

Ardsley Curling Club Dedicates Its New \$135,000, Three-Ice Rink

Members of Ardsley Curling Club try new 190-foot-long curling rink, opened yesterday in Ardsley-on-Hudson, N. Y.

ARDSLEY - ON - HUDSON,
N. Y., Dec. 26—The Ardsley
Curling Club dedicated its
\$135,000, three-ice curling
rink here today.

The new rink, which is sit-
uated on land owned by the

Ardsley Country Club, is 50
by 190 feet and includes space
for spectators on banked
seats behind a glass wall.

Previously, club members
had conducted their activities
on the St. Andrew's rink in
Hastings-on-Hudson.

The rink's architect was

Edward Wallace of Darien,
Conn., who also designed a
rink for the Nutmeg Curling
Club, which was built in
Darien, Conn., in 1963.

In curling, players push a
44-pound stone along the ice
toward a tee (a fixed object),

the game getting its name
from the right or left spin
given a played stone which
causes it to proceed in an arc
to the right or left.

This change in direction of
a played stone, aided by other
players with brooms, is known
as the "curl" of a stone.
