Common Goldeneye

(Bucephala clangula)

The genus name is derived from the Ancient Greek boukephalos, a reference to the bulbous head shape - which look like ancient Greek curling stones.


GNCC SENIOR MEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP

CURLER ON THE SHEET INTERVIEW

How I discovered curling (and the result!)?



Well, cooking and being a chef has been a major part of my life. So any desire to play sports was overshadowed by hectic work schedules. The demands of being a Sous Chef and Catering Chef at venues like the Philadelphia Museum of Art where menus

changed with the exhibits and the food needed to be as exciting as the artwork was challenging. All this, while serving anywhere from 2 to 5,000 people, left little room for sports. Yet, at the end of the day, it certainly felt like I had played a double in curling with serious sweeping in every end.

Very subtle changes in anything could drastically change the shot! Why play an easily mastered sport? That would get boring quickly.

We found the Ardsley website in October 2019 and learned about an Open House. We attended the open house and had a blast. We then signed up for the Curling Sampler. At the end of the sampler, we joined the club. I saw that there was a retired men's group that played on Friday mornings which was perfect for me since I have free time during the day. I am retired, right? And who better to help me learn the game then a group of people that have played the sport for a long time! They are a wonderful group who were very welcoming and have helped me tremendously. The Saturday Night Dinner league is also fun, full of great people and combined my new-found sport with food. What could be better.

As long as I can remember I have always belonged to a sports club of one variety or another. As a kid it was boxing or soccer until I went to public school, private in this country, (on scholarship), where soccer was not allowed and rugby and cricket were the main sports so I started playing them.
