Is it a team of draw artists who can throw hard and sweep even harder, six sheets of perfect ice, beer at \$6 a pitcher and lots of games to watch and talk about with a good crowd when you are not playing a match? Or, is it waking up in the morning to a Swiss smorgasbord breakfast, a walk through the snow to get the newspaper followed by a 10:00 am match on irregular outdoor arena ice with panoramic views of the Alps, after which comes lunch on a sunny terrace and another game at 2:00 pm, all played with a delightful mixed international crowd of all ages well peppered with Scots and English folks? This January I expect to do both. The first by going with our competitive Monday night team to the Mitchell bonspiel in Utica. The second by flying to Switzerland and taking the train (there are no roads going to this place) to Wengen in the Bernese Oberland where I will sign up for matches, stay at the family owned and operated Hotel Falken (www.hotelfalken.ch, est. 1895), put on a baby blue club sweater and play with my fellow members of the Wengen Curling Club (founded 1915).

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and look at the calendar. Plan on getting away Thursday afternoon or evening and coming back some time on Sunday. The local clubs will provide a list of possible places to stay.

For those who do want to consider a wider range of options, going to the Canadian and U.S. Curling association websites will get you to provincial, state and regional web addresses where you can find lots of events to go to. Ardsley often sends teams to the Quebec International, the City of Ottawa, USWCA and U.S. Men's seniors. If you just want to watch, the Briar, the Canadian Men's championship, is in Halifax this year. Kay Sugahara always makes a point of getting to the Men's world championship. Ask around. As Ardsley's GNCC representative I would be willing to offer any information and help I can.

Ardsley Team Competes in Mixed Doubles Championship

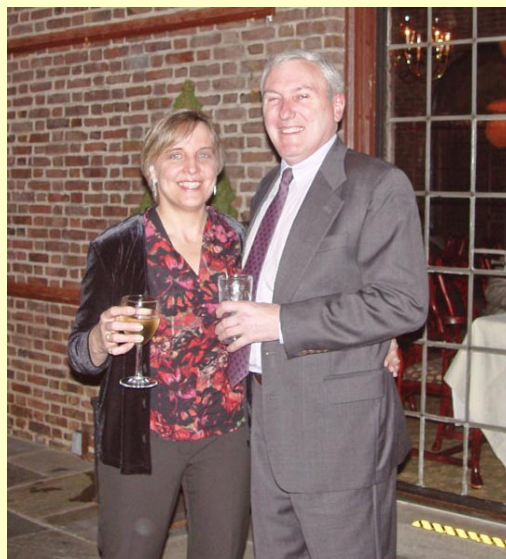
Joyance Meechai teamed with former Ardsley curler Jason Nawyn early December and took a trip to the Great Northwest for the 2010 Mixed Doubles Championship held at Granite Curling Club in Seattle. The winner goes on to the World Mixed Doubles Curling Championship held in Chelyabinsk, Russia in mid April. Nineteen teams competed, divided into three pools. Joyance and Jason fared well, placing second in their pool and earning a spot in the playoff round. The event was eventually won by Sharon Vukich and Mike Calcagno of Granite. Given their strong showing, we will have to wish Joyance and Jason well and give encouragement should they have another go at it.

Mixed Doubles curling has different rules from

conventional curling. Teams are made of two people, one male and one female obviously. Two rocks are placed prior to the start of each end. Each team throws five rocks, and the person who throws the first rock must also throw the last in the same end. The teammate throws the middle three stones. No rock can be "taken out" until the fourth stone is thrown. There are no sweepers, but the thrower or skip may pop out and sweep if needed. The order of throwing can change each end. Finally, the hammer is determined by choice. Whoever wins the coin toss or fails to score in the last end chooses to keep the hammer or gives it to the opponent.
