Our 40th Anniversary Approaches

I refer to the anniversary of the present curling facility, not the Ardsley Curling Club which was established in December 1932. Ground was broken with appropriate ceremonies on June 11, 1966 and the first stone was laid by Barton Edison, a Charter Member of the Ardsley Curling Club, while Ad Hastings held the broom, on December 26, 1966. The formal dedication ceremonies took place on January 28, 1967 at which time three curling matches were played: Ardsley vs. Canadians; St. Andrews vs. Nutmeg; Caledonia vs. Mahopac. In those past 39 years two facilities have closed down (St. Andrews and Nutmeg) although the latter is currently building a new facility in Bridgeport, and one club. Mahopac, is no longer in existence.

Now here we are 39 years later beginning a new season with a new 15 year lease and a new roof with a 12 year guarantee (the old roof was the one put on when the building was constructed).

So, do we have a party next winter to celebrate our 40th or do we wait until 2016 and celebrate the 50th?

The Ice House Gang vs. The Good Old Boys

On December 2nd The Ice House Gang, that's the Ardsley senior curlers, played the first half of their traditional "home and home" tournament against the Good Old Boys, that's the Nutmeg senior curlers. In the early years of this senior competition each club hosted a game at its own club but since Nutmeg lost the use of its facility some years ago both games have been held at Ardsley. Hopefully, next season we can get back to the original format and play one of the matches at Nutmeg.

At this time Ardsley has won the competition 9 times and Nutmeg 7 times.



Time To Speed Things Up by Pete McCune

If you're a Monday or Wednesday night curler, here's a question for you. How many eight end games have you curled this season? The answer is "not many." Because of the two draw format on these nights, a two hour time limit has been imposed on each draw. The result is that almost no eight end games are completed in two hours.

This is not fair to anyone who signed up expecting to play eight end games. Strategically, you're never sure how many more ends you'll be curling when you're in the fifth or sixth end. And, not that anyone at Ardsley would do it, but we have heard tales where in similar situations at other clubs, teams have deliberately slowed down, if it's to their advantage, so an eighth end wouldn't be played.

A discussion at a recent Board of Directors meeting focused on this situation, with everyone agreeing that the goal is to play eight end games. Some suggestions were made which would help achieve this goal and the Board would welcome hearing from the membership with additional suggestions. Most of the suggestions are fairly simple actions that, if implemented, would help. First, let's start the games on time. This is the skip's responsibility and is particularly relevant to the 7 o'clock draws. Let's get the teams on the ice at five minutes to seven and start on time. This is not happening.

Also let's get curlers in the hack so that they are ready to throw as soon as the preceding shot has been completed. And let's not spend two or three minutes making sure the stones are in perfect numerical order before each end. We are all numerically advanced enough to be able to find our stones quickly even if they're in random order.

Finally, it's primarily the skip's responsibility to move the game along. Yet, there are some skips who are major game slowers, taking forever to decide upon even the most obvious shots before taking their leisurely stroll down the ice to deliver their stone. This not only slows the game down, but is also not a heck of a lot of fun for the other players on both teams just standing around.

The optimum solution would be a chess clock procedure whereby each team gets an hour of playing time. This, unfortunately, seems impractical. The real solution is getting cooperation from all participants. How about it?

High School Program.

Pete Westrell's High School program is rolling right along. He plans to have the four quad village high schools compete for a trophy in March.. To that end each school has come to the Ardsley Curling Club for an orientation similar to the open house that Mark and Sue Bussy coordinate. Thus far this year Ardsley High School had two groups on the ice in December, Irvington High School had two groups on January 10th, Hastings High School had two groups on January 11th and Dobbs Ferry will come on January 18th..

Pete hopes that each of the schools will be able to put together a team composed of 6 males and six females to compete in the tournament which will begin in February.

To maintain interest **Pete** has scheduled open ice for any student who is interested on Mondays from 4:00 PM to 6:00PM. They can come to practice or play a game. Last week, the 1st week, 8 students showed up, seven from Dobbs Ferry and one from Hastings.

In addition to the High School groups, the Girl Scouts are also getting involved. On Wednesday, January 11th about 20 girl scouts from Pleasantville visited Ardsley and curled. They plan a second visit in March..

Pete Westrell organized this program and supervises it. 

70th McKay Douglas International Bonspiel

Beginning on Thursday, February 23rd, 23 teams assembled for the first draw of the bonspiel which would continue until mid-afternoon on Sunday, February 26th. During the intervening days and hours 133 games were played, three breakfasts, three lunches and two dinners were served, an unknown number of kegs of beer were emptied and scores of families, friends and competitors enjoyed watching those on the ice. It all began to wind down on Sunday morning when the finalists of the 1st, 2nd and 4th events took to the ice at 10:15 AM.

The first event, the McKay-Douglas, saw Ardsley #3 curling against the New York Caledonian Curling Club. It was a close match from beginning to end but Grant Zolkavich's Ardsley rink consisting of Gert Messing, Mike Murphy and John Smart emerged victorious over George Austin's Caledonians, Danny Steski, Dennis Mellerup and Peter Austin.

In the 2nd event, the New York Caledonian Medal, the international flavor became evident as the Royal Caledonian Navy rink from Ottawa took on the Scottish Musketeers from, where else, Scotland. This was a very close match ending up in a tie after 10 ends. The RCN rink prevailed in the 11th end and won the 1st place medal with the runner-up medal going to the Scots.

The 4th event, the Williamson, saw **Paul Mort's** (as a former Ardsley curler his name still gets highlighted) Cape Cod rink playing **Jim Meinhold's** Nutmeg #3 team of **Ed Tucker, Walter Baggett** and **Mark Bussy**. Nutmeg prevailed and took home the gold while Cape Cod was awarded the silver medal.

That afternoon at 1:00 PM, after the finalists in all six events were piped onto the ice, the finals in the third, fifth and sixth events were played. The 3rd event, the Ardsley Medal, saw **Jeff Lesuk's** Ardsley #5 rink take on Brian Moore's Utica CC team. Curling Definitions

Nick Andes, having a curious mind, wondered about the origin of certain terms commonly used in the sport of curling. He did a little digging and came up with the following information:

The Hack

In the 13th century, the English word "hack" came into being as a noun that referred to a tool used for cutting, chopping, or breaking, such as a pickax or hoe. In time the mark, wound, or indentation made by such tools was itself referred to as a hack. A curling hack was originally a gash that was cut into the ice creating a hollow made to support the foot and facilitate push-off and delivery of the stone.

Hog Line

It is thought that the word hog as used in 14th century Britain referred to the age or condition of a swine or sheep, possibly one that had been castrated. In 18th century Scotland, a curling stone that did not travel beyond the distance line came to be called a hog. The usage may have come about because the stone did not have enough essential vigor to travel the required distance. The distance-line came to be called the hog-score line, and today is called simply the hog line.

"The reference source for the above etymologies was the Oxford English Dictionary, and all errors and assumptions in the above analysis are mine" Nick Andes.

2006 Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Ardsley Curling Club was held in the warm room, which wasn't so warm considering the weather, on Saturday, April 22nd. **Peter McCuen,** finishing his two year term as president, presided over the meeting broken leg and all. For those of you who haven't heard about it, **Pete** slipped when stepping off the ice at the Headless Horseman the final weekend of curling. He is recovering nicely at home and the burden being lifted from his shoulders can only help.

George Cowles presented the Treasurer's report. At the present time we have about \$75,000.00 cash on hand and the club is in a comfortable financial position.

Susan Bussy reported on the membership status saying that in October 2005 our total membership was 189 members. At the present time, thanks to the Olympic driven interest in curling we are up to 270 total members.

Peter McCune presented his report mentioning some of the major accomplishments of the last year and some of the problems still ahead of us. The first accomplishment was of course the signing of a new 15 year lease with the Ardsley Country Club and the second was the installation of a new roof with a 12 year guarantee. It replaced the original roof installed about 40 years ago. The major problem now facing the club is the leakage in the refrigeration pipes under the concrete floor. Those pipes are also about 40 years old and the refrigerant used these days is more corrosive than that used when those old pipes were installed. Studies are now underway to determine the best way to solve the problem. The double exterior doors from the rink to the west side of the building are in poor condition now, and have been for years, and should be replaced.

Pete complimented Peter Westrell for the excellent job he has done with the various junior curling programs. Our status as 501 C (3) organization is somewhat dependent upon the educational and training programs that we perform. The more of this type of program we offer, the better off we are. Jeff Paul's program for juniors unattached to any of the special groups participating in Pete Westrell's program was also praised for contributing to our 501 C (3) efforts.

Several corporations have hosted outings at the club this season with the result that our coffers have been enriched to the tune of \$7,000.00 or \$8,000.00.

Pete mentioned that **Ed Siebert** is exploring the possibility of corporate sponsorship of the Ardsley Curling Club. For a fee, selective corporations would be invited to display their corporate banners upon the walls of the curling area and to

advertise in the Douglas Journal. His findings will be submitted to the board for their decision.

In closing Pete thanked the many members without whose help most of our projects could not possibly have succeeded. We are a volunteer organization that could not possibly exist, let alone grow, unless all the members pitch in and help. The numbers are so great that they can not be named here. Suffice it to say, they are known to all of us and their efforts are greatly appreciated.

Pete expressed the pleasure we at Ardsley have had in curling with our friends from Nutmeg who will not be with us next year. It is true that a good many of them will remain as Ardsley curlers because our facility is closer to their homes than the new facility at Bridgeport, but we will miss those who are leaving.

Pete McCuen announced the resignation of two members of the Board. Steve Smith, who for many years was the Chairman of the Ice Committee, finally decided to find something else to do in his spare time and resigned from the Board. His expertise in all things related to curling will be missed. Mark Bussy, who has been Secretary of the Board for several years and co-chair of the Membership Committee with his wife Sue during these hectic Olympic years, has also resigned. Hopefully they both will be available to lend a word of advice when needed.

The Nominating Committee announced the names of the nominees to fill all the vacancies on the board including those whose terms expired and those who resigned. The nominations were accepted and the nominees elected. Their names and class are as follows:

The new officers are: President - Alice Yeh, Vice President - Jeff Lesuk, Secretary - Vic Huebner, Treasurer - George Cowles.
