called the dupermarket prior to shopping to see if they had a case available and would have it ready for me. The cost is the same whether by case or off the shelves, but much easier to transport and store.

After much footwork and investigation found the best buy for paper plates, etc. was at Parties, USA at 691 Central Ave., Scarsdale, (next to Lafayette). Buying paper plates, etc., at the supermarket is very expensive.

Save all receipts for your purchases and send to Bruce Mitchell (Treas.) for reimbursement. Instant coffee, bouillon, sugar, etc. for the upstairs cupboard is paid for by the ladies treasurer.

Joe Vulpone and the men are responsible for window cleaning and the heavier chores.

On March 27, 1985, the ladies again had clean-up day and scrubbed the upstairs bar area (leave the refrigerator on for the men), cleaned out and tidied up the desk, tidied the bulletin boards, cleaned out and washed the refrigerator and stove downstairs, bagged all left-over non-perishable foods and they are at my house. We took down the upstairs curtains and I hope to re-line them and have them cleaned. The downstairs curtains we left up to hide our supplies. Vanda washed the downstairs tablecloths and they are at my house, also. All aspirins, tylenol, etc. should be removed so the summer camp children do not

get into them.

EMPIRE STATE BONSPIEL REPRESENTATIVES MEETING JANUARY 14. 1985

An Empire State Bonspiel Rep's meeting was held at St. Andrews Golf Club on Monday, January 14, 1985. Present at the meeting were representatives Ruth Kerr from Schenectady, Carole LoGalbo and Peggy Rotton from Utica, Fran Garred and Carole Meszaros from Ardsley, Molly Babcock, Diane Mojo and Shirley Bruce from Westchester Wicks.

The meeting, chaired by Molly Babcock, was called to order at 9:15 p.m. and a warm welcome was extended to the Ardsley Ladies through their two representatives.

After discussion, a motion was passed that there sould be no restrictions on the charter i.e. sponsors entering two rinks - that best effort only apply; that flexibility must be maintained in scheduling, in participation dates, and number of ends during play.

A motion was passed that the Empire State Bonspiel be played under USWCA rules, with the exception of local rules; and to cut down on paper work that a copy of the USWCA rules be present during bonspiel play and only the local rules be copied and included in bonspiel kits.

Ardsley reported that they had ordered the Empire State Medals (the three other sponsoring clubs had ordered and received a two year supply each at a cost of \$17.00 per medal) and had been informed that due to the small order the medals would cost them \$25.00 each which seemed high to them. It was agreed that the Wicks would sell their second year supply to Ardsley at \$17.00 each and that the medals be reordered for all clubs in 1988.

In order to keep a North, South rotation, it was agreed the sponsoring clubs would host the Bonspiel as follows - 1986, Utica; 1987, Ardsley; 1988, Schenectady; 1989, Westchester Wicks; with the first event always being sponsored by the hosting Home club of any given year.

It was agreed by all that a midweek spiel is still viable.

It was thought that while Albany is not ready to join as a sponsoring club at this time, they are still wanted and given time perhaps will join as a sponsor. It was also felt by all present that more prestige is needed for the ESB, and that more support is needed for the Canadian spiels.

Shirley Bruce volunteered to draft "Guide Lines" (for lack of a better name) to be sent to each sponsoring club for revision and/or approval, and ultimately to be placed in the front of the ESB file to help each club in its turn as host Club. It was agreed that this is needed, with as much flexibility and freedom from restrictions as possible. Motion passed.

A discussion followed on our coninuing participation problems. The Wicks this year provided housing as available and the bonspiel fee at par to our Canadian friends. Perhaps this was part of the reason the Bonspiel was filled relatively early. The general feeling is that each host club in turn should consider coninuing this.

Meeting adjourned at 9:55 p.m.
